



The Colonial or Continental Army, led by George Washington, which fought for the values of Freedom and Inclusion for which GW and its community also strive. Our mascot is named George, after all.

Colonials is a term honoring our national heritage. It refers to the brave colonists who, under the leadership of our university namesake George Washington, sacrificed "their lives, their fortunes, and their sacred honor" for the cause of liberty. It is a great mascot, that honors our university's spirit, our namesake, our veterans, and our nation at large. Only an ignoramus would argue that it embodies "colonialism" or "oppression." The context of our use of "colonial" is clearly a nod to the brave patriots of the War of Independence. That is not an endorsement of colonialism; it is honoring the memory of anti-colonialists, who fought and died in the name of liberty, equality, and national self-determination.

The Collins English Dictionary defines "colonialism" as "the policy and practice of a power in extending control over weaker peoples or areas," thereby, I see a colonial as a person who belongs to the colonizing nation.

I understand the term colonial to signify the history of colonization on hundreds of nations that implemented egregious suffering on the natives to the land. The effects the colonials have placed on these nations continue to this day.

To ponder the suffering of Gen. Washington and the Colonial troops not so far away, across the Delaware River at Valley Forge, during the darkest days of the Revolution, is to understand that this great nation was born out of hardship. We should all be proud to be Colonials.

Being that our school is the George Washington University, I, and most people, think of "Colonials" to refer to the people who settled in America and created the American government, but only at the cost of Black people's freedom. The term seems outdated and almost inappropriate to cheer for at sports games or to represent on clothing when you consider the racial disparities and oppression that still exist in America today.

The George Washington University

To me, the Colonials has mixed messages - but, ironically, I'm not sure I dislike it. What I mean is I am both an enrolled Native American (Shawnee) as well as descended from people who fought the Revolutionary War. I love colonial history and architecture; I also despise settler-colonial mentality that has been problematic to Indigenous peoples. To me, George Washington is the epitome of Colonial and so if we ask this question then we must ask the question of the university. However, it seems very anti-patriotic to overthrow ideas of George Washington considered the issue of Independence and the reality that the Constitution and other documents contained a mix of messages ("merciless Indian savages" but also recognizing the pre- and extra-Constitutional rights of sovereignty to tribal nations). It is in reference to the people of the thirteen colonies who formed this nation, but has some more insidious negative implications.

It means the people of a colony.

People who colonized the Americas resulting in theft of land of native people by way of war and genocide.

It means colonialism, aka taking over a minority group in order to exploite their resources

Landowning old white men with powdered wigs who, more often than not, profited from the free labor of enslaved Black bodies. It is also barely distinct from the term "colonizer," which is associated with the brutalization of native and non-white peoples (by white landowning men) for capitalist gain. The American Colonists

The Colonials are a term for members of the Colonial Army - the Army of George Washington in the Revolutionary War. Thus, if you served in that army, you were a "colonial."

I assume the term is meant to celebrate the beginning of the modern United States, however, it also evokes a history of violence, theft of native lands, and a period of our country's history when equality for all was a fiction for anyone who wasn't a white man.

"Colonials" refers to the group that dominated the Colonial era of American history,, a time that is much celebrated but in reality had profound negative effects for many groups.

Colonial immediately brings to mind a history of extraction, oppression, and theft, either in the US history and present or elsewhere around the world. Colonials, as people who settled stolen land, participated directly in the colonial enterprise - an inherently violent and white supremacist project. While I understand the historical relevance of "colonials" to George Washington, this university's namesake, and to the US as a whole, that relevance carries with it the same historical meaning. The history of this university, this country, and this country's first president *is* a history of settler colonial violence.

a retro american

Colonizers. People who settle foreign lands in search of financial, religious, or capital gain, at the expense of the native people and environment.

A person who is part of a colony

It refers to the colonists who founded the American state, among them George Washington, who specifically called for the creation of a federal university, which GW was before it became private.

Term showing affiliation with George Washington

Colonials is an exclusive moniker because it refers to people who colonized other communities. Colonials is offensive because it celebrates this colonization. Additionally, it is historically inaccurate, because George Washington himself fought the Revolutionary War in order to stop being part of a colony. We need to listen to the students, especially students of color and indigenous students, who feel insulted and excluded by the Colonials moniker and remove it.

Colonials are the people who lived in overseas colonies of European empires. To me, the term is neither oppressive nor offensive. "Colonials" references the early American settlers who cultivated Britain's North American territories. "Colonials" is a term of reverence for and celebration of the enduring men and women who developed the American colonies and subsequent United States. Colonials are the Founding Fathers, early American tradesmen, fishermen, merchants, etc. "Colonials" embodies the enterprising spirit of early American settlers who created better lives for themselves, their families, and their community. While undoubtedly acknowledging the often terrible actions committed by European powers and colonials themselves, the term is a celebration of the best of American ingenuity and derring-do. I believe that we can recognize and celebrate the positive aspects of colonials, while simultaneously understanding their shortcomings. Yes, it may be difficult for some to reconcile the two characteristics, but life and history are neither easy nor inherently good. Coming to terms and facing our past is a positive learning experience. There is a worthwhile conversation to be had about how we deal with contentious issues in history. Running away from them, in my opinion, is not worthwhile or constructive. As a prestigious American university, GW should be striving toward these types of conversations and ideas in education, not simply eschewing them because they are either contentious or difficult. This does not diminish anyone who believes that the term is offensive or oppressive, but rather recognizes that issues, terms, and ideas are not simply black or white, but grey. Free and open discussion or debate in a constructive manner is a positive thing, running away from that which scares us or that we find challenging is cowardice. Colonials as a term is the embodiment of all these best aspects of enterprising American ingenuity. "Colonizers" or "colonists," meanwhile is the recognition of imperialism's worst aspects. This may sound like a distinction without a difference, but that would be a false conflation. Colonials are Betsy Ross, Benjamin Franklin, Crispus Attucks, and, unsurprisingly, George Washington.

Colonials, at the inception of the moniker, was intended to mean the soldiers who fought under George Washington during the American War for Independence. However, this name was primarily used by those on the British side of the war as derision for American "colonials" who owed allegiance to the British crown. In the centuries since, it has meant those from whom the metropole extracts wealth under the guise of "civilizing", and has taken on a racist undertone.

A reference to colonial America

To me, it is an unfortunate reminder of Colonial America and its racist, imperialist views. I understand that it is a throwback to the university's origins, but to many students, it recalls images of genocide, slavery, and racism. Who benefitted from the alleged freedom and unity that the moniker is said to represent? It certainly wouldn't have been those that look like university's students of color. Who suffered directly at the hands of Colonial Americans and their beliefs? Those that look like the university's students of color; more likely than not, some of the students' own ancestors. The "Colonials" moniker is not as representative of the student body as some believe, and I urge the school to take into account the racist implications that students of color think about every time they see the "Colonials" moniker.

Residents of the 13 British colonies in the Americas that won independence from England; the hidden premise being that the "colonization" that created these colonies involved systematically removing Native Americans from the land.

By rallying behind this moniker, we are rallying behind an (at best antiquated) extremely racist European notion that appropriation of land belonging to non-Caucasian peoples is justified by their unfamiliar race and unfamiliar religion. This is an emblem that represents a very narrow Euro-centric view that the intellectual community is rejecting. It is a terrible emblem to represent the kind of inclusion and tolerance we want to embody as a university.

Colonial means someone who lives in a colony however when I think about what a colonial is I think of it in terms of colonialism which is by definition a country seeking to extend its authority of territories, to have economic dominance, imposing religion, language and other cultural practices on others and In this case we know that this directly effected indigenous people in America. These terms are synonymous no matter what context.

I understand that the colonials is simply a mascot meant to represent GW. However, it white washes our history. Colonization is a really bad practice. It is repressive and can oftentimes be genocidal. In fact, the colonials in America partook in some of those practice so I don't think that is really narrative that GW wants to associate with itself.

Colonials is the plural for of colonial. Colonial, used as a noun in this case, stands for someone who is a member or inhabitant of a colony. In order for colonials to exist there must be some form of colonization taking place. Colonization is the process by which one country attempts to control and extend it's authority over other peoples or territory. It is often done for economic exploitation and the colonizing nation often subverts or destroys the native cultures values and systems of government. Colonization is driven by greed and imperialism, benefiting directly from the slave trade and economic exploitation. It often results in xenophobic and racist characterizations of some "other" that must be tamed, cultured, and civilized.

Colonists, taking over land that is not yours. Conquering. Conquering innocent people. Stealing. Understanding my culture and my ancestry, my ancestors in the Philippines and my friends and family ancestors back home in Hawai'i - all had to deal with colonist mentality from ancient Filipino times to ancient Hawai'ian times. One example is how the Spanish conquistadors conquered the Filipinos for over 400 years, and there were Filipinos who were enslaved by these colonists. Their names were taken away and changed to Spanish names. A lot of history and culture was erased due to Spanish rule. A forced conformity to the Spanish rule made Filipino people forget about their true culture of being a Filipino. Also, Hawai'i was overthrown illegally, by the United States who illegally took land from Queen Liliuokalani through illegal annexation. In other words, threats were made to the Queen and to representatives of Hawai'i during that time to have Hawai'i be turned to Statehood, all because of monetary gain and businesses that were developed by foreigners in Hawai'i due to greed of a fertile land.

Colonial references the colonists of America. In our current popular discourse, this has been seen as positive. However people are coming to understand the "colonial" as what it is -- colonization of the Americas that was rooted in indigenous genocide and slavery. These are not heroes or anything to celebrate or represent a student body.

Callous, oblivious imperialists. Tourists and oppressors.

People who go somewhere from a country and took land from native people to create a colony.

The term Colonials is inherently associated with the invasion of native lands and the subsequent mass execution of those native peoples, as well as the entire bloodied history of the building of this country. It engenders thoughts of 18th century America and the men and women who broke ties with their identity as English citizens to stand up for themselves and create a new form of government, which would for two centuries serve as a light of freedom for many oppressed peoples around the world.

I understand that there can be negative connotations with the term "Colonials" but I see it in a more positive way in that we are pioneers and our school is on such historic land.

I understand the term "colonials" to be referencing the founders of our country who were a part of the British colony. However, associating ourselves with colonialism in a positive way is wildly problematic.

A colonialist is someone who favors establishing colonies, which is the process of conquering the existing population through subjugation, oppression, and genocide.

citizens of a colony

A vague expression of alignment with GW that is contentious because it also has reference to the US' horrid treatment of black peoples and indigenous peoples.

"Colonials" is a reference to the Continental Army levied by Congress to fight the British. They are referred to as "Colonials" because the soldiers lived in the "colonies," the new settlements in North America.

A term honoring George Washington for being an original colonist in the US and leading the charge to making the US a free country.

The white settlers who came to America, brutalized the native population into submission, and began the transatlantic slave trade.

This term refers to someone who lived in the time that colonies were formed around the globe. Specifically, I tend to think of the original colonies in the U.S.

Colonials in reference to the GW mascot represents the strength and resistance of a nation at a time when colonialism grew strong. As George Washington and thousands of others, they were historically, whether you like it or not, colonials fighting a kingdom. As we are a university on the sports "battlefield" fighting for vistory.

Americans who lived during the colonial era of the United States in the 13 colonies

Can refer to the "colonial army" but can also be understood as the force of western colonization on indigenous people around the world.

Colonists that murdered indigenous people out of white supremacist ideals

Historically, colonials refers to those involved with colonization. Colonizers do not encapsulate the views of GW, like open-mindedness & acceptance. Colonizers abused, raped, killed, and stole from indigenous groups. These practices still affect our world today and should not be glorified.

People who came to colonize America

Primarily referencing the colonists that would eventually become the first citizens of the United States.

The first settlers to North America (mostly from Britain, France, the Netherlands, Sweden, etc.)

Colonization!!!

European men who colonize and exploit land.

It refers to the British people who lived in the 13 colonies in present-day U.S., taking away land from the indigenous people of the area.

In the most literal sense it's the people who lived in the American colonies—but those people can't be separated from the racism, particularly against Black and Indigenous people, that allowed them to survive in America. "Colonials" only represents white people, and it's an attack on POC.

In my mind, the term "Colonials" refers to the European settlers in the new world in what is now the United States. In the context of the 13 Colonies, Colonials were citizens of Great Britain. I am in favor of changing the campus moniker because I do not believe that the term "Colonials" adequately represents the spirit of the founding fathers, in fact I believe that individuals such as George Washington would describe themselves as "Americans" or "Patriots" rather than British "Colonials".

Thirteen colonies and America's founding...obviously

GW's history and US history

I think colonial's represents White Supremacy and someone who colonized native land.

A reference to the founding of the country as the union of 13 former british colonies

Taking about the American colonists who were led by George Washington

It signifies people who stole and took over the land of others, killing native peoples in the process

Colonization of America by White, Christians primarily of English descent and the resulting birth of America that also involved the genocide of indigenous peoples and enslavement of African peoples.

I understand the term colonials to have a double meaning of sorts. To those who belong to populations which have historically colonized other lands it is a word which describes the people who actually established colonial governments in lands they were not born in. To those who belong to formerly and currently colonized populations it describes the people who forcibly changed their lives and culture, often bringing violence and disease to their lands.

colonials to me means those who came to establish the colonies and the beginning of the United States

"Colonials" refers to people who inhabited colonies.

Referring to founding fathers/the formation of the United States, I don't really see it connected to 'colonialism.'

While it's clear to me that colonial is meant to mean a person living in colonial America in the context of GWU, there is also a harkening back to the days of empire and all the baggage that comes with that historical process.

Birth of a new nation

A white, European individual who views people of color as a means to end—to achieve profit, land, personal gain, and absolute power. A colonial is someone who has enslaved, murdered, raped, and pillaged indigenous communities and communities of color. Colonials in a broad sense have "conquered" nations and destroyed the unique fabric of the people of those nations—while subduing and subjugating them.

Colonists, people who came from England to form a colony in America

Inhabitant of colonial America

Someone who takes over land and commits genocide on its people.

It is an archaic term used to describe people who colonize land that belongs to others.

People who settle on land considered to be or claimed as the colony of a particular nation.

The name for the Europeans who (in this context) came to the US and took over the land of Native American communities in order to set up colonies in the "New World". They often did so violently and brought with them diseases that wiped out huge populations of Native Americans. Colonials can also refer to colonizers in other places but seeing as our school is all about George Washington, I think it's specifically referring to the US context.

A revolutionary fighting against the unjust & tyrannical English monarchy. George Washington himself was a Colonial.

Those that take over land and colonize it, just because they can or want to.

A colonial is someone who represents both a forceful and violent foreign occupying presence and is a tool used by the "mother" state to enhance the "mother" state's wealth, usually with natural resources, via mercantilist economic policy. George Washington is celebrated as an American revolutionary, not as a British colonial figure. While the term may have originally referred merely to American historical figures and life in the "colonial period," the term now is more closely associated with the global historical practice of colonialism.

"Colonial" is representative of the European-led genocide against Indigenous peoples. I think that if we are to view history through a critical lens, we need to acknowledge what should and should not be glorified.

Someone who colonizes a country or people

I understand the background to the word colonials to honor George Washington. I also take the meaning to refer to a neighborhood individual, someone part of the community then and now. Today, I take the word colonial to reference a student or an alumni, or even faculty.

I know that "colonials" is meant to invoke the era of the founding fathers and thus the university's namesake, however the violent history of colonialism far outweighs this intended purpose.

Those who have established colonies.

Army rank bestowed as a the individual continues to grow professionally.

"Colonials" is the current mascot of our university, but it represents the history of white supremacy our current institutions (both at GW and more broadly) were built on.

To represent the founding fathers and the 13 colonies

A representation of the first generation of Americans who fought for their rights against the British empire.

A historical nod to our founding father George Washington

People who lived in the Colonies.

people who came to a place to take it over and claim it for themselves, displacing everything and everyone previously there committing genocide against native people and doing irreparable harm and damage to the natives

A person (historically, a white male) who feels it necessary to colonize another group of people (historically, non-white). Although the word also suggests the 13-original-colonies, these colonies were set up as a white supremacist patriarchy, something many of us at GWU no longer wish to advance or celebrate

It's a homage to American colonists.

First white settlers

Our school's "mascot," reminiscent of the time period when George Washington was president (ie "colonial" america)

"Colonials" to me refers to a legacy of colonization in what is now the United States, where Indigenous people were murdered and Black people were enslaved. The moniker honors a history that shouldn't be honored, but instead be discussed critically.

The people who inhabited the thirteen colonies.

The White Colonizers who stole this land from Native American peoples and claimed it as their own after killing millions of Indigenous people.

I know what the name means - I just think if you have to explain it to everyone you meet just to prove that it isn't problematic - it's probably time for a change

I understand that the point of the moniker is to reference George Washington and the fight for independence. But I'm also sympathetic to the students who feel that it is an offensive term today.

People under colonial rule, and in the context of the U.S. history and the first president of this country (for whom the university is currently named), it's about being a subject to a monarch.

A historical reference to the American Revolution and its leader the venerable George Washington.

a term denoting systematic exploitation and oppression of non-white/European groups

A historical reminder to where we were before George Washington helped create our great nation. He was a Colonial for over 40 years of his life.

The people who came to America and started our country by establishing colonies.

To me, the term 'Colonials' represents the invasion, conquest, and mass killing of the Indigenous peoples of Turtle Island. Overall, the term 'colonials' represents the explanation of the current state of the country and the world--it is a fractured, polarized, and extractive world at the expense of human dignity and equity.

silly (possibly racist at worst, outmoded at best) and not very relevant cartoonish character I have never felt any allegiance to.

Associated with the founding fathers.

A group of people who came together to over come obstacles.

original settlers of the North American continent

participants in colonialism

George Washington's original 13 colonies people.. rebels but slave owners

On its face, colonists, but I also can read themes of imperialism and nationalism from this moniker.

Members of or representing original colonists to America.

It's a reference to the white colonists who came to North America in the 1700s. I do see it as a racialized term.

colonists

It is a word attached appropriately to a special part of the history of the USA.

Colonials makes me think about colonization, which is how the US came to be.

The term comes from the Revolutionary army led by George Washington. It does not at all mean imperial. The opposed side, the British army might aptly be called the imperial army, attempting to turn the Americans into imperial subjects.

mascot for GW sports

Invaders, myth creators re: the founding of countries they conquered through force, thievery and acts of genocide or enslavement, murderers of culture, exploiters and White.

Colonials are people who used force and/or coercion to occupy and extract wealth from land where others had lived before them.

an historical reference to the inhabitants of the original colonies

European immigrants who dispossessed native inhabitants of their traditional tribal lands, generally through violence, superior technology and firepower, and, fueled by racist assumptions of European and Christian superiority, reshaped the Eastern seaboard (and the Americas) into political colonies of Europe's royalty, dispossessing Native peoples in North America and forcibly importing slaves from Africa to fuel a conquest-based economy.

It is a reference to George Washington as the leader of the American Colonists' rebellion against the tyrannical imperialist rule of the British Parliament.

Western Europeans who took over the Americas An original member of the US colonies... aka colonizer. Yes. Revolutionary war era European inhabitants of the 13 colonies. Excludes native americans. A resident of the early American colonies? A soldier in a British colonial regiment? I really have no idea, except that it sounds old, like a stately, well hewn bureau made of maple or cherry. It is a reference to the mindset and character of the main group of White British-connected society of the pre-revolutionary, colonial time in America. It is my impression and not derived by looking up the word in the dictionary. Residents of the original 13 colonies From the GW perspective it is a patriot during the colonial era in American history. From another perspective colonial is a derogatory term that indicates oppression and/or exploitation by a more powerful authority. People who live in America under British rule People of the colonies relating to the colonies or colonial period in U.S. history I am not familiar with the term George Washington's original affiliation I understand that GWs position in the past has been that "Colonials" is a reference to how the settlers in North America were subject to British colonial rule. From that perspective, the "Colonials" moniker could be understood as an ironic celebration of the settlers' ultimate victory against British colonial power. I have heard the argument made that, on this interpretation, the "Colonials" moniker is unobjectionable because it does not celebrate colonial power, but rather celebrates the victims of colonialism and their ultimate victory over their oppressors. However, this argument is unsatisfactory for two reasons. First, identifying the settlers in North America only as victims of colonial power (not as exercisers of colonial power) obscures the fact that they were also colonizers, and that their brand of settler colonialism displaced, oppressed, and killed Indigenous people. Given this, continued use of the moniker is an insult to Indigenous people (on whose land GW sits) and is an obstacle to properly recognizing (and compensating for) the wrongs done to them. Second, given the US's current geopolitical standing and its status as an imperial/neo-imperial power, the "Colonials" moniker is reasonably interpreted as a celebration of that power, regardless of whether that is what GW intends. Since we should condemn (and certainly not celebrate) colonial oppression at every opportunity, we should abandon the "Colonials" moniker. A group of people that colonized Colonizers or white colonial citizens. It's an exclusive term to me, "colonial" as opposed to "native".

In the GW context, the patriots who with George Washington helped to forge a new identity on the American continent that eventually helped create our country, which while not perfect, is able to strive for a more perfect union. The Colonials stood against the most powerful world empire at the

time, won freedom and a path to making sure that we could have a government by and for the people.

white colonials

What do you understand the term "Colonials" to mean?

18th century American British colonists.

American's first soldiers for independence

I believe that Colonials refers to the original American "colonies" that were involved in the American Revolution.

I understand what it probably was intended to mean when it was coined way back when. But, as a scholar of colonialism and imperialism, I simply think that it doesn't reflect well on the university to have teams with this name.

imperial legacy: colonialism and coloniality

It's the name of the GW collegiate athletics team

A representation of colonialism.

The European peoples who populated the U.S. centuries ago

Meant to link to George Washington's leadership presumably, but to me it means white (only)settlers, including slave owners. Not an inclusive term or one that even many white people would feel comfortable being associated with.

A person living in a colony in the context of colonialism.

Refers to the history of the area and specifically the roots of the university's namesake, George Washington, who was originally a Colonial officer in the British Army.

Those that conquered people

Someone who has colonized another land and is living there as a colonizer.

For me, the term invokes and seems to celebrate colonization--esp. the colonization of native Americans. The British colonized large parts of the world and ruled BIPOC people as their colonial masters. Hence "colonials." This term to refer to GW members feels misguided. It reminds me of how the British once ruled my ancestors, and it does so without criticizing the violence of colonialism. It is shameful, and we need to change it. As a person of color, I do not identify with it. All of Britain has already become culturally cognizant of the shameful and violent legacies of colonialism; not sure why we in America have not caught up with that. We must reject the uncritical embrace and celebration of colonialism inherent in this term. Language matters.

The Americans at the time of George Washington

There is a sense that the term is outdated and representative of ethnic violence, genocide and racism due to the time of settling the 'colonies' in the U.S.

Settlers

It reminds me of white people landing in non-European lands and giving diseases to the local people. I would guess that it was originally chosen for GW because of the association with the American Revolutionary War and George himself.

I thought it referred to the people that settled in the 13 original colonies during the fight for independence.

Those who fought in or supported the American side in the American Revolution

What do you understand the term "Colonials" to mean? Early settlers Officially colonizers but I interpret it to mean people who were around at the time George Washington was alive. His contemporaries. The people responsible for obtaining American independence from England A group of people who appropriate territories. A reference to colonial period in the US (where the colonialists were also slave holders) I assume it refers to pre-Revolutionary American colonists soldier a native or inhabitant of a colony. time to revisit GW's history I understand it to mean its primary dictionary definition: "a member or inhabitant of a colony" (https://www.merriam-webster.com/dictionary/colonial). In this instance, the colony means England's "American" colonies in what would become the United States. The major problem with the use of the moniker in this context and as a nickname is it normalizes colonialism as a cutesy, "old-time" reference to Washington and, supposedly, the Continental Army when, in fact, colonialism, in the aforementioned context, was constituted in (and still signals and reproduces today) indigenous genocide/land theft and African slavery, with the concomitant development of white supremacy in the service of slavery- and, later, segregationbased capitalism. This is why the name has to go. Architecture -- "colonials" are houses built in a certain way. Forgive me, I'm an English professor. Language is elastic. "Colonials" can mean many different things. A term that has come to have serious negative historical implications despite the original intent of those who coined the nickname. To me it means that a larger nation came into a geographic area and turned it into an extension of its empire. Colonials refers to the residents of the 13 colonies as of the time of George Washington's leadership to victory in the Revolution. I associate it with both "colonial times" and colonialism. I take it as an unfortunate and dated moniker that makes a vague gesture towards George Washington's time but which has come to signify racism, imperialism, and conquest as time has progressed. settlers that came from England to establish colonies in the new world that became the US of A. White male founding fathers and their class of similarly minded men. Yes Reflecting the early history of the U.S. and how the U.S. grew from being a British colony to seeking independence in the American Revolutionary

It draws connection between George Washington's service as commander of the Continental Army and the colonial status of British subjects in North America at the time of the Am Revolution.

In a US context, white European settlers (and their descendants), largely pre-1776

Vis-a-vis GWU, I understand it as a term to refer to the people who settled in this country before its formation. It can easily be perceived to celebrate colonialism (whether intentional or not), which is less than ideal, in my opinion.

A group of individuals exerting control over land that belonged to an/other group(s) and over those people

As in the colonial army of George Washington, commander and chief of the continental army.

In the context of GW, it once was a quaint way to refer to the folks who rebelled against the British in 1776. In the larger context, it reflects a brutal and exploitive system imposed by Europeans on indigenous people's around the world. As a faculty member, and an alum, I am embarrassed by the name, and try never to use it.

That it emerges from an identification with George Washington and the 18th century.

The people that worked hard to make a living in a new land, and fought off British tyranny and established a set of just and egalitarian ideals for this country, even if they themselves did not live up to them fully.

for me the meaning calls up contradictory distinct images—one positive of the 13 original colonies and at the same time a broader more negative interpretation of one who colonizes by taking away freedoms and independence from others. So, we often forget that in defining the word by the seemingly more positive image of Colonials, a people escaping the British rule and establishing a new land was accomplished at the expense of the native residents of this country. (colonizer)

Europeans who settled in North America, displacing indigenous peoples and introducing the slave trade

I am a professor of political science that teaches about colonial history. For me, "colonials" immediately brings to mind "the people in charge of the colonial state." Terms like "colonial health center" or "colonial army" are a bit jarring, as these are terms for institutions of the colonial state -- not institutions to be celebrating. In the American context, it might be that some equate colonials with people like George Washington or those who were fighting against the British (maybe?). But in this case, how about "revolutionary" or something like that.

It harkens back to a historic and racist past in which White settlers colonized Native American lands and people. Moreover, it references a historic period in which Black people were enslaved and denied basic civil and human rights granted to White people. As such, it is a dreadful reminder of the country's racist past and desire to maintain that inequity in the present.

It has a negative connotation for many and as such should be changed

Not really.

George Washington was a general in the colonial army fighting for independence from Britain.

Embodies a "colonial" mentality that is out of step with current perspectives.

Individuals who have colonized America's land, thus partaking in theft and creating systemic disadvantages for indigenous and marginalized individuals.

A reference to the Colonial period

When I hear the term I think of colonial americans who stole lands from native americans.

A historical reference to the antagonists to the British "loyalists" during the American War of Independence, now a designation associated with non-Indigenous people who colonized the unceded lands of the Indigenous people in the United States, as well as--more broadly--all non-Indigenous people who have colonized Indigenous people internationally

At one point, it was likely a well intentioned effort to incorporate the legacy of George Washington's contributions to our country as a revolutionary leader, president, and founding father. I'm faculty, and I'm no radical SJW, but when I started at GW a few years ago, I was surprised that the term was still used. It's a ridiculous thing to be shouting at sporting events. "Let's go, Colonials!" "Let's go [colonists intending to subjugate native peoples]!" There are many alternatives to conform to the history and pride of GW without the pejorative feeling of "colonial." How about the GW Revolutionaries? This isn't rocket science.

A group that forms together to create an organization. Whether it be organizing a new colony or forming a new team.

I understand it to refer to the system of colonialism and exploitation that, well, built this country.

It highlights the linkage between the university and the early history of the United States, including GW's namesake

The country's forefathers

A group from a unified origin, usually a country, seeking to extend or retain its authority over other people or territories, generally with the aim of economic dominance.

it refers to the settler colonists who occupied the area

Settlers of the original 13 colonies

Whether it means "people who were colonized" or "colonizers", it celebrates a history of colonialism and conquest that should not be celebrated.

Subjects under imperial rule.

Founders of America

I'm french, so the first sense is an army of local levies serving a foreign, colonialist power.

Yes

peeople who settled at the Potomac River falls.

Colonial army in the Revolutionary War

Historical reference to early US settlers

What it in fact means is those who settled and founded America, who deserve eternal honor.

Residents and leaders of the 13 colonies pre-American independence

In this instance, people who lived in the North American British colonies and defeated the British in the Revolutionary War.

To me this means people colonizing other people, with or without their consent. Given US history and the atrocities that went with colonization-genocide, hostile take over, etc.--indigenous people were wiped out or removed from their land by the colonists. "Colonials" were those people of the colonies responsible for what happened to the Native people.

colonizer

Immigrants from Britain who settled in the colonies in North America in search of a better life prior to the founding of the United States. Some did great harm (e.g., supporting slavery, violence towards native Americans) and others great good (e.g., rebelling from monarchy to found the United States). I associate the term "Colonials" mostly with the good they did in aiming for a representative democracy. The moniker was never ever intended to celebrate the evils of British colonialism.

American colonists who fought against British colonizers to achieve independence.

I know a colonial is someone who has lived in a colony but I think most people think colonials is tied to colonialism.

The first Americans who fought in the war for freedom from England

To be one of the first colonizers

A "colonial" is an often unwitting agent of empire. A colonial is not a colonizer, who commands an enterprise of settlement and exploitation. Nor is a colonial a colonized person, who suffers the violence of colonialism. A "colonial" is instead the member of the dominating or settling group who goes to the colony in search (usually) of a better life, and despite their affinity with the powerful colonizers, has relatively little agency in the colonial project. The colonizer wants the colonial to think that they are on the same side, and the colonial wants to think that their exploitation and violence has purpose. In this sense, "colonial" might be a suitable moniker for a school that often produces willing conspirators in grand imperial designs. But it does not reflect our ideals.

White settlers taking land from indigenous people -- whether in North America in eighteenth century or much of the world in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries

By historical context and most definitions it suggests people who actively displaced indigenous Americans and expropriated their land. Nothing to be proud of.

This is a traditional name for the European "colonists" who "colonized" this land and in the process displaced the natives.

Negative connotation. Makes me think of colonization.

At GWU, a weird little man with a tricorn hat. In general, the people sent by an empire-building country to acquire someone else's land by occupation and domination.

it refers to the Colonial Army, led by George Washington, during the Revolutionary War. I also understand the negative connotation the word has based on a world history of genocide and slavery.

People of the Colonial era / pre Revolutionary War

In the context of the school, I take it to mean the first Americans; however, I understand the more general definition of people who colonized other countries causing sensitivity

Founders

the individuals who settled in America and then fought for independence against Britain. Both sides of my family did so.

A reference to the country's origins.

Members of a group of settler colonists. Settler colonialism has a central goal of the removal and erasure of Indigenous peoples in order to take the land for use by settlers in perpetuity. This process is supported by an imperial power that views the settlers as racially superior to the indigenous people. The term is thus inherently a celebration of genocide and white supremacy.

The heroes who settled the country and then did battle to free America from the yoke of oppression, led by George Washington, after whom the school is named.

It doesn't mean much to me. I assume it is a direct relation to the namesake, George Washington, and the American colonies/original colonials. It also calls to mind the idea of colonizer - which for me has a very negative connotation.

Related to the Continental Army, which George Washington commanded. While officials residents in the U.S. Colonies were called "Colonists" not "Colonials," I do not perceive a vast difference. That said, I am aware that the word "Colonials" tends to evoke notions of invading armies/people who were set on "colonizing" other countries/peoples. Frankly, I would prefer GW's moniker become "Continentals" because then it would more directly relate to Washington (as commander-in-chief) and appropriately evoke the history of that time -- whereby those on the "continent" rebelled against (declared their freedom from) England.

a proud American who lived in the original 13 colonies

A member of the 13 colonies that didn't want to pay taxes to England and as a result fought a war of succession. I believe there exists a distinction between Colonials vs Colonists

I read it in terms of 'colonialism' so am not a proponent of this moniker

Those who colonized the U.S. unfortunately did so in ways that laid claims to the land of Native Peoples often by treaties that have not been honored or by force. Further harm was done to many native people eventhrogh the forcible assimilation of Indigenous youth through institutions of higher education.

Individuals that are part of a colony

People from Britain in North America before the US independence

Reference to inhabitant(s) of the American colonies, such as when the 13 colonies were established, such persons involved in the fight for freedom from British rule, and such persons who helped pioneer what is now the United States the most powerful, wealthy and influential democratic society in the history of the Earth.

Somehow related to a colony. Maybe originally due to colonization of North American continent, but later also an independent word for the architecture etc. style.

It carries many meanings--that's the problem. The 13 colonies were colonies of England. Many of us honor the colonials for changing their status and becoming independent of England. But, at root, they were the colonizers of land that belonged to indigenous peoples.

Slave owners

In this context, I interpret it as meaning people of English descent who reside in North America (in the 17th or 18th century) and consider themselves British subjects.

What do you understand the term "Colonials" to mean? Related to George Washington Members of the original 13 colonies, but I can see it as "settlers", or invaders as well Members of the military of the original 13 colonies of the US. Initial settlers in the U.S. Subjects of the English Crown who resided in one of the 13 English Colonies from 1607 or, perhaps, 1585, until declared independence in 1776. For the team name, it seems to be a celebration of a specific period of time, namely the idea of what the 17th and 18th-century was for people like George Washington (dominance and expansion for the English-descendent elite) Odd name because GW lead the fight AGAINST being a colonist!!! The army commanded by General George Washington Colonists either (a) the people who lived in the early U.S. colonies, or (b) someone who colonizes more generally (for better or worse) The Americans that overthrew the British control of this country. In general? White men who claimed others (land, people, property) as theirs for whatever "higher" purpose they wanted Colonials were the populations in the colonies of England in North America. There eventually rebelled against England in the war for independence. I understand the terms as referring to citizens who live within a colonized territory; disenfranchised citizens, people lacking their own nation and government. In the context of GW I think the moniker intends to conjure the image of General George Washington leading the fight to free America from colonial/tyrannical rule, but I don't think George Washington, the person, and his ilk appreciated being "colonials." So it seems contradictory as well as offensive to people who live as "colonials" now, for instance many in Puerto Rico consider themselves to be colonized by the US. A group of people sent to a distant land to establish a supply chain, usually by force or coercion. Derogatory, inaccurate, outdated colonizer or settler

In general, a segment of people living in an area that are connected and originate from somewhere else. In regards to GWU, my understanding is it represents the people inhabiting the north and south eastern parts of the North American continent that originally came from other countries prior to the American Revolution.

Someone who lived in American colonies prior to the American Revolutionary War

Americans fighting British rule

White settlers and their descendants who arrived from Europe and assumed control of the United States from native populations.

original american settlers as well as patriots

some vague reference to Washington that in reality is not based in historical accuracy or factual relationships

Plymouth Rock people.

People who formed the colonies?

Those who carry out colonization and advance colonialism; those who lived in colonies (which were erected as part of colonization); those who lived during the Colonial period (during colonization of the US)

Originally meant to refer to American colonists, however this term has extremely negative associations in our post-colonial world.

Early settlers of the colonies

As people who fought against the monarchy.

At first, I thought of those who wanted freedom from England. But the more I learn, the more colonials is linked to colonialism and its exploitation and violence

originally a person who lives in the colonies, then by default applied to mena people who have a strong positive affinity with a colonial system of government, including slavery and exploitation of indigenous groups and other people by a pseudo-philosophy and religious belief that some people are inherently superior to others and have thus a natural right to rule over others.

It references a group of individuals that have colonized a region, most likely displacing or eradicating the original inhabitants.

Eurocentric, it's not very offensive, but it's not inclusive. Overlaps with oppression.

People who settled America before the founding of the U.S.

Domination, subjugation, and oppression of indigenous persons and communities often with criminalization of indigenous ways of being and belief systems

A colonial is a citizen in one of the original 13 colonies. They were explorers and immigrants to the North American continent and began to colonize the area, establish a form of leadership/government, and plan a society.

White people who conquered the land belonging (now) to the US, and began colonies.

people from one culture who settle in another culture for their own gain

Person who lived in America in the period preceding the enactment of the Constitution, of any race, religion, or national origin.

Settlers and their descendants who rose up against the British crown while repressing first-nations peoples and building an economy with enslaved labor; then imposed their own system of power to benefit the elite

Country's founders; First European settlers in the US; First (non-Native) Americans.

Nickname for GW Sports teams

An innocuous university nickname, a reference to the pre-revolutionary war colonists in America, to a lesser extent a rarely used catchall phrase referring to those in history who have been part of colonialist governments and policies

The brave and resourceful men and women who forged a new nation that has become a beacon for freedom and equality around the world.

Founders of the United States

Those who occupy and take control over other societies through domination and exploitation.

either referring to colonial Americans, or to colonizers- actually, they are the same thing

People who arrive in a place and found a colony

People inhabiting the 13 original colonies of the current US prior to the Revolution and subject to British rule. My understanding includes slaves and native Americans living in the colonies.

Quoting the Declaration of Independence: "...We, therefore, the Representatives of the united States of America, in General Congress, Assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the Name, and by Authority of the good People of these Colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these United Colonies are, and of Right ought to be Free and Independent States"

Members of a colonial society

a bit of pseudo-tradition linked to our first president

I associate it with colonialism and the attempts of white European countries to establish complete dominance over indigenous people. It is white supremacy by another name.

Not really sure and it's a hard name to cheer for, so hoping they come up with something better!

in relation to George Washington, it refers to the founders of our nation

to me it's offensive - everything 'colonial' is offensive

Those who colonized the United States and took land from Native Americans.

Revolutionary war insurrectionaries

I understand that to refer to the rebels against British rule during the Colonial era. Having said that, most people see the name without context, and the current reading of it would be either as colonizers or as those subjugated as colonizers. It does not translate well in the 21st Century and is overdue for revision.

The group of people that were part of the first colony's in what became the U.S.

violent takeover of land

White people during colonial times (1700s-early 1800s in US).

It's impossible to separate "colonials" from "colonialism", and in order to be inclusive, we really shouldn't be harkening back to a day when our brothers and sisters of color were systematically killed and oppressed by white monarchies.

As a noun, this would mean inhabitants of a colony. However, it could also be interpreted to mean individuals who seek to implement colonialism - that is, extending rule and/or authority over weaker individuals and territories.

Someone who lives in a colony, if you're looking for a dictionary definition. But the connotation certainly isn't a positive one given what many early colonists in the U.S. did to the indigenous people to whom this land belonged.

Colonials = Colonizers, which means someone who takes another's (often a group of indigenous people) land as their own, devaluing the culture(s) of BIPOC people across the globe and centralizing white culture/forcing white culture to be the dominant culture of the area/taking political control of the area. Slavery and genocide commonly went hand-in-hand with colonization. Colonials encompasses all of this to me.

It is a term referring to a group of people who have colonized another group of people and their land. More specifically as it relates to GW - it refers

The individuals responsible for colonizing America

A colonial is an individual who takes over land/territories. Colonizers sometime impose their practices on indigenous people.

The original army to colonize the territory that would become the United States.

Colonizers who defeat other opponents but "colonizing" them. In any context, this is highly inappropriate. This is particularly inappropriate given the history of the US and the displacement and massacre of Native Americans. Furthermore, GW is now a very diverse University with students from all over the world whose countries have fought for independence. The name "Colonials" no longer reflects the values and background of the students, staff, faculty and people of GW.

I assume it was an attempt to reference George Washington's army, but my understanding is that "Continentals" would be more accurate.

Original settler of USA

The term colonials is used to describe people who inhabited land without the permission of its residents through violent behavior such as conflict, wars, battle, and enslavement. Colonials represents the term used for settlers in the early years of the country.

I understand that "Colonials" refers to the colonists who came to North America from Europe and would later fight in the revolutionary war.

I attribute it to the founding of the nation-- the 13 original colonies and the American Revolutionary War, not the practice of colonialism--- the subjugation and pillaging of native peoples and lands. I can see how my perspective as a white male might inform my answer, and it is my sincere hope that we can resolve this issue with the least amount of heartache. GW has had to deal with a lot lately.

In my view, the term is inherently connected to the heritage of American history, that include people of all races, regardless of how they arrived here. At one point or another, all of us have been colonists of this New World, willing or unwilling, including those to whom we refer as 'Native Americans', who arrived here some 12000-30000 years ago during the Ice Age by crossing from Asia over the Bering Strait land bridge. I see no issue with the term and it doesn't hurt my feelings.

citizens of a colony

Someone who exploits others for their own gain and then justifies the exploitation by using false ideology.

People from the Colonial Era

An attempt to represent George Washington and the revolutionary army in a mascot

Objectively - colonists are invaders who claim rights to resources by force and colonials are the reapers of that invasion. As Americans, colonials were the first of us.

colonizers

The white-washed term for the settlers that forced colonization of the Indigenous peoples already living in the Americas.

Someone who lived in a colony. I've heard that it had negative connotations during colonial times, and it's also not necessarily a time period that we should celebrate given the atrocities committed by white settlers to Native Americans and African slaves.

A group of people who benefited from the colonization of land and resources from local indigenous peoples which allowed them to form colonies that further established their power, dominance, and independence from both Britain and the indigenous peoples around them. Such a deliberate, divisive, and inequitable action still has ramifications today economically, politically, spiritually, and I would argue ethically.

In the context of GW, to me it means an American colonist. However America was colonized at the expense of indigenous people and black slaves.

I'd define it as "People who formed a colony". It summons the image of a militaristic and imperial system, seen in for example the colonization of India or Africa by the British.

Some lame bullshit that tries to hearken back to some more noble history, but is really just about a bunch of white nationalists committing genocide against natives.

Colonials is a term that ties back to the original English/British settlers and can be seen as a negative term in the same vain as Christopher Columbus. These settlers, both pushed the natives off there land and a lot of the rich had slaves. The colonials were also still subject to British rule.

Apart from the literal definition, I believe the term, as a moniker for GWU's athletic teams, pays a great deal of respect to those early settlers/explorers who essentially created America as we know it. It means that we haven't forgotten where we come from, or why we're even here to begin with.

The Colonials are the first people to settle the area that came over from England. Their history is complex and involves genocide, however intentional it may have been aside. It is a representation of the settlement of Europeans into North America formally.

founders of current government system in the US who replaced the indigenous population.

a group retaining its authority over other people or territories, generally with the aim of economic dominance

Colonists from the Revolutionary War era who fought for independence

I attribute it to colonization and the expansion of Europe in the 18th and 19th centuries. Which has a lot of negative connotations.

People who colonized other countries. People like Columbus and the British.

The Founders

Colonial describes something that is related to the original 13 colonies that formed America.

Colonials = colonizers

People who leave their home countries to form new settlements in other parts of the world. Often this involves over time unjustly subjugating the native peoples already living in the colonized land to be ruled over by the colonists and their home countries.

While the term is closely related to it's less popular term "colonialism," I (personally) don't feel offense in the term as it clearly relates to the namesake of the University. I think when viewing historical names and figures, you can only erase so much. I feel changing the moniker would result in a hollow victory that changes nothing. I feel the University does (with considerable effort) a great job in helping to make an inclusive environment and that is where the real change starts. There is certainly a time and place for name changes, I just don't feel this is an important one.

The colonists who then fought for freedom and became the US

White people who colonized lands of others.

GW's mascot, and also a reference to the oppressive system of colonialism

Representing the colonial army

Proud acknowledgement of the founders of our great United States of America (colonial army) not colonization and their sacrifice to allow students to attend this great institution.

In general it relates to colonization and individuals/institutions/societies that sought to colonize certain regions and peoples mostly by exerting control and dominance often by forceful means for self benefit.

Glorification of the people who colonized "new" lands that were already inhabited.

Colonials could refer to founding members of the United States or it could refer to culture appropriation and taking land

The Europeans who settled in America after it was discovered by Christopher Columbus. To me, it is also referring to the people who lived in the 13 original colonies, which later became the first 13 states in the new United States of America. This name has historical significance to all Americans.

Colonial-era people prior to the American Revolutionary War; people who were colonized; people subjected to living in a colony

This is complicated. I understand that GW uses the Colonial moniker to signify the US colonists who rebelled against British rule. However, the term "colonial" is tied up with all manner of bad connotations, including in the US where it is linked to the extermination and subjugation of Native Americans, slavery and more. Even if not intended, it is a term that carries so much emotional pain and baggage that replacing it is a good idea.

I tie "Colonials" to colonialism in general and believe it has extremely negative connotations tied to it. Colonialism is responsible for innumerable human rights atrocities across the globe and I don't like that the Colonial Moniker is associated with GW.

In this regard this person would serve to dominate another individual or territory in order to strengthen their governments power. This could involve thrusting religious, economic, linguistics, and other beliefs upon an indigenous person that are likely in disagreement to their established to their established systems.

Colonials means to me the people who came to a "new" land (America) and claimed the land as their own. Not to mention that these folks are also ones who contributed to the problematic upbringing and continuation of slavery and the oppression of various identity groups.

The term is based in historical times and not the present. It brings to mind the original 13 colonies, the Revolutionary War and historical figures such as the country's founders.

I understand it to mean a group of people, backed by a government or company, that entered sovereign nations to set up new governments in order to extract natural and labor resources from those nations. There were often without the consent of the native people of colonized territory and colonizers often used tactics that put indigenous communities at odds with each other to manufacture an outcome that was profitable only to the colonizers. GW uses "Colonials" to mean the group of people our founding fathers, George Washington included, represented in America's fight for independence. But those men also helped promote the structures that led to the genocide of the indigenous Native Americans and destruction of the preexisting Free Nations that were located within the US borders. These men also promoted the Transatlantic Slave Trade, which resulted in the forced enslavement, relocation, and murder or hundreds of thousands of African people. Just because the founding fathers or "Colonials" represent liberty and freedom to one group of people doesn't mean they represent it to our entire student body. Considering our University doesn't have a great sports culture under which we can rally around a mascot, the choice to rename "Colonials" seems obvious. Universities with larger sports teams have changed their mascot names in recent history (Marquette changed their mascot to the Golden Eagles after criticisms that their original one was hurtful to native communities in Wisconsin). Let's follow Marquette's lead rather than Dan Snyders, please.

What colonizers around the world have done throughout history is most often NOT positive and have done more harm then good. American colonists White settlers / enslavers in the Americas. I view "colonials" as representing the people who founded the United States of America, its culture and its institutions. Settler A person who goes into another person's land and takes it, often by force, with negative implications for the people already living there. People who were colonists. Holding power over territories and people. The mascot of GWU. In reference to the 13 colonies. White Europeans who killed the Native Americans, changed the existing culture, and exploited natural resources. Taken from a historical perspective, it refers to the original inhabitants of the 13 Colonies that later became the United States of America. People who took everything from the indigenous folks. Historically, colonials are those from one country who forcefully stole land and ways of life from others in another place. There are very few examples of colonies taken without use of force. Early settlers, Revolutionary activists Referring to the Continental Army and related leaders/revolutionaries of the American Revolution. But the term "Colonial" in our globalized presentday context carries additional historical, contextual, and political meanings that might not make it readily clear which "Colonials" the GW moniker refers to.

This is a very loaded term. To me it means a team of colonizers which highlights the history of the dominant culture and undermines the history of the already established peoples and tribes that were assimilated to Euro-centric values and beliefs.

"Colonials" at GW is meant to reference the US colonial period under British rule in the 16th-18th centuries. However the term colonial has a lot of negative baggage. Being a colonial can mean that someone is provincial or backward. In a more modern context, it means being a second class citizen who lacks the same rights and privileges as the ruling class, or being oppressed. The colonial is typically a different race than those controlling the country, so there is a racist connotation also.

It is GW's sports moniker

The term is intended to conjure the soldiers who fought alongside George Washington in the Revolutionary War. GW led the Continental Army, not the Colonial Army. The moniker actually describes what that army was fighting against -- being a colony, subject to the power of outside (conquering) others. This alone should disqualify the name.

The people who were citizens of the colonies that eventually became the United States. It seems to be similar to "colonists."

I associate the term with colonization (i.e. the economic, religious, linguistic, and cultural domination over others).

Europeans that colonialized Africa and the Americas, which in some cases was brutal.

I understand "Colonials" to be our nickname, with it representing the original colonial settlers and the origins of our country. The colors of the "Colonial Army" were Buff and Blue, and so it stands to reason that our university would have a nickname and colors to reflect it's general, George Washington.

Colonials typically referred to as white people during a period of time when slavery and racism were also in place.

It is a term that represents racism and ethnic violence occurring when America was colonized.

I was never sure.

I view it as a reference to the "13 original colonies." At one point, America was not America, but was a collection of British colonies, until the drive for independence. The entire northeast of the country takes pride in that history, and the "colonials" moniker to me means a callback to that history — that we were once colonies and are now a united, independent country instead. I do not think that the things British colonists did or did not do should be controversial.

Non-native inhabitants of what is currently the United States during the colonial period.

I understand it to imply "settler" or "first persons," which is incorrect.

Founders of our country, trailblazers.

Colonials in this case I believe to represent the European settlers living in the colonies of England that became the first 13 states

The first people of European descent to live in what is now the United States of America.

A colonial (in the US) is a settler of the original 13 US Colonies who were seeking religious freedom. Colonials in the US were the founders, revolutionaries and citizens of the USA. I think all those are synonymous.

those who colonize

Literal. In this context, people who lived in the British Colonies of what ultimately ended up being the U.S., circa 1750-1776.

White colonists who settled in the Americas and fought the Revolutionary War.

To me, colonials refers more so to the colonials (colonists) and George Washingtons colonial army. However, I understand how colonialism can be offensive to students from locations that may have been colonies of other countries.

I know it's not meant to be associated with colonialism, but that's what comes to mind

I think of the colonizers that came to the US and took over land and killed indigenous people.

Original inhabitants from England and Europe.

Reference to European immigrants overrunning existing nations on the North American continent.

1) Colonials may refer to people living in the United States in the 18th century, and US residents may still be called "colonials" as a slang term in the UK. 2) Colonials is also a derogative term used by indigenous peoples in regions or countries that experienced imperialism. Specifically British imperialism where native and indigenous cultures were erased and the colonizing culture was forced.

A pride point of the United States. As Americans, we were once colonized by the British, and we fought to gain our independence. I think this situation is overblown. I don't interpret Colonials to be offensive. Although I think that some sports team names are outwardly offensive ("Indians", "Redskins"), I don't think that this is one of them. I'm also a graduate student at the university, and hold the same perspective as a student.

Reference to Americans who supported and fought in the American revolution

The people from England who settled the US.

White colonizers who owned slaves and stole Native land.

Mascot named and modeled after a member of the Continental Army from the American Revolutionary War

University mascot referring to the US's Founding Fathers

When I think of "Colonials" I think of revolutionaries fighting against the tyranny of the crown but understanding that there are other perspectives that include the "Colonials" to be oppressive to the Native Americans and enslaved Africans.

Referring to the initial group of European settlers who colonized what is now the eastern united states.

Colonials refers to colonialism, which I associate with the repression and genocide of the Native tribes that inhabited the land that Europeans "discovered" in 1492.

It means the wave of British pioneers that settled in America for England.

In a GW context I know it to be the mascot for GW -- especially the athletic teams. Colonials does not mean colonizer, but the colonial founders of the nation that became the U.S. It represents the people who fought the British, and helped establish the original colonies into an independent country.

Colonizers of Turtle Island- associated with murder, rape, genocide, theft, etc.

Represents the 13 colonies. The formation of our nation. A group of individual colonies that came together to form the US.

The nation's founding denizens

A reference to forced ownership of land by a foreign country

Early settlers, colonists.

It refers to those who settled in the early "colonies" before the Revolutionary War. These were the same people who fought for freedom from British rule.

The people in the revolutionary war who fought for the country's independence.

Homage to George Washington, our university's namesake.

Colonizing forces

The ordinary men and women who--through blood, sweat, tears, trial, and turmoil--established the first systems of representative democracy in this New World before the Revolutionary War. More importantly, Colonials identifies the men and women who fought--and in thousands of instances were killed or wounded in action--in the Continental Army, Navy, and Marines during the Revolution. Their actions and sacrifices led directly to the establishment of America as a free and independent nation. To this day, because of their brace and selfless deeds, America remains for all people "a city upon a hill."

Europeans who pillaged and stole land/culture/lives from the indigenous people. It's a term used to make these invaders feel better about themselves because "colonizing" and "discovering" sounds better than invading, pillaging, enslaving, displacing, and killing thousands of people wasnt catchy enough.

Colonial means the person who does colonizing. In the context of the Americas (including Canada, USA, all of south america), it means white Europeans who pillaged, raped, stole the land of Indigenous peoples, then started importing African people to enslave them in inhumane conditions. There is nothing positive about that term. The first time I heard the chant, I was on campus, and my heart stopped. It was hard to contain my shock that this negative word was used as a positive cheer. It would be like using "Nazis" as a cheerlead term. It's very gauche.

It's an unfortunately common but outdated term used as a mascot at GW and elsewhere but the fraught and violent history of colonialism has rendered the term unacceptable as a rallying point of any sort.

Colonial Americans

Non-indigenous individuals who lived in North America, with contextual relevance to those who lived in present-day USA who fought for independence against Great Britain in the late-18th century.

It is in reference to the residents of the 13 American colonies and their successful rebellion against British rule.

1967 Version: Colonials were (and are) people seeking opportunities not available at home (U.K), fleeing a system of government over which they had little/no control, willing to sacrifice today to achieve their goals tomorrow. Overall - this could be a good description of GW students. 2020 Version: I would hope the interpretation I showed is still valid. I don't believe we should turn our backs on the original (imperfect) colonials in order to satisfy what could be a transient idea. Note: my first dormitory assignment was "Calhoun Hall". I know the history of Calhoun and do not disagree with the name change to "Lafayette" - however, while Lafayette did not support slavery, he was also not a perfect man. That he had a title of Marques could be seen as "elitist", etc. In other words, the myriad list of individual preferences, when combined, present a "demand" that cannot be satisfied without "offending" someone. Be careful with this process or you may face another demand to rename the student body because some find the new name to be objectionable based on interpretation of then-acceptable standards. Political correctness stifles free speech.

A person who lived in, or during the time of, the original 13 colonies of America.

Founding fathers of the country

a term of honor, respect to Patriots who fought off the oppressive British. A great name.

American revolutionaries, but sounds like "colonists"

The men and women who founded this country, fought for our freedom, and created the greatest country in the world.

I understand it to mean a people who were subjects to a ruler in a far away kingdom. These Colonials rose up against this ruler in a fight for their freedom and values. In terms of GWU, the Colonials have a fighting spirit against those that try to oppress them.

The people who colonized America.

Those who colonized a new frontier seeking freedom. Adventurers, people of strength. Sounds like a good mascot to me.

It references the time when America existed as the 13 colonies under Britain.

Colonials refers to the Colonists who fought the British for the independence of our great nation. The idea of changing the moniker now to appease a small group of sniveling social justice wannabes deeply offends me.

Someone from the era during which the USA was a British colony.

The colonists who lived in North America that fought for freedom against Great Britain

A nod to the colonizers who founded the U.S.

I'm originally from Kenya. We were colonized by the British. From what I read, see and hear, it was brutal and insubordinating. As a former British colony, still tied to the commonwealth, Colonials, to me is not a very welcome term. I always think hard and more than twice before I write or pronounce it when supporting my alma mater. It's hard to display "pride" as a black person of African origin using the term "Colonial". It doesn't sound right. It's a the wrong term for me. It's full of pain.

The term denotes the people who emigrated to North America for a variety of reasons, including economic, religious and political liberty.

I understand it as a reference to the political/cultural status of the American colonies that eventually became the United States before and during the Revolutionary War. However, it also directly references and romanticizes the act of colonization, which had horrific human rights consequences that are still with us today.

Colonials are people who came to the land that is now known as the U.S. from Europe to take it from its native people.

People from a different place who arrive at a new place and take it over as their own. Often in history, colonization has occurred on land already occupied by native people, and the colonizers have caused the native people societal and/or physical harm.

British subjects living in any UK colony.

It is a reference to the Continental Army led by George Washington, during the American Colonies' war of independence.

The term is synonymous with "colonizers," the groups of white men who took over native and already inhabited lands, usually by force, and displaced or killed the inhabitants of those regions while claiming those lands as their own.

I think it's less about the exact definition and more about the connotation of the term, that being said the exact definition is also offensive as it relates to colonialism the policy and practice of a power in extending control over people or territories (ie how native Americans were treated as well as black Americans)

A person who steals the land of and controls a group of people he determines to be weak. A colonial is typically a white person who steals, rapes, murders, enslaves black, brown, or indigenous persons.

the founding fathers

I understand the term Colonials to mean British colonists who occupied and took over Native land in the modern-day US during the era of the 13 colonies in the 17th century.

Founders of the country. People who came from the UK and established colonies as the beginning of the formation of the US PRIOR to the American revolution.

Reference to the period prior to the American Revolution. A colonial is one who inhabited the colonies prior to 1776.

"Colonials" is a historical term used when ruling powers would inhabit and use resources to their benefit. Not just a Western phenomenon - all cultures had some aspect of dominating weaker societies around them for resources.

Celebrating those that fought the American Revolution War

Historically in the Americas, people from Europe who came to settle and their descendants during the period prior to the formation of independent governments (i.e., before establishment of the USA).

I understand the term Colonials to represent the Colonial Army, the group that fought for this country's independence from Britain and defended the freedoms that EVERY single one of us enjoy today.

I understand that in the GW context, it refers to the early American colonies in which George Washington lived. However, I think colonial has a broader and more negative meaning, both in the US and the world. GW is a university with a global view, and I believe the mascot should reflect that

It refers to the individuals living in the original 13 states prior to securing independence from Great Britain.

Superficially, someone associated with GWU. Otherwise, people who came to the predecessor of the USA to colonize it, subjugating the native population and enslaving blacks from Africa, all in the purported attempt to create a nation separate from England.

I associate it mostly with sports mascots, but to me, it means someone who was patriotic and fought for the independence of the US from Britain, which allows us to have many of the freedoms we enjoy today.

It represents the North American "Colonists" and commemorates George Washington's command of the Continental Army as they fought for American Independence AGAINST a distant, oppressive imperial power.

Early residents establishing the foundation of our country. People living in the colonies.

Two-fold: 1. Colonial as the European colonizer of native American lands. 2. Colonial as the early settler who fought for independence from Great Britain

A shortened version of the Colonial Army - the American troops during the Revolutionary War.

For me, Colonials mean people from Europe who colonialized the Americans and stole land from the native/indigenous people. In fact, they labeled the native people as savages when they tried to fight for their land. This is the beginning of the U.S. white supremacy. To add insult to injury, colonials casted themselves as heroes in the history of the U.S. rather than telling the true story of their behavior against the indigenous people. Colonials instituted the racist laws that have been negative and unspoken part of American history. The impact and legacy of the colonials is white supremacy.

A reference to the early settlers of this land before nationhood.

Those who fought for independence from the United Kingdom.

Yes

I believe the GW term/mascot is meant to be nostalgic of early settlers, but the reality is colonials bring devastation to original/first peoples and, like in the US and South Africa, create tiers of people to uphold their power.

The inhabitants of the original British colonies that demanded and fought for their independence under the leadership of, among others, George Washington.

Those who established the original British colonies, seeking freedom from oppression and religious persecution.

Colonials are, to me, actors of a colonial enterprise and enactors of colonial violence and imperialism.

a nod to George Washington

Historically, those who came from Western Europe to explore and resettle in parts of Asia, Africa and the Americas. This includes problematic elements but not exclusively so.

Brave, tough, resourceful, discovery-oriented pioneers, forging innovative (anti-monarchial and pro-individual) political and intellectual foundations for freedom in North America.

I think of it as a moniker for George Washington and the first settlers that built the colonies, but it also indicates stealing land, resources, and other negative impacts from native tribes that are the true Americans.

Reference to the period of George Washington, for which the school is named

It seems to suggest a bygone era of America, when the US was under colonial rule. It's referring to the colony, not the states. George Washington was not a Colonial.

I think of it as a term to indicate settlers that came to North America in the 1600s and 1700s. These people are not people we should be honoring. They were slave-holding and they led massacres ending the lives of Native Americans.

In GW context, a representative of the American colonial period

I think it's a nonsense word. Colonists were those that came to America, while Colonial sounds like something your doctor recommends getting when you turn 45.

Colonials refers to the people that lived in the 13 British colonies during the 1700s. These same colonials later fought for their independence from Britain and became the United States of America.

Refers to the colonial settlers in the U.S. during George Washington's time. 'Colonials' connotes 'white settler', it's time for it to change.

Independence, freedom, American greatness, equality

I understand "Colonials" to mean people who colonized an area of land in which Indigenous peoples lived. In the case of George Washington and his counterparts as colonials - and most other colonizers in history - they colonized land that was not theirs, was already occupied, and was a fight to take from the people living there. America has a bad history of not properly acknowledging and atoning past atrocities (e.g. slavery, Trail of Tears, Jim Crow laws, prejudice against women, etc.). Getting rid of the Colonial moniker is a step in the right direction, in terms of removing the positivity around past colonization, recognizing the 'Founding Fathers' had MANY flaws that we should not celebrate, and removing pride from the idea of bullying someone out of their homeland.

Honoring the 13 original colonies that predated the formation of the United States.

In this circumstance, I assume "colonials" refers to European settlers establishing control over another country

Originally, I thought Colonial just meant early settler, but after doing research I found out that Colonials propagated cruelty and myths about Africans and people of color not just in America, but globally wherever white men established new territories.

The American colonists who rebelled against British rule in the American Revolution

Those who were colonized by the British in colonial times and who fought for independence in the American revolution.

To me, "colonials" is directly linked with "colonialism" (because... it's the same word). The colonizers of America

Historically, a resident colonist and a supporter of settling occupied lands through colonialism (imperialism). Colonialism has a long, racist history that still negatively affects everyone today; particularly Black and Indigenous people and communities of color.

It is in reference to the first Europeans that arrived in North America to create various, interdependent settlements. Colonials is obviously also a reference to colonialism, which of course bears significant meaning in so much as that it represents any level of disruption, interruption, or eradication of indigenous peoples and culture by an outside group looking to permanently commandeer land and resources.

Us, as a university family.

Those who come from another nation to build their own society in another. Often means usurping a native culture. Often romanticized in the U.S. as the country was founded by colonists, but the toll on native cultures is rarely discussed in this context.

Individuals who seek to establish a colony

People who resisted British rule from afar.

The people who came to America from England in the 1700s and, prior to the revolution, the people that occupied the American colonies.

Outdated reference to colonial era, refers to a settler exercising control over a foreign place through violence. Note that George Washington, our namesake, was born in N. America and arguably not even a colonial from a certain perspective.

What do you understand the term "Colonials" to mean?

Colonials has had different meanings to me. While in undergrad at GW, it felt archaic and more like a forced connection or historical reference with little to do with the academic mission or present day institution. As a former study abroad student and staff member, it felt particularly inappropriate and insensitive to the international community that suffers under the still felt effects of colonialism. As a grad student at GW, the term is completely out of touch with the university's recent diversity, equity and inclusion work and value of diversity. My grad school courses focused on decoloniality and often taught theoretical approaches that would heavily critique the use of the term as a university moniker. We need to do better.

Persons who fought in the Revolutionary War against the British.

In the context of GWU, the term is representative of the colonial period of America, when there were 13 original colonies formed from British settlements. These "colonies" eventually separated from Great Britain and after the Revolutionary War established the foundation for the United States of America. This usage of "Colonials" is in no way meant to be associated with the global colonialism that was in place at the time and certainly not with the oppression that often resulted from such activity. To combine the two is neither factual nor logical. A colonial in America evokes the image of the courageous Minute Man who left family and farm to defend the citizens against foreign invaders, the very wise founding fathers who framed a Constitution to form the basis of this new country, and of course, Gen. George Washington, the first and wise leader of the new nation. This era of "counter-culture" should not become a weapon to falsely destroy what those that came before us worked hard to establish. Attributing modern ideas and fancies to the past is not only immoral, but unethical. I would bet that most of those calling for this moniker change are idealistic young people that have been mislead by a few radicals who seek to eat away at the fabric of America.

A person who came to spread European ideals, often through force.

While a reference to the 13 original colonies that fought for independence under the leadership of namesake Gen George Washington, Colonial has a general connotation of imperialism and oppression and in the case of the U.S. SLAVERY, which cannot be ignored or mitigated by whatever the intentional use of the term may be.

The first established community of American settlers

A reference to residents of the Colonies before the Revolution

Residents and citizens of North America while under the control of England who later fought to establish independence from England and unite all of the areas into one nation supporting human rights, basic freedoms, acceptance of diversity and self-reliance. Showing respect and appreciation for those individuals who fought for independence so we would have a better life.

Group of people ruling over a territory.

The original colonists who first settled this country.

It references the founding generation of our nation, which our university namesake was part of.

A friendly and benign, and totally inoffensive, nod to the proud history of America, including our namesake president George Washington, and Special location in the US capital City.

Term for pre-Revolutionary War citizens of the British posesions in North America.

GW's athletic teams

People who travel from their homes to a new home for the purpose of developing and establishing the new location as their new nation.

An individual who resided in a colony. In the context of GWU it represents the group of colonists who sought to break away from England and govern themselves. They were the original American patriots.

People living in the continental United States prior to/during the official founding of the country. Ranging from 1650-1800

Colonials = colonizers/ colonialism

Regardless of whether the term conjures up the idea of GW sports (which, frankly, it is unlikely to do outside of GW), it still carries the additional, and likely primary, connotations of colonialism, which globally is a deeply problematic idea. Even if we were to assume that the term might be seen as only relating to the original thirteen British colonies in America, this still denotes a time period when slavery was legal, the indigenous population of the Americas was being pushed out or slaughtered, and British women had few rights. Additionally, what is now the United States did not actually exist - the European population of the British colonies was not actually American.

I do not take to heart the Colonials moniker as pejorative. I feel it in the broader sense makes a statement as a group of people, a colony, as pioneers on a chosen frontier. I believe we should rebrand and reinvigorate what Colonials means giving that definition strong meaning of inclusion and community purpose instead of giving power to and acquiescence to the pejorative.

The term has nothing to do with the current desire to change or remove the foundations of our rich history and certainly does not reflect any feelings of disrespect for any segment of our current population. Changing our long standing nickname will do nothing to improve the situation of any segment of our population.



I really do understand why some would be hesitant to change the moniker, because they feel attached to the term 'colonial', but the demographic is also VERY different than it was when the country was founded, and I think it is absolute okay to reflect that with a less tone-deaf moniker.

I am white; my parents are Americans. I think it would be responsible to center the voices of people who have historically been most impacted by colonialism, both in America and abroad. The "Colonialis" moniker shows a distinct lack of imagination and is not essentially GW.

Besides the definitional implication behind a term like "Colonials," it's simply unfit to be a moniker for school pride. Most long team nicknames can be shortened (Volunteers to Vols, Commodores to Dores), but you can't do that with Colonials. It doesn't roll of the tongue, and most people chant "G-DUB" or some variation of our actual name instead of our nickname. Not only does it touch on a shameful part of world history but it also is simply a bad moniker.

I believe that shifting the mascot to a hippo would be much more effective in the GW message. The colonials do not represent resilience or strength, but looking through the lens of history, they represent stealing, killing, and treason. If this colonials moniker is offensive to a group of students or faculty at GW, it should not be used to represent us, no matter how long the colonials have been GWs moniker. When we learn about history or when we learn that something is offensive to a group of people, we have to work to ensure that the cause of this hurt and pain is removed. Also, with all of GW's adapting to the "new normal", colonials is no longer the norm and we should work on changing it to another moniker that is more inclusive, inoffensive, and one that encompasses the GW experience.

There are much more serious name changes that could and should be taken on campus. The mascot is obviously an allusion to George Washington and the Revolutionary War in the American colonies, and not to the atrocities committed by British colonialism. The University could do more to educate on this, since there appears to be a large section of the University that seems to conflate the two. Secondly, we obviously celebrate the victories in that fight, of a nation that strives for equality and inclusion for all, and not any other aspect of America at the time. The Mascot is a champion for those values, and I struggle to think of any kind of replacement that could uphold the University's values in the same way while maintaining it's culture of centrality in the city of Washington.

Take some time before getting rid of the name completely to find a new name that people like and will accept, don't have a period of time where there is no name or a temporary name as that will disillusion the community more.

This is truly a ridiculous waste of everybody's time. There are real issues affecting minority communities, both at GW and in our nation at large. This mascot is simply not one of them. It is a sideshow masquerading as social justice. If the advocates of mascot change truly cared about helping the less privileged and disadvantaged, they would be agitating for greater student aid, lowered tuition, expanded course offering, hiring more professors, helping underprivileged communities, etc. Nobody who is truly oppressed cares about a mascot that, until very recently, was a benign symbol of patriotism and university spirit, until, in truly Kafka- and Orwellian-esque fashion, the self-proclaimed "woke-est" among us declared it to be problematic. Just do a hippo, it could look really good as a semi-intimidating mascot on school merch

I feel included by the moniker because I can trace my lineage back on my mother's side to the Mayflower. My family were colonizers and while I don't believe there is anything wrong with people emigrating because of religious persecution (refugees), the behaviors and actions of the colonists regarding the native people of North America was atrocious since before the US was established as its own country. The descendants of those colonizers have systemically oppressed, abused, and killed the native peoples of this land, and as a country and society we continue to actively, passively, and systemically participate in acts against the native nations and tribes of this land.

A colonial is one who lived in the Colonial era of American history. It is not a specific person. It is not a specific practice or way of life. It is not an endorsement of either. It is simply a reference to our shared history which shares much of its roots in the Chesapeake area. GW should take this opportunity to affirm rationality over zealous overreaching and keep our Colonial moniker.

I don't really mind it either way. If people are upset about it, then change it. If not that many people really mind, then don't change it.

What is the logical conclusion of this endeavor? If "colonials" is offensive then so is everything that existed in America before the 13th amendment. I'm disappointed that it has taken this long for GW to consider changing this moniker. I'm incredibly disappointed that, even now, it's still being presented as something that's debatable. This is a simple and clear step towards committing to bigger changes. It should not have taken this long to consider taking it. We need to do better. This is not enough.

As an international student from a country that was colonized and is still facing challenges created by colonization, it is utterly unsettling to be associated with this term, whatever it's original intended purpose may be.

If the Colonials moniker is removed go ahead and change the name of the University as well. George Washington would have been referred to as a "Colonial" by those native to Great Britain and there is no reason to change it.

It should not be the mascot. It doesn't represent the diverse population

Change the name. To begin, my argument certainly makes some assumptions, mainly that when viewed in totality colonialism is bad, and that those who support the "Colonials" moniker have settled on a narrowed definition of the moniker that does not include the negatives of colonialism. There's many people who can explain why the name "Colonials" is bad on so many levels, and they can probably do so better than me. What I will say--even though the negatives of the name should be enough on there own to have it changed--is that there are far better monikers to use that capture what "colonials" is "meant" to without also bringing in the vast negative connotations of colonialism (The only reason I am not specifically referencing some is that I do not think my input on what the new name should be has been asked for). "Colonials" is also not a cool name. I honestly do not understand the pushback to changing the name. It seems like people are desperately clinging to "Colonials" as if its the last bastion of the unnecessary principle of American Exceptionalism. Whatever meaning, nostalgia, and personal satisfaction "Colonial" supporters glean from the moniker is easily outweighed by the actual pain the name causes to actual victims of colonialism. "Colonial" supporters have decided to make this a debate about how we view the US founding because when stepping back and viewing what the moniker actually means to them, it is insignificant; their views on the founding would not change with the name, no one's would. On the other hand, victims of colonialism, their descendants, and those who have any sympathy to subjugated and nearly eradicated people are actively, in present day, hurt by the name. I pity the person who thinks they lost a historical debate because the GW mascot changed from an 18th century guy in a waistcoat to a hippo or something. But I emphasize with the person who attends a university who's mascot celebrates, or at least impliedly accepts, the near eradication of indigenous peoples, the institution of slavery, and the exclusion from civil society of any non-white land-owning male. Again, I have a hard time believing that someone's identity is so closely tied to what the moniker "Colonials" stands for that changing the name so as not to celebrate the negatives of colonialism would cause them as much harm as victims of colonialism, their descendants, and those who have any sympathy to subjugated and nearly eradicated people face every time they try to watch a GW basketball game. Change the name. I doubt this gets read, but I wrote it to figure in my own mind why I think it is so dumb that people do not want to change the name.

Please do not succumb to re-naming over hyper-sensitivity. There are some who can find something bad everywhere they look. There is nothing "insensitive" about the Colonials moniker. On the contrary, it is something to be proud of since the colonists fought oppression to set us on the path to becoming the great nation we are today.

I think this argument is unnecessary, which might speak to my privilege that I am not bothered by it, I just think there are so many other things going wrong at GW that deserve more attention and funding than a huge new rebranding marketing campaign. Colonial practices and mindsets have done untold harm to many cultures and communities, and reflect a patriarchal, imperialist, and Eurocentric worldview. These are not the kinds of values and histories that I want my alma matter to celebrate.

thank you for taking in student impact. I believe that as a student who studied abroad and was told not to wear the moniker overseas, we have already recognized the impact and bad connotation of this name and concept. We shouldn't be romanticizing genocide, displacement of people, and selfishness. To honor George Washington, we can reflect government building and revolution, but must recognize the stolen land and history we are erasing.

I would actually say that if it was kept, it doesn't bother me that much. But I think that it would send a good message to our nation to change it. I also think that for some students it might be triggering (though honestly why would you pick a school that you found triggering?). Anyway, I'm in favor of removing it, but at the end of the day I wouldn't care if it were kept, either.

I think that this moniker isn't inclusive of indigenous and POC students on campus, and invokes a time when these people didn't have rights. It feels extremely insensitive.

Calling ourselves colonials is racist and exclusionary. If we are to be the progressive university we claim to be, we have a duty to change the moniker to one that is not racist.

I'm not a fan of the "Colonials" moniker and I think GW can find a better one

This entire debate is ridiculous, the mascot should not be changed. Colonials is not racist or un-inclusive at all; black, hispanic, Native American, Indian, Asian, Pacific Islanders, and Europeans were all colonials.

As an institution that has BIPOC I find it a little weird and mildly disrespectful to have a moniker with such an oppressive history (along with buildings named after slave owners) regardless of how much the meaning is changed or meant to mean something different. I really hope that knowing this sentiment that GWs non-white population (and some of the white population)has prompts the administration and those of higher authority to change this moniker.

George Washington led his fellow colonial subjects in an insurgency against the British empire to transform the colonies into sovereign states. This is an objectively anti-colonial narrative. It's literally about ending colonialism. Many of the American Founders were the descendants of Europeans who did engage in violent expansion and helped colonize American land for the British. This is true. And such facts complicate America's famously anti-colonial founding, but they do not repudiate it. The European Americans who liberated themselves from colonial rule were anti-colonial, at least when it came to themselves. These people who lived in the 18th century were not as inclusive as our modern understanding would prefer, but George Washington and the "colonials" who fought alongside him inspired anti-colonial movements around the world including Haiti, Ireland, and India. It's not plausible that celebrating George Washington leading his fellow colonial subjects in an insurrection against the British Empire is somehow also endorsing British rule in India or French rule in Algeria. Perhaps if we were called the GWU "Colonizers", but that is not the case. If the school gives into the unreason of these activists they will signal to DC and the world that the American revolution was a lie - that America's narrative of liberation is actually just a narrative of oppression. Perhaps it is both and both narratives can combine to create a more complicated story. But if GWU wants to be taken seriously as an academy, it should not pretend that historical narratives are so simple.

Questions like "I understand the meaning behind the "Colonials" moniker" are terrible. This question is demeaning and seems to hint that if as a student against the moniker you must be misunderstanding what it means. Listen to your students- it is a bad mascot and should change.

There is no reason this university should hold association with colonizers and uplift them to the point of making it our moniker. This makes so many students feel out of place and unrepresented. We should NOT be named the colonials, it has a hurtful history with modern day consequences.

I attended St. Bonaventure University—another A-10 school—for my undergraduate studies. St. Bona's had removed their Brown Indian mascot (despite no objections from the local Seneca Nation) because of fears it may have been offensive. Fair enough; our treatment of indigenous peoples is a dark period in American history. However, the Colonials moniker is a source of pride. Despite our failings, the United States of America IS the best nation on earth. People come here to enjoy the freedom the Colonial soldiers fought for. It's our great honor to remember the brave men (and several women!) who fought for our freedom every time our NCAA teams compete.

My ancestors died on the trail of tears. I will never rally behind the image of a white colonial man. It is antithetical to my identity. It is why I do not own any GW-related items like sweatshirts or mugs because I would never want to represent that harmful imagery in any community I am a part of and I would not want to be associated with it in any way on a personal level. I find it both offensive and outdated, although that is also how I have found many of the "traditions" that GW perpetuates, so perhaps it is a fitting symbol for a school that continues to miss the mark and fails to adapt to the clear trend toward diversity and inclusion as a core principle of a quality education rather than as something that can be achieved by forming a committee to contemplate whether a colonial white man is a fitting school mascot. Many months of work might have been avoided had anyone in the room had the sense to question the absurdity of turning a simple issue into a months-long parade rather than focus on the actual issue of how to promote diversity at GW.

When I first visited GW as a prospective student, I saw a shirt that said "property of the colonials" in the bookstore. all i could really do was laugh because my first thought was that as a brown woman i would literally have been a property of a colonial. it was just one of the ways i would continue to feel excluded throughout my time at GW. removing this monkier will remove one ostracizing aspect of this school for low income, first gen, BIPOC students like me.

I have no personal ties to the moniker, and would be more than happy being referred to solely as the hippos!

Are there any people of Native descent on the committee? Or is this just academics/lawyers trying to save face?

I hate the moniker please get rid of it ASAP.

The definition of "colonials" does not make it inherently racist, so it should not be renamed based on that basis. However, becoming "Hippos" or another animal would increase school spirit at a time when our community feels as distant as ever.

As long as the school name is still George Washington University, I could not care less what the moniker is. Not the school with the biggest school spirit so mascot doesn't really matter.

GW Students always have to be outraged about something - this is their new attempt. It's a mascot - it really doesn't matter that much. However, it would be expensive to change and affect many alumni's relationship with the university.

Please refer to my previous response. I also run Sovereign Stories which is a YouTube channel on Indigenous issues. I've discussed various mascots and words before, but never felt compelled to discuss this moniker.

As a person of color, this is highly offensive and also the survey questions are very telling on how out of touch GW admin are with what makes GW worth it for students. You are really going to ask if the mascot helped me decide to come to GW, or that I rally around the mascot for sports? What sports first of all, GW admin could careless about the successful sports teams like GW rowing. And in terms of feeling included on campus by having a mascot named the colonials? My family has spent generations trying to escape colonialism and it's effects. All around poor taste and if it really takes this long to realize this mascot is not appropriate then clearly there are bigger issues.

This name should absolutely be changed; there are no excuses. From a social perspective, it is true that many people, myself included, associate the term thematically with George Washington and other founding fathers, as well as with a specific time period (that is overly romanticized--see, e.g. Colonial Williamsburg). But giving this name even an iota of critical thought leads to the inevitable conclusion that this moniker is NOT unifying; it refers to wealthy, landowning, usually slave-owning white males, who were the ruling class of the "colonial" period, and they are the people to whom "colonials" refer. The moniker is explicitly EXCLUSIVE of people of color, international students/faculty/staff, and low-income people. From a sports perspective, too, this is a bad name. George Washington and his peers were crotchety men in fancy clothes and powdered wigs who hung out in dark rooms and never bathed--not exactly a strong or formidable figure to rally behind when pursuing athletic victories. Alumni who are athletes may have nostalgic associations with this moniker, but at the end of the day they should be fine with a name change that doesn't at all change their experiences of athletics, and would probably even enhance it. Finally, in this cultural moment of reckoning with racial injustice, not only the substance, but the optics of keeping a moniker like this would be terrible for GW as an institution. If we want to compete with peer institutions, we must change this name because it will drive potential students and families (i.e. money) away. Gen Z high schoolers will not want to apply to or attend a school whose mascot is a thinly veiled version of "slaveowner."

I would like to see a new moniker that is more representative of our diverse student body.

Colonials just needs to go

GW can not claim to support BIPOC students without valuing their concerns and criticisms.

Please please change the name. Not only is the name itself harmful, disrespectful, and ignores the violent implications of all things "colonial," but it makes any GW-related event tainted by that moniker. Ideas and phrases like "colonial madness" are incredibly tone-deaf and disrespectful, and could be avoided if we could build our identity and culture around different names, words, and ideas.

GWU is a [univers]ity where many leaders, from all over the world, come to gain knowledge, be inspired by American ideals and go back to their countries to build better lives for their people. That said, GWU should take this opportunity to lead by example and take a stand against colonialism. GWU, more than any educational institution I can think of, should continue to inspire world leaders and make it clear that colonialism is not something to be proud of. It is deeply hurtful to me and to the memory of my ancestors when I see colonialism symbols being celebrated. I imagine the GWU diverse community includes many who feel the same way.

I think the colonials moniker is fine. I don't think it's offensive, and it personally does not offend me (and the George Washington mascot has this kind of cute, creepy aesthetic that I like). I also, however, do not object to it being changed to the hippos (or "waterhorses") as I really love that hippo statue on campus and I think GW could make some really nice school spirit merchandise with the golden silhouette of our hippo statue.

I think the "colonial" is kind of a stupid mascot, regardless of your opinion toward colonization, but I really don't care. If I could choose, I'd make it the "owls" or something like that, because you can't really put a "colonial" on a shirt, but mascots are very, very unimportant to me. If you're going to change anything, I'd rather you changed the school colors to something less ugly.

As a well-known hub of progressive students, the least administration can do is listen to the wishes of its students. We've been begging for years. I don't care if the intention behind the Colonials mascot was not malicious, it is still problematic.

Revisionist anti-American history is a danger out of 1984.

The term "colonials" is INHERENTLY linked to the destructive nature of the colonization of land and the persecution of native communities across the globe. As a history major who is graduating this year, I have been taught repeatedly at GWU how colonialism, especially in Africa and North America, was extremely detrimental to their native peoples. Why we would take pride in calling our sports teams the Colonials is absurd. Not only does keeping the moniker blatantly ignore the weight that the term carries, but it is also simply inaccurate to call George Washington's army in the Revolutionary War the "colonial army." George Washington led the Continental Army - I genuinely do not understand why it was decided that the "colonial army" was an appropriate name to represent our school, and I'm further baffled that this choice was made without even being historically accurate. Has the committee considered that their recruits may be hesitant to play for GW for fear of association with a problematic moniker? Ultimately, it makes our institution seem, frankly, foolish, out of touch, and ignorant. Keeping this name is actively choosing to ignore how "colonials" have affected and continue to affect people of color and native communities to this day. WE DO NOT NEED THIS MASCOT TO BE SUCCESSFUL IN SPORTS. The University stands to lose nothing of value by changing the moniker. It would show that the school hears their students' concerns and would avoid any question of the stance of the university on this matter. If this school wants their student body to support their sports teams and attend games more regularly in order to develop "school spirit," the least this committee could do is give us an unproblematic mascot that we can ALL rally behind.

As a person of color, it is deeply unsettling that my school touts this moniker with pride. It is also shameful that when I talk to students from other schools, I am too ashamed to bring up our mascot when others bring up the topic, or if I do bring it up, I often face confusion and ridicule directed towards GW. I think it is unacceptable that we continue to use this moniker, a symbol of oppression and white supremacy, on a campus that supposedly touts diversity and tries to make people of color feel included and welcome.

The "Colonials" moniker affected my decision to attend GW. - the moniker did not affect the decision I made as a high school student; now that I have worked to educate myself on colonialism and its effects on the world, if I were to apply to colleges now I would be deeply disturbed by the administration's decision to retain the "Colonials" moniker, and concerned about the other ways that the university may fail to challenge violent power structures born out of the colonial era.

It's not that big of a deal to change it.

The "Colonials" moniker needs to be changed.

I have previously met people of color that felt uncomfortable applying to GW because of the Colonials moniker and decided that the name created an atmosphere were racism was tolerated if even encouraged and because of this decided not to apply to/attend the university.

I think the Colonial should be changed. I would say change the name to Continentals in honor of those that served alongside Washington in the Revolution: Black, White, and indigenous. For the mascot make it a hippo wearing the buff and blue Continental uniform.

Start educating students on what the word is rather than what they think it is. The word colonial is not racist. Now that we know better, we should do better. My daughter rejected GW due to the moniker Colonials. I know it's a reputable university but the moniker has to go!

It is honestly embarrassing to have this moniker. When I tell my friends at other colleges our moniker and mascot there is a negative visceral reaction. It doesn't represent the present or the future. It represents an antiquated and problematic past.

I acknowledge the reasoning behind student opposition to the term "Colonial." I personally feel that equating the term Colonial with colonialism or imperialism is, for lack of better phrasing, somewhat ridiculous. I also feel like the alternatives range from dumb ("Hippos") to significantly more offensive ("Revolutionaries"). That being said, I don't feel like "Colonials" is a moniker worth fighting that hard to save. I'd probably just swap it out for "Continentals" and be done with it. I would note though, given that it's already come up, that I'm significantly more opposed to name changes regarding Churchill, Monroe, FSK, etc. That in itself may be reason to get rid of "Colonials." It may be somewhat difficult to reject ALL naming issues and if renaming the Marvin Center and changing the Colonials moniker is what it takes to preserve Monroe Hall and The Churchill Center then I'd do that.

While the term "Colonials" can have a negative connotation in some circumstances, the context in which the term is applied to the George Washington University is a positive one. This is the case as it celebrates the heroic nature of the patriots who served in George Washington's continental army, not that of oppressive colonizers.

Beyond some community members finding it offensive, it is not a good moniker by any means.

This is a non-issue for me.

GW Hippos. They're ferocious and not racist.

We should use Georgers instead of colonials

Keeping the colonial moniker is saying that the university doesn't care that they are openly supporting the people who enslaved africans and that the university is not sympathetic to the issues raised by the african american community at gw.

I recommend re-naming the moniker in favor of a more inclusive name

This debate is dumb. Keep colonials. It has been that way for a long time. People who are offended by it can toughen up. It is not meant to be a derogatory term. So tired of people getting offended by everything. You aren't a victim, toughen up.

While it may not be the moniker's intentioned meaning, students have expressed that it makes them feel uncomfortable and unrepresented. There is a strong argument to be made that the moniker has racist and offensive ties, so I strongly feel it should go.

Having the name "Colonials" might not have been the reason I came to GW (the financial aid package and academic offerings were first in my mind), but that doesn't mean that I think the name is expendable. I think the name Colonials is a perfect choice for a school named after George Washington, himself a leading colonial, and whose leadership enabled the colonials to achieve independence from the British, and in doing so, become Americans. The idea that the name Colonial is inherently bigoted or meanspirited toward people of color does not make a whole lot of sense to me. To be a colonial did not require being a racist; instead, it was the case that some colonials happened to be racist. That doesn't mean the word she been thrust to the ash heap of history. If we disavow the name colonial, we are disavowing the very people whose work led to the creation of a nation that, while imperfect, still had the tools to become more perfect in time. I'm not against renaming things when appropriate - for example, in my mind there is no reason this country should have infrastructure named after Confederate soldiers who committed treason and actively tried to scuttle the U.S. But that's not what colonials did. Now, let's imagine the name was changed. What is a suitable alternative? Presumably the school would want to do something relating to George Washington, but then someone could just as easily come along and say that name too is bigoted for its links to that time period. If we follow this thought process to its logical conclusion, our school shouldn't even be named George Washington, as he owned slaves himself. To me, that is an absurd outcome. The name should stay.

I really feel like this will not go anywhere.

I know bureaucracy and all that, but I honestly can't believe this is still a question, especially for a school that claims to be committed to diversity.

Honestly, it's time for it to go. While this would be so much less controversial if the nickname was "colonists" I feel like the idea of the colonial is so abstract that no one really cares about it anymore. To me, our school spirit is more tied to "raise high," the hippo, the buff and blue, and the letters "GW" and our George mascot -- not the moniker at all

While I don't believe that the hippo, for instance, would be any worse a mascot than the Colonials, I also think that the kind of historical revisionism that erases George Washington's legacy and imposes a differentiated meaning on words like "colonial" in order to induce controversy is ridiculous.

I think that the hippo is already a well-established symbol (although unofficial) of GW and has the potential to be a more inclusive and significantly more embraced mascot.

If you stand for inclusion, and a college that stands for anti-racist education and practice, then REMOVE IT.

I didn't realize that Colonials was our mascot until I enrolled. I naively thought it was George Washington. It definitely deters my pride in my university.

I'd recommend "Senators," "Congress," "Yeomen," or "Foggy Bottoms"

I'm sure the Colonials moniker will change following the current tide of some of those within our country dead set on denying those in the future the history of the United States.

GW must do more than simply perform cosmetic changes, even those these too are necessary. The university must also work to adopt not only an anti-colonial identity but put that anti-colonialism into practice. This means divesting from industries that have and continue to exploit indigenous peoples (such as fossil fuel industries) or which are active participants in colonial seizure of land (such as industries profiting off of the Israeli occupation of the West Bank and Gaza or the Moroccan occupation of Western Sahara)

Revolutionaries makes so much more sense. George Washington fought against the colonizing British Army.

First of all, GW was not even founded in the colonial era. Second, the Colonials moniker could easily be perceived as romanticizing colonialism & colonizing, and I could see why students who are descended from people who pressed by colonization here and around the world would not feel included or welcome by this moniker. As a first semester grad student, I have absolutely no attachment to the moniker.

Colonialization is the perfect mascot for a school that strips undergrads and grad students of their resources while promising something of value in return that never materializes. Instead, the admins get richer while they lower faculty, staff, and student salaries; refuse to provide anyone assistance from the rainy day fund /we paid for/; and risk our lives with poorly-planned, top-down commands.

There is no reason why we should continue to use a moniker that hurts any current or prospective students. There are non-problematic monikers that will help improve moral on campus.

I am a doctoral student at GW. Someone bought my toddler onesies from all the institutions I attended, including GW. My son, is half-Palestinian (I'm Jewish and my husband is Palestinian) and the word "colony" (and related words) feels very powerful since Palestine has been colonized (and occupied). Given this, I felt uncomfortable putting my toddler in the onesie because of his identity. Putting a brown skin child in a onesie that says "colonials" is not comfortable. I don't have to think about that when I put on a onesie from my college (Pomona College Sagehens) or from my graduate institution (American University eagles). I think GW should change the moniker.

GW should maintain the colonials moniker in accordance with its history and namesake! If we do not, when's the next time we'll change our name again? What character or history will we have left to stand on?

Please take productive actions to change the moniker. There is no justifiable reason that this name is used to represent its student body and its affiliates.

As I have said above, by rallying behind this moniker, we are rallying behind an (at best antiquated) extremely racist European notion that appropriation of land belonging to non-Caucasian peoples is justified by their (to the colonists) unfamiliar race and unfamiliar religion. As an a student-athlete who also is of a biracial family, (black and white), I personally do not believe there is an issue with the moniker.

The term colonial has not aged well and is arguably offensive. It would most likely be in everybody's best interest to change it regardless of how they feel about it.

Understanding my culture and my ancestry, my ancestors in the Philippines and my friends and family ancestors back home in Hawaii - all had to deal with colonist mentality from ancient Filipino times to ancient Hawaiian times. One example is how the Spanish conquistadors conquered the Filipinos for over 400 years, and there were Filipinos who were enslaved by these colonists. Their names were taken away and changed to Spanish names. A lot of history and culture was erased due to Spanish rule. A forced conformity to the Spanish rule made Filipino people forget about their true culture of being a Filipino. Also, Hawaii was overthrown illegally, by the United States who illegally took land from Queen Liliuokalani through illegal annexation. In other words, threats were made to the Queen and to representatives of Hawaii during that time to have Hawaii be turned to Statehood, all because of monetary gain and businesses that were developed by foreigners in Hawaii due to greed of a fertile land.

These are simple changes to make. GW students should be able to select a new moniker by popular vote if possible

I don't feel a personal tie to the moniker itself, but I do worry a lot about the amount of time and energy spent tearing down statues and dishonoring any group in which there were individuals who exhibited poor judgement and made mistakes. We should be "The Revolutionaries" or "The Continentals."

It's not a huge deal. Just change the name. There are basically zero actual downsides and it'll make people really happy

The hippo is just a better mascot because it is less creepy.

Honestly no matter how nuanced the origin of the moniker is we shouldn't be referring to colonialism as if it was a good thing.

When I decided to apply to and attend GW, I viewed the Colonials moniker as a negative aspect of GW. That feeling was partially reconciled when I found out about the unofficial hippo mascot which I could more easily support. Even changing the schools moniker to the "Revolutionaries" which was a proposed alternative seems like it would still have the problem of connecting the school to the racism of the founding fathers and the racism this country was built on.

I really don't like it, especially being from an actual colony of the US. Of course, it wasn't key in my decision making process when looking for universities, but it definitely was a turn-off.

Language is a moving target and there is probably no perfect answer. It may appease some people now to change the moniker, but may injure the perception of the University in the future. To have your flag wave in the direction of whatever the current zeitgeist is, arguably erodes the permanence of an organization. If the original moniker was selected with malicious intent, then there is little argument to keep it. If the original intent was innocent (and I'm inclined to think it was), to see it weather the dynamic interpretations of our cultures is quite noble. In fact, it may lend stability and promote unification & inclusivity if we can agree what words mean. To have a substantial organization, GW, assert a definition and say: "No, this is a symbol of the folks who stood up to enormous hardship, who took tremendous risks and eked out a living to ultimately bring this University as it stands today. It does not represent the misdeeds of those individuals. It represents their successes, their motivation to build something despite..." To change the name is to say this university is not something to be proud of. It's not perfect, but I respect the staff, the students and the heritage that are providing my education. Truthfully, I don't feel strongly about whether the moniker stays or goes. I do believe changing it won't cool any tensions or truly satisfy the demands of individuals. It is racist and exclusionary to keep a mascot that celebrates violence against Native Americans. George Washington was also a slave owner and so to celebrate him and the acts of his fellow colonizers is to indicate that the Black and Brown lives that suffered because of them are worth less than the lives of the white colonials. This sends a really strong negative message to students of color that they are not valued and GW as an institution is unwilling to change despite widespread criticism that the "colonials" mascot is problematic. I don't know anyone who would proudly cheer for the colonials because we understand how racist it is. This severely damages any sense of school pride or any positive relationship students might have with the GW administration.

In the context GW uses the word 'colonial,' it is known to be a synonym for a solider in the American Revolutionary War.

Colonialism is offensive everywhere with violent colonial pasts, from India, Latin America, Ireland, and the United States. As a person of Irish descent it is bewildering to me as to why the University would want to celebrate the practice that led to the Great Hunger (Potato Famine), and I cannot begin to imagine how much more uncomfortable the term is for the Indigenous American community at GW, seeing as colonialism here resulted in the near extinction of their peoples. George Washington, while a deeply flawed individual, can continue to be thoughtfully honored for his military and political leadership. The practice of colonialism prior to his involvement in revolutionary politics is not something he has or should be celebrated for in the United States. If anything, a moniker such as "revolutionaries" or "continentals" (ie, soldiers of the continental army) would make more sense than "colonials." I am also in favor of a non-historical/political moniker, especially since the hippo is already a quasi-mascot of the university.

I think the Colonials moniker is not offensive (it is not "colonizers"), and I do not think a name change is required. If others are reasonably offended by the name for reasons of which I am not aware, however, I have no issue changing the name.

I understand the direct reference is not to the process of colonization, but the connotation is unfortunate and brings to mind "colonial powers" invading and overtaking indigenous peoples (including the natives of the DC area, the Anacostans, the Piscataway, and the Pamunkey).

I get that tradition is meaningful to people and I fully believe that the vast majority of people who like the colonials moniker do not endorse colonialism. However, we really have to understand what this word means for people around the world, and people who are descendants of the Native Americans who were colonized who also attend GW and interact with GW students. GW prides itself on the global citizenship of its students. However, keeping the colonial moniker neglects to acknowledge that GW students going abroad will continue to carry the baggage of colonialism, and will likely interact with people who have directly suffered from colonialism. Keeping the moniker is just too insensitive to those who have suffered from colonials. It's like if we had a portrait of Aristotle outside of the Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies' program space with his quote "a woman is perhaps an inferior being." Sure Aristotle made some important contributions to philosophy, just as some colonials have written the Declaration of Independence, but that doesn't mean therefore it is justified for Aristotle to be the mascot of the WGSS, which would vehemently disagree with him, just as it is not justified for GW to keep the colonials, as many of us disagree with the practice of colonization. I hope you take this into consideration. I know I cannot speak for those who have been colonized so I would rather defer to them for their opinions, but since I have heard lots of my colleagues disagree with the practice, so I feel that it is imperative that we listen to those who are directly affected by being associated with the term "colonial."

I am an international student from a postcolonial country. For us, colonialism refers to Europeans formally taking over a territory usually on the basis that we (racialized as non-white) were not capable of managing ourselves or the territory we were on. Such a moniker will easil give the impression that GW isnt serious about attracting international students outside the West. I understand that the term "colonial" could be construed to have a somehat different meaning in the US. Two responses: 1. Caveats always blunt the message. If GW is serious about attracting students from formerly colonized spaces, it's so much harder to have to apologize for what will always initially feel like an insult. It always makes GWU appear americancentric (dare I say american-first), and uninternational. 2. From my understanding, the only reason why "colonials" seems acceptable here is because they referred to European settlers who never left. It's hard not to see what history of precolonial peoples are being erased by making the term the identity of a university.

change the moniker. we could be the revolutionaries or the continentals

I don't understand why this is controversial. Indigenous students and their allies have been saying for years that this moniker is offensive. Nobody I know at GW feels a connection to this name, they feel a connection to the school and its people. Its people want to change the name. It's time.

I am an immigrants daughter. I do not believe there is anything wrong with the colonial name. There is no need to erase history

The Hippo moniker has a much stronger connection to GW than the colonials do

Please consider the motivation for this potential change. Is it truly motivated out of a desire for inclusion, or is it motivated by fear, ideology, and a desire to appease a small but powerful and vocal group of people? If the latter, changing the moniker and the names of some buildings will not be enough. If the latter, consider the possibility that the majority of people are not upset by the Colonials moniker, nor do they feel excluded by it. Consider that this majority may not be particularly invested in the conversation. They're more interested in their practical, daily concerns of working and studying and maintaining relationships than the potential implications of a word. This majority may also be afraid to voice their concerns for fear of being falsely labelled or accused. How polarized is the political discourse at GWU? Is there a culture of attacking, accusing, or singling out people with differing political principles? Is there a culture of assuming anyone who doesn't toe the preferred political line or worldview is a bigot, Nazi, racist, sexist, or some other villain? Is there a culture which promotes only certain wings of activism while ignoring, suppressing, or even attacking others? If there is such a culture at GWU, then it is more likely that you're considering changing the colonials moniker for the wrong reasons.

I'd rather have the hippo

I think it's awful that GW LOVES to pride themself on its inclusion and diversity yet continues to use a moniker that is so deeply rooted in racism in all capacities. The fact that there is even a discussion about the problematic moniker shows that people do take offense to it and I think if GW truly values inclusion the way it says it does it would listen to its students who feel deeply troubled by having to refer to themselves as a colonial. Instead something like the hippos which already has been adopted by the majority of the students and is completely unproblematic would be a much better alternative.

Though they may not have been the best people, it is part of our history that Connor be forgotten. I also feel it fits the school very well

I am a doctoral student so I don't have as much "GW pride" as undergraduates mights, so I am just affected my interpretation of the word "Colonial." It is not strongly tied to my idea of GW. I have no motivation to keep it

I understand the desire by some students to change the moniker, but there are several reasons why I believe they're misguided. Firstly, the terms "colonial" and "colonizer" are two separate words with two separate meanings, and people seem to be confusing them. Second, I believe that much of the reason why some students are advocating for the change is simply because our student population is very political and tends to be quite progressive. That's fine, but pretty much everyone outside of GW isn't nearly so, and the vast majority of the population (maybe with some outliers in some places) does not think that the term "Colonial" is racist, ignorant, or in any way problematic. Most people just equate it with the founding of the country and the founding fathers (hence George Washington). Finally, changing the name would require a massive investment into all of our merchandise, branding, buildings, communications - I absolutely do not think that this should be a financial or emotional priority when our school is already facing difficulties in these areas due to Covid-19. The Colonials moniker is a symbol of school spirit and community at a school where we need them now more than ever, especially since we're a big city school and those two things aren't as automatic as they would be in somewhere like a state school. I do not think this would be a favorable move among alumni or other donors either, who would rather see the school's energy go towards things like academics, tuition assistance, sports, extracurriculars, research, and other programs. Thank you to whoever took the time to read this!

GW has a lot of work to do to ensure racial justice for all our students and ensure our reputation. This is an important step for the administration to take, to remove the moniker. It's a question of what we stand for, and for students of political science, history, and the humanities, standing for "colonialism" via "the colonials" is incongruous with our education and determination to fight for social justice.

This whole thing is beyond stupid and I'm even more ashamed to go to this school than I was before.

There isn't a country in the world today that hasn't participated in colonialism at some point in its history. It's true that a term like "Colonials" carries different connotations. Native Americans suffered greatly as a result of English settlers, and the westward expansion of the United States. But it's also true that American colonists were fighting their own battle for justice against the English empire, which is ultimately what the moniker is referencing. In this regard, if the moniker is going to be replaced, I think we should choose a name in keeping with the spirit of the American Revolution. A moniker like "Hippos" (regardless of the statute) is not connected to the university's namesake ("George Washington University"), and the spirit of its founding, which was a national university. Speaking of George Washington, a significant number of people opposed to the moniker also seem content (perhaps supportive) of the removal of statues of George Washington, Ulysses S Grant, and other pivotal American leaders around the country. It's not unreasonable to be concerned whether we're ultimately on the road to changing the university's name at some point. In summary, if you want to change the name, then change it. For example, I would much rather it remain Colonials than adopt the moniker "riverhorses" or "hippos." Those do not fit with the school name at all and sound terrible. On the other hand, if the school adopted "Revolutionaries" in place of Colonials, I could get behind that. George Washington Revolutionaries sounds good to me, and it shouldn't offend anyone.

Making fast decisions on things like mascots, statues, or names might be a nice gesture to a small percentage of people who feel affected by it and appear like you're making change isn't really effective. The root of the problem is bigger than this and changing a moniker isn't real change it doesn't impact what folks are really complaining about, it might be just for optics but the same affected people are suffering from systematic oppression. I favor keeping the moniker and don't view it negatively this is coming from a minority. Otherwise change everything else in the country.

I understand concern about the Colonials moniker, however I feel that it is not meant as an endorsement of colonialism, rather as a representation of colonies fighting back for their freedom from their home country. That said, I do understand concerns about the Moniker, and I feel a better alternative, which to me still represents the positive aspects of the moniker, is the Revolutionaries. I think that avoids the issues of colonialism while still representing the positive aspects of history that I believe the moniker originally was intended to represent.

Please do not change the Colonials Moniker as it is an accurate reflection of George Washington, for who our school is named. It was George Washington who led the colonies to become the U.S and it should be remembered in our moniker.

The Colonials moniker has racist and genocidal connotations to Native American people and their descendants. An university can't claim universality of knowledge and experiences when it highlights oppressors and disregard the negative impact of this moniker on the community as a whole. It is kind of insulting that you are even considering whether this is up for debate or review. The fact that the school mascot is still called the Colonials in 2020 is unacceptable. I think there are plenty of options that would convey a similar meaning without using a term with such negative connotations. Something like "founders" could be a compromise. However, I'd prefer a moniker that isn't so centered around white men.

Colonialism is a racist philosophy rooted in a false belief of western cultural exceptionalism. Rather than find pride with the cultural sins of many of America's European ancestors, we should move away from the use of the term "Colonial" in relation to whatever mascot the school may have. Even though the intention of the mascot/moniker may not ever have been one born out of a racist thoughts or actions, its continued use is indicative of the greater cultural acceptance of oppressive ideology in our political landscape today.

I am in favor of changing the moniker to something all students can get behind. An inoffensive moniker is inconsequential to students' experiences at GW, but an offensive one makes hostile some students' experiences at the school. Instead of having a student body that feels both positively and negatively about the moniker, let's create the opportunity for a student body that feels both positively and neutrally about it. It is not appropriate to glorify the colonial era when students and their families are still feeling its effects (poverty, high mortality rates, racism). The "offense" students feel about the Colonials moniker is more than hurt feelings. I am an international student. When I told my friend at home in first year that we are the Colonials, she said, "That's so bad, oh my god," referring to how we display the name so unabashedly. The tide is turning against team names that evoke ill treatment of Black and Indigenous people. Will all this effort be for nothing, only to reopen the inquiry 5-10 years down the line?

I am a white student of predominately British/Irish heritage. I don't think that my voice should drive any portion of the decision here. GW should work to make marginalized students feel comfortable, regardless of the feelings of the students that already feel comfortable and welcome in American society.

While I understand the responses to the Colonials moniker, I would be fine with it remaining in place given its historical relevance. If, however, the university chooses to replace the moniker, I would suggest something equally related to American history but less racially charged. The Presidentials, Generals, or Eagles would be monikers that retain the historical spirit of the original moniker while reducing the racial issues associated with it. If the university chooses to use Eagles, however, I would check with local Native American tribes to make sure they do not object to an eagle being used as it is often held as the representation of a sacred spirit.

It seems unbelievable to me that alumni/athlete nostalgia for a mascot would outweigh the legacies and often unacknowledged histories of harm this mascot implies for current students and prospective students.

The name Colonial is crucial in making my time at GW the best that it can possibly be. I do not want the name changed

As a black woman, I may be a GW student, but I am certainly not a Colonial. Please keep the name

Sports and school spirit is very lacking at GW and part of it is 45% because the student body doesn't wanna stand behind the name "the colonials". The intention behind the colonials moniker does not matter — hundreds, if not thousands, of students and alumni have found it offensive and exclusive. This alone should cause concern and should push us to find a more inclusive icon, something everyone at gw can rally behind. "Colonials" brings to mind whiteness, displacement, and murder — that is not something I want to be associated with.

Colonials means "conqueror" to me and coming from a country that was colonized I think this is very disrespectful. Colonizers stole many goods and products from my home country, bought and sold slaves, and killed so many people. While the moniker could show more favor to a certain group of people, it should definitely not be hostile to any of the groups whether at this university or not. Once again, this is how I feel if it were related to my situation. What the affected group feels about the moniker is of utmost importance rather than my crudely and hastily formed opinion.

Simply removing the moniker does not allow for a healthy debate about its legacy. "Colonials" is way too loaded with some terrible history and unresolved conflict to be used uncritically as a moniker.

A very very small minority of the student body wants the moniker changed. The only people offended by this are people who would find issue with any name.

I just think Colonials is a bad mascot for a school anyway and GW merch could use rebrand with less buff and a cooler name to put on clothes because George Washington is too long and colonials is pretty lame.

The National Museum of African American History and Culture uses the name "colonial" in the same context as GW uses it—inclusive of every person who fought with George Washington against the British. I feel uncomfortable that a predominantly white institution would insist it knows better than the National Museum of African American History and Culture about what a term means to PoC.

I am against changing the moniker. I am confused as to why people want to change it - it is a lack of understanding of the idea of a colonial. This is reminiscent of people calling the Betsy Ross flag racist - again, a lack of understanding of the flag and what it stood for. Honestly, this is a waste of time.

This is a very politicized topic, and I'm sure you'll find the dissenting opinions fall upon racial lines.

This year, students have deeply lost trust of the GW administration. There are countless inept actions this administration has done this year: the last minute announcement of the Fall semester being online, the unnecessary layoffs of staff and faculty, taking away housing from at-risk students, the rush job of hiring of Heather Swain, and countless other mistakes. To not change the moniker would be another mistake. To act swiftly to change the deeply offensive moniker "Colonials" would send a message to the students that this administration actually cares about the views of students.

As a graduate student, I haven't let monikers stop me from attending the right fit program. I will not buy things that say "Colonials" on them, and I don't like the Colonial mascot. It does feel racist and willfully ignorant, to me.

The Washington Redskins did not try to use cultural appropriation, as they saw strength in the name and wanted to use it to positively show the power of the team. The same goes with the Colonials. People today want to see the negative in every situation, like if George Washington owned slaves, instead of seeing how much he did for our country. In no way do I find the name Colonials offensive, and I would be disappointed if GW bent the knee to radicals who want to dismantle our American history.

I think the moniker can be construed as offensive and it specifically is coupled with white colonizers and conquistadors that violently conquered the Americas and its indigenous peoples, however it is also directly tied to the idea of the first "American settlers" and the patriotic go-getter attitude. I think it should be changed, if a suitable alternative is selected, and the cost is not prohibitive, but I don't think the moniker is necessarily racist or offensive in its current use (such as other college monikers, like "The Redskins" definitely are)

I understand how the "Colonials" moniker is perceived as offensive, especially by people of American Indian heritage. I'm also wary of erasing our history, and I would support changing the moniker to something that still reflects American history and identity in a positive way, e.g. "Revolutionaries."

We are a school filled with pride about our origins and the United States. However, the colonials took land from the Native Americans that wasn't theirs, committed atrocities against the local people, and so forth. I understand that not all colonials did this, but in terms of colonization and colonists, the term isn't very well thought of. GWU is supposed to be one of the most diverse schools in the country, make people feel accepted, not with outdated colonial rhetoric, but with some other moniker. Glorifying something that includes violence is not a wise choice. Colonialism is not inclusive of minority populations, certainly. It is inherently violent towards native americans specifically.

I think replacing the colonials moniker is definitely needed, given the negative connotations around the name.

This is a ridiculous and vast overreaction to the current situation in our country and this school. Blown completely out of proportion

This will continue to be an issue until it is changed

I truly have no preference on the issue. I have not personally heard any students claim the moniker as being offensive to them. I am in an extremely diverse cohort and nobody has mentioned the offensive nature of the moniker. It is my fault that I am not as educated on the matter as I should be, but I would like to hear more from students who feel this is offensive so I can learn more about this. If a portion of the students feel threatened by the name colonials, then I will be in favor of removing it. If not, then I am in favor of keeping the moniker given the financial and legal impact as well as the tradition of this associated with the school.

The Colonials moniker transcends its predisposition definition. Its a traditional symbol of GW, and does not attribute to any social, political, or symbolic stance against, or for, any agenda, view, or group. However, this is my experience, or perception, of the moniker as a mostly white, Hispanic male. If I was Native American, my view of the moniker may be seen differently. If the moniker is changed, I'd like to see it changed to something that continues to define GW, like George Washington himself, or GW's connection to D.C. politics or D.C. in general.

I am a little confused by the "I can rally for the 'Colonials' moniker" question. Is it referring to my comfort level with the moniker or my enthusiasm for the name in general? Either way, I think the moniker "Colonials" is completely antiquated and wasn't even catchy to begin with.

There are better options than the Colonials moniker!

There is nothing wrong with the actual design. If people want re-name it, then that is fine.

My qualm with the colonials moniker is NOT that it is offensive. Rather, it is a bland and disappointing mascot to have. Because 'colonials' is an odd and impersonal mascot (at least, far less personal than the GW hippo), students are not inspired to adopt the moniker, or even take pride in it. 'Colonials' is not a desireable community to be part of, thus the moniker only creates extra distance between students and their college community. Simply put, the colonials moniker is lame and does not incite school spirit the way the administration may think it does, or the way fan-favorite alternatives (again, like the hippo) could.

To me, the colonial moniker is a fun way to keep the GWU spirit alive with the theme of our founding fathers. However, since it causes so much discomfort to others, I am completely ok with changing it.

I think that people will rally behind whatever the mascot is, and therefore if « colonials » is offensive, there is no repercussions for replacing it.

I find it troubling that you have escalated this, since I see it as a non-issue.

Emails such as that sent earlier should include links to articles about the history of the development of the moniker, and a summary of the opinions for both sides. A bit silly to ask about awareness without giving people the opportunity to become aware.

I would be interested in learning more about what the objections are to the "colonial" name.

I provided feedback to GW staff on a few occasions about the Colonial moniker and our mascot. When I was first welcomed to GW by phone, the woman said, "Congratulations on being a Colonial!" I told her I would rather be a hippo. (She told me during that same call about the gifted hippo statue.) She said, "Hmm, you're only the second person who has ever said they preferred to be a hippo." I asked if the other person was Black (like me) or Native American. I am proud of being a student at GW because it is a good school, but I will never buy anything that mentions the Colonials or has an image of the school mascot. Never. I have 6 different GW articles of clothing and chose them because they excluded these features. The mascot is particularly terrifying to me. I understand that schools and sports teams typically make their mascots look angry, fierce, or some other representation of strength, but George looks ready and eager to murder and possibly enslave. I also don't understand why it is honorable to memorialize a human being, especially a founding father, by morphing their image into a school mascot with a foam head. Can't we just use a hippo or bird?

The hippo is already an honorable mascot across campus. It's on a lot of merch, it's spoken about on tours, and it's already a tradition to visit the hippo for good luck and at graduation. I think the hippo would make a perfect moniker as so many students are already so excited about it!

This really isn't affecting anyone and changing a name won't solve a problem that happened over 200 years ago. The school cannot be dictated by a group of students who dislike the name. This group of students hasn't been affected by the name in the slightest. GW should turn their attention towards more pressing matters such as finding a new president, bringing back the 7 athletic teams that were cut to help fund the horrible basketball team, and to help solve the COVID-19 crisis.

I urge you to listen to and prioritize the voices of students of color and non-Western students who have been directly impacted by the legacy of what the "Colonials" represent because equity requires a historically and culturally located approach to change.

Although the term is not meant to offend anyone, it could be interpreted wrongfully. I would take the time to reconsider changing the moniker due to the term's double interpretation.

I think the moniker should be a hippo.

I find that the word "colonials" specifically is not offensive, but the meaning behind it can hurt people as they took over land that was not theirs and also were extraordinarily racist so that's never fun.

Is my tuition funding this committee?

The Colonials moniker should be changed—it denotes hierarchy, invasion, and strife.

For the love of all things good, if the "Colonials" is changed to something else, do not change it to the "Hippos." That is a tragically awful name. Consider "Generals," "Revolutionaries," or "Continentals."

As a graduate student, and being remote, I don't have an intense sense of school spirit right now so I probably don't have as strong an opinion as I normally would as an undergrad.

The term "colonials" is racist and should be abolished and changed immediately.

The Hippos is such a terrible name. I'm not strongly attached to the "Colonials," but at least choose something else related to George Washington or DC or the Founding Fathers. The Hippos is just so random and not at all relevant to GW.

we don't need a moniker. We have GW, G Dub, and George as our mascot. Just drop the colonials.

Violent and racist language has no place in the university setting, and the colonial moniker is an example of that kind of language.

I am in a position of privilege where the colonials moniker does not negatively impact me or my sense of belonging in our community. However, I do not and will not take pride in a mascot that causes harm to other members of my community. Keeping a name for the sake of tradition when GW students are actively saving that they are uncomfortable with it is, in my opinion, incredibly disrespectful to them.

In a time where change is crucial in order to truly and fully respect all lives, changing the Colonials moniker will be a symbol of the University's respect for the thousands of lives that were lost centuries ago because of the colonists, and for their descendans. By keeping the "Colonials" moniker, GW is alienating the already small amount of students who have historically been harmed by colonialism. In order for this university to be a safe space for all, we must lose the American-notion that colonialism was "good" and recognize it as it is: an oppression and erasure against non-white people, both indigenous and not.

There will always be people that feel a strong tie to an old name, especially if it was part of their own experiences here. but that in itself is a privileged point of view. For the sake of those with less privilege, and those that are new to the university the colonial moniker needs to be changed.

"Colonials" is deeply rooted in white supremacy, the genocide of Indigenous peoples, and the enslavement of Africans. GW values inclusivity and equality (in theory) and we should not be memorializing those who committed gross human rights abuses.

It's time for it to go. We can acknowledge and understand the largely damaging parts of our history without blindly celebrating them. I hope you all make the right decision.

Go with the "River Horses"

How the term can be understood as anything other than a reference to American colonists--living under British imperial rule and fighting for their independence--rather than than some cockamamie endorsement of colonialism is beyond me.

Consider the following replacements for Colonials: (1) Deeds (as in "Deeds, not words", George Washington's motto) and Commanders (as in Commander in Chief).

While I am personally somewhat agnostic on the matter (as a faculty member, I have no personal identification with it), it seems worthwhile to me to change it to avoid harm. In instances such as these, I believe that my perspective (as a white professor) is significantly less important than the minority voices who are pointing out the problems of the term. If they feel targeted or attacked by it, then that's all that matters to me and we should listen.

This outdated mascot makes us a national laughing stock. We're an institution of higher ed, and there's no excuse for us not knowing better than this

It has never made any sense to me that the moniker would be something to be proud of. In fact, it seems like just the opposite, i.e., something to be ashamed of. I would agree with discussions to change the look of the moniker.

Students want change; listen to the students

They could find a better moniker with some thought

Although I am proud to be part of the faculty at GW, the colonials moniker seems dated. I question whether it helps us position the university on the trajectory we would hope for. The historic relevance of GW's political heritage is a key strength that everyone in the university community can resonate with, however, we would be better served with a moniker that promotes a sense of unity and pride in a global space.

Above, you ask if "I feel included by the use of the "Colonials" moniker." As a white person, I do feel included...but I also feel that the moniker EXCLUDES students of color--and that's a problem. I thus didn't respond to that survey question (and would suggest you consider deleting its results as it's not the right question to be asking).

It would be prudent to change to something else that is not offensive.

Historical tradition is very important for an institution's evolution into the future. Erasing history serves no real purpose.

The reasons for criticizing the Colonials label are historically suspect and linguistically unsound.

My personal opinion is that it's not racist or offensive. The American Colonies are part of our history. That being said, there may be some people offended by the moniker or association with colonialism, and it's best, in general, to not offend people --especially when there are alternatives.

The moniker was selected by people who were indifferent to or complicit in the behavior described in my definition above. This happened at a time when the descendants of people who were removed, relocated, or enslaved by European colonizers were not allowed to attend the university. It has the same affect - potentially - as would the name of any group that attempted to subdue and usurp a mighty people from the land and sovereignty. It is past time to chose a name that can embrace ALL people and that does not act as a marker for the subjugation and historic heartbreak of so many.

It is a highly distastefully moniker for the times. If it is not removed, the university will look very out of touch and may receive negative attention for inaction on this matter.

I find this moniker deeply offensive and am embarrassed as a faculty member to display any paraphernalia with it displayed. When I host faculty talks from other universities I attempt to avoid location and walking routes where "the Colonials" is displayed.

Need to focus away from confederate and racially biased symbols. Colonials is more neutral.

I prefer a moniker that is forward and hopeful facing rather then one that seems rearward facing that seems to embed - what?

I worked with nearly every student athlete for 25 years and in my sports history class we often noted the irony of the name. I think there's a difference between "colonial" and "colonizer." Frankly, no women had legal rights in the colonies.

I am a faculty member, but also an alum. I don't have a personal opposition to Colonials moniker, but I understand that other members of the GW community find it inappropriate, objectionable, and even deeply offensive. Since that is the case, the moniker should be changed.

I think "Revolutionaries" might be a good replacement for the Colonials moniker.

Its meaning is unclear. A team needs a strong name.

GW should be taking action on this matter in order to help the community and society forward on race relations.

Honestly, I think it's embarrassing that the university has retained the name this far. While it may have some other meaning at GWU, I think most people in this era of racial awareness will have a negative association with the term.

It is fashionable to allow loud voices to dominate and undermine traditions and our united identity as Americans. It is deeply troubling and ironic that those who claim that they want inclusion continue to try to divide and, indeed, segregate, in the name of "justice." We are better than that. We should be truly inclusive, we should not give way to those who would shout down others to get their way, and we should ascribe to first principles of inquiry, humility, open mindedness, tolerance and debate. Denver Brunsman, historian of eighteenth century America at GW, has written on this exact topic of the "Colonials" moniker. Pay attention to his arguments!

It's literally impossible to disassociate colonials from colonialism and its legacy.

I always thought it was fun and quirky that the sports team "Colonials" play for the university named after the guy who got rid of colonial rule. Don't change the name.

Teams should be represented by a moniker that is inclusive, positive, and forward-looking; one that enhances GW's reputation, not takes away from it. Our local high school in Arlington recently changed its name from Washington-Lee to Washington-Liberty. Some people made it seem like a big deal at the time, but 2 years have passed, and it's been completely normalized. It's important to do the right thing.

It is time to change the moniker.

The moniker is a statement of fact, not a racist epithet. It should not be controversial.

It is time to change the Colonials moniker at GWU!

For me, the term invokes and seems to celebrate colonization--esp. the colonization of native Americans. The British colonized large parts of the world and ruled BIPOC people as their colonial masters. Hence "colonials." This term to refer to GW members feels misguided. It reminds me of how the British once ruled my ancestors, and it does so without criticizing the violence of colonialism. It is shameful, and we need to change it. As a person of color, I do not identify with it. All of Britain has already become culturally cognizant of the shameful and violent legacies of colonialism; not sure why we in America have not caught up with that. While I see the concerns with the moniker, making the connection to George Washington and his era will be primary for our brand identification as long as we are GWU. If we decide we cannot be associated with George Washington any longer (a decision I do not support), then the field is open for renaming everything in a manner intended not to offend anyone. As long as we retain the Colonials moniker, we do have an obligation to remember that not all who lived as colonials were in fact colonists. Telling their stories is important, too.

The moniker has to go. The GW experience is not defined by a name, and we as a community should rally around the students who are affected by the problematic connotations of the term and embrace a new name, one we can all be proud of, together. Honestly, I'm shocked that this much effort needs to go into it. The name needs to go, and then we should look towards acknowledging previous wrongs by renaming the Marvin Center. To me, the more we drag this out, the more damage we do--the name is offensive. Let's change it. Go Hippos! Thank you.

I do not have a strong preference, but changing to "Generals" or "Presidents" after the namesake seems like a fairly easy transition that would not necessarily require wholesale changes in the mascot, logo, etc. I like the term "First Ladies" for the dance team, and would like some of these second and third order naming implications to be well thought out too.

The fact that I wasted my time doing this upsets me. We have other issues to deal with like ridding our education system of wokeness.

I appreciate that GW is going about this in a thoughtful manner and is seeking this kind of feedback.

The term "colonial" is increasingly associated with the violent erasure of Indigenous knowledge and culture - not just in the US, but in settler colonial societies all over the world. For those connotations alone, the name should be changed.

The Colonials moniker has never made sense to me because Washington was an anti-colonial figure. I don't feel excluded by it per se, but would prefer something less inorganic to the GW brand. The GW "post-colonials" would be so much more appropriate, turn the page on the original moniker while still acknowledging its legacy association with the college. It's also witty, and the campus community would really embrace it I think.

The noun "Colonials" conjures images of white, elite, land-owning, men and women, who perpetuated an agrarian economy (and a monocrop culture in the Chesapeake region of present-day Washington DC) in the seventeenth and eighteenth-century based on the labors of enslaved African Americans.

I no longer contribute money to the University, in part because of the moniker.

I understand that the name means different things to different people. However, now seems to be a good moment to act in good faith and show the university community (many of who come from backgrounds directly affected by colonialism) that they have been heard and that action has been taken.

We are aspiring to be a pre-eminent GLOBAL university. Whatever the meaning "colonials" might have for some Americans, I know from talking with faculty and students that it is very off putting to international community members, many who come from countries that are scarred by histories of colonialism. Given our goals, the moniker seems to violate the principle that we should be a community where everyone feels comfortable and valued — for many, the name does quite the opposite. On these grounds alone, I would argue that the moniker should be changed. There are MANY inclusive and harmless moniker options that the community can get behind! I would not feel comfortable wearing a "GW Colonials" shirt or hat. This is sad, because I would like to support our sports teams and generally our community. We should have a moniker that everyone can feel proud displaying and supporting.

Changing this moniker would be a relatively simple way for GW to get with the changing times.

Times change, and what was once considered honorable is now linked to toxic social, political, cultural, and economic relationships between non-Indigenous and Indigenous people across the globe

The colonial moniker is part of the history of the university. Removing it will destroy the cohesiveness of the university and be replaced by something random (no matter what is chosen), leading to a disjointed organization with no school spirit.

This dated moniker needs to go. It suggests dominance by one group over another.

If a sizable number of members in our campus find it offensive, change to "Generals". We are the 'general' of higher education in the nation's captial with larger enrollment and prestigious programs.

I have no trouble with the moniker, and worry that I might not like a replacement.

The concept that the term is "offensive" or "negative" is profoundly erroneous, and is in fact symptomatic of a deep intellectual and moral crisis in American intellectual life today. The name should be kept, proudly. Jonathan Chaves, Professor of Chinese

I was not a fan of the moniker prior to the current controversy about the name. I always thought it was outdated and boring.

Not only do I support getting rid of the moniker, I also support getting a new mascot.

I think the "Colonials" moniker is a silly name and therefore I would have no big concern in dropping it. Moreover, athletics are not that important to both the undergraduate experience and how the rest of the world views the university. Even setting aside the historical context of the name, it is simply a boring mascot compared to those of other universities with stronger sports programs. On those grounds alone is it worth getting rid of the moniker and replacing it with something more fun like the Hippos.

Traditions are more important to me than the political implications which to me sounds more like reverse harrasment.

This is a long time coming. Get rid of it.

If we're honoring the Colonial Army, I think something like the Revolutionaries or the Patriots does the job without bringing up the negative connotations that the word Colonial does.

If People are offended by the Colonials moniker, I worry that what follows is an attempt to rename the University....which is entirely unacceptable to

May be a good moniker for GW to offer to the Washington Football Team? The Washington Colonials

We are a school named for George Washington. The political correctness is getting to be tiring.

It just isn't obvious how to interpret the moniker and, unless that's what you're going for (i.e. what the heck is a Hoya?) lack of clear meaning seems like a good reason to change it.

There is a sad irony with the current focus on preeminence. Colonials cannot, by definition, by preeminent. They will also refer to Imperial power for protection and justification.

Those who dislike America, the greatest, freest, most prosperous nation the world has ever known, are welcome to leave it at any time. Flights leave regularly from Dulles Airport, which is conveniently located nearby. I am neither for or against the moniker. If others are offended I have no issue with it changing.

It is time to bring GW into the current century, and change the moniker to one that is inclusive, welcoming, and relevant, and not use a moniker/mascot with harmful and offensive implications. There are endless alternatives. Choose one.

If there is strong opposition to the moniker by traditionally underrepresented students/faculty/staff (i.e., those not of European descent), I support its removal

Decisions like this aren't easy, but I believe the postive PR the university will likely receive in response to a name change that better reflects the world we live in today will outweigh the negative ramifications of doing away with an established, historic university moniker.

The moniker adversely affects the original inhabitants of the land GW is on: the Piscataway and Anacostian Peoples. Colonials also is a term that has a more negative context elsewhere in the world. As international students consider GW, this is a questionable moniker and also affects GW's positioning as a "global campus."

Changing the moniker feels to me like a mostly shallow bit of lip service to changing something that has far deeper roots and far, far more complicated solutions than this. Of course, as the expression goes, you can walk and chew bubble gum at the same time but, as I say, the moniker isn't offensive in the same way as those team names that use overt racial slurs. I would understand and support GW deciding to change the mascot if that is what the GW population wants. This is simply how I personally feel about the moniker.

For staff, we have the "Proud to be GW" festival and i think it would be more meaningful if there was something else to be proud of, for example I could never say "Proud to be a Colonial!" because, well that's offensive. The feedback has always been that GW is a transactional experience, and having a moniker/mascot that students and staff could rally behind would go a long way to improve the culture.

It would be better if we just never used people or groups of people as mascots or monikers, when we can use animals or abstract concepts which work perfectly fine and are much less likely to be subject to changing views as our society shifts and changes. Why not change it to "GW Water Horses", named after the statue on campus? That would be a great, unique name that carries meaning to anyone who has been on campus in the last quarter century.

We should get rid of the Colonials moniker from the standpoint of what is right to do. Many questions... with more complicated answers than I've seen addressed.

We know better, now we should do better.

I don't care either way and could care less about sports. I believe the education should matter more for colleges and GWU offers a quality education, along with lots of opportunities. But if people feel like the name is holding them back, change it.

It is part of the history of the University, and of America. However, I am not in a position to judge if the name is offensive to others.

I like the tie back to George Washington but would like the whole community to be comfortable with a nickname.

The term is offensive to many in the BIPOC community. If GW strives to be a diverse and inclusive university, the name should be changed.

The entire history of this country is shrouded in a dark past that is forgotten in our education system. While there are negative connotations behind "Colonials", there are also ones about George Washington. He was a slave owner that refused to release his slaves until his wife died. If we are going to change one thing for an attempt at inclusion/political correctness then we need to address every single thing at this university that offends someone. We cannot pick and choose what we are willing to let slip by and what has to change. Change everything, or leave everything alone.

Changing the name is ridiculous. It does not refer to colonists as in colonialism. It refers to the colonists from the original 13 colonies who fought against the British in the Revolutionary War. I think the moniker may have started in a time where we were not tuned into how colonialism impacted indigenous populations. We know better now. We want to foster a culture of inclusion and to do that we have to be willing to make small and large scale change because it's the right thing to do. We don't need a committee to decide "hey Fmr President Marvin was a racist so do we need to change the building name??" Of COURSE we change it. Because racism embedded in positions of power is wrong. Do we really want to be the 'Redskins'? No, we don't. Let's change it because it's the right thing to do. ESPECIALLY given our cache as an international relations school and the landscape changing from accept the 'great white help' to facilitating community led solutions for change. Colonials is not a moniker that suits the culture we're trying to build.

If the Colonials moniker is removed, I would like to see a new moniker that recognizes George Washington's vision of the establishment of a national university in the federal city of Washington, DC. Colonials captures this as well as possible.

Prior to becoming staff I was a student, and was prouder to share the GW Hippo than the colonial

I think it's nice that you are making such an effort to include the diverse opinions of the University body.

I understand that people have negative feelings about the name, and if so, they can change it, but please try to have something that represents our history of being founded by George Washington. i.e., not a hippo.

As the school is attempting to be more inclusive, it must also look at the implicit issues that may be blocking progress. references to Colonization are very triggering for certain populations, and should not be celebrated.

With calls to decolonize the university and increase diversity and inclusion, the allusion to colonialism contained in the Colonials moniker, even if it's not intended, is not a good look for GW.

Cancel culture is not the way to go education about the meaning and history behind the decision is a better route....

If GW seeks to be a preeminent research university of the 21st century, it is counterproductive to hold onto a moniker which is culturally inappropriate. It is best for our entire community if we acknowledge and then move on from our past towards a more inclusive future.

I don't think students, faculty, or staff have a specific affiliation with Colonials name and actually gravitate more towards the Raise High or the hippo instead

The term "colonials" is simply too closely tied to negative images of "colonialization," regardless of the accuracy of that tie. It is also a weak moniker, with only vague associations to values that might inspire anyone. Can anyone on campus name those specific "colonial" values? The color scheme is dreadful, embarrassing. "Buff" -- really???

Changing the name while President LeBlanc jokes about black murder is performative and insulting. Remove the moniker as well as LeBlanc.

I think that GW should change the Colonials name to keep up with the changing awareness globally and locally of how damaging colonialism and systemic racism are.

Changing the moniker is a waste of time, money and resources. In my opinion

The name should change. The upside of the name is incredibly limited. A hippo would be an awesome mascot but I suggest a name tied to our location in the nation's capital.

As an African American staffer born and raised in small town mid-west in the 1960's, I understand both sides of the issue. I attended many schools named after Presidents and leaders, who in today's zeitgeist would be changed. However their culture served to provide me access and advancement commensurate to my families expectations, resources and my own abilities. It has been my experience that GW has been likewise. I regularly interact with both faculty and staff and never felt at a disadvantage. I also understand that my experience most likely is not the perspective that others may have and I can understand and accept their perspective as true for them.

While I don't have a strong affinity to the Colonials moniker, I feel the time has passed on its usage. Too many people -- particularly international students -- have negative feelings about it. We need to be more inclusive and globally-minded. It's time to retire "Colonials."

Our United States colonies took over land that did not belong to them and decimated an indigenous people. We were cruel invaders. Proudly calling ourselves the "Colonials" completely ignores that fact of our history.

There is no reason to keep this moniker. Change it and actually bring all of us into the equation when naming it - not just some random name of the past.

I think the moniker should reflect GW values

As GW Staff, I actively work NOT to include the Colonials moniker in any/all aspects of my job, and I don't know anyone else in my entire unit that does differently - that should speak volumes to the change that needs to happen! Our students, alumni deserve a moniker that can represent the diverse and inclusive community at GW. When we think about the time when "colonial" was a description of the times, it was a time when women did not have rights, People of Color were enslaved and murdered, lands stolen, etc., and the people who arrived to the Colony were so upset with the Crown, that they overthrew British rule - we are at the point in history where I don't think anyone want to be referred to as a "colonial", least of all any person who is not a white man.

As GW sorts out the naming of campus teams and buildings, there are pieces which are higher priority than others. The renaming of the Marvin Center and the replacement of the Colonials moniker must be at the top of that list.

Monikers affiliated with animals are less troublesome.

Through the window of history the term colonial does carry many negative connotations that may make some feel upset or outraged. However in its current sense as the moniker of GW I don't attach those attributes. As it relates to GW my view of the word "colonial" has a positive sense. It represents a group of dedicated faculty and staff, and a compassionate and hardworking student body. It embodies the positive that GW represents

I was once asked by an international student whether he would be required to do military service in the "Colonial Army" if he attended GW! The term is confused with colonialism which has a very negative connotation internationally.

There are many ways in which we can do better as American people to rebuild structures and meanings of things that have impacted far too many. Furthermore, as an institution of learning it is our responsibility to educate and uplift our student body. So I think we have to ask ourselves what are we really doing to our student body by upholding the Colonials as our brand and name? (Other than keeping it as a result of Tradition). I am confident that as a community we can acknowledge the horrible mistakes of our past, remove harmful names/ structures, move forward, educate and stay educated about our past and therefore uplift our students and community members (of all identities).

It's time to de-colonize the Colonials and chose something that's more inclusive.

I'm part of an alumni family and also a staff member and we've always thought it was an unusual moniker for sports teams. The affiliation with George Washington and his historical legacy is not troublesome. I feel we need to accept history for what it was and acknowledge our current cultural experiences and develop ways to reconcile the two without whitewashing history. Changing the moniker could assuage concerns expressed by the groups advocating for it and that alone represents a step towards cultural inclusiveness. I'd like to see the options being considered to replace 'colonials.' For comparison, Georgetown's 'Hoya' moniker means 'what a' - I had to google this and yes, it's odd but it's immediately recognizable.

Let's call ourselves the "Revolutionaries". It'll let you keep George as a mascot, and has a lot more to do with the political-focused studies at the university.

New moniker: "The Generals" - to honor General George Washington

I think it is one of the less cool college mascots/nicknames, and certainly have no strong ties to it. If people are strongly offended/triggered by it I'd be in favor of a change

The moniker is not essential to GWs identity. If a better idea can be found, I would support a change, but frankly, this is not one of the issues where I see a pressing need to change a name at the university. In other cases, we must do so. In this case, as I see it, it is optional.

I am an alumnus (class of 1982), a staff member and a part-time faculty member. I'm also an annual "GW Loyal" donor. My affiliation with GW goes back to 1978. I think the movement to replace the moniker is ridiculous and can assure you that changing the name will make me rethink future donations to GW. While I support removing racist names (e.g. Marvin Center) from GW buildings, replacing "Colonials" is a bridge too far. I strongly oppose this with every fiber of my being

If students and community members express that they feel harmed, negatively impacted, saddened, or isolated from the broader community because of the Colonials moniker, then the University needs to change the mascot.

I think removing the moniker is a good step to inclusivity. However it is not the only step.

We'd be better served as the GW Hippos. It's already the unofficial mascot. Let's make it official!

As an employee It has little effect on my ability to provide a service to our faculty, students, and other staff.

If some people are negatively impacted by the name, it should be changed. Students, faculty, and staff should feel proud of their school mascot and moniker. If they don't, it serves as a divisive symbol and therefore does the opposite of its intention.

I voted unsure because George Washington was a colonial subject for most of his life, but fought to remove himself, and his country, from that status. So the name is a little confusing on that level.

In maybe the last 10 years, the Colonial moniker has become outdated and, to some, offensive. The fact is, there is now a rain cloud over the name and brand, and to anyone with any experience in brand management or marketing, this will chip away at GW marketability and brand integrity over time. It will only get worse. In my experience, the mascot and university brand are VERY important to the overall brand the university projects to students, alumni, parents, and the community. Changing the brand will anger some and appease others, so taking that all into account will be a delicate balancing act. One thing I will suggest is to possibly unveil any new brand or moniker once the university has returned to normal. Recent negative press and tirades from alumni/students/parents/staff/former staff on social media and open forums indicate that tempers are flared, people are angry, and the dust needs to settle from a PR perspective before any potential brand change takes place.

Go Hippos!

I was embarrassed to graduate under a banner that read "colonial army", it made the university look tone-deaf, at best. Following this campus-wide conversation, the university can no longer claim ignorance as as excuse for the continued use of the term; it is a dog-whistle to xenophobes and white supremacists.

Regarding question 1: I thought I understood what the Colonials moniker meant, but now I'm not sure. I do believe that the Colonials we are supposed to be celebrating were not oppressors, they were fleeing oppression and standing up for liberty and freedom. Even if some of them were engaged in practices that are offensive today, 250 years ago they were common practice. The same will be true for us in 250 years. We should not lose sight of the bigger picture of what George Washington and the colonial, founding fathers accomplished. Learn from the history. Celebrate the accomplishments (of which there were many) and condemn the shortcomings (of which there were also many), but let us not usurp the meaning of Colonial founding fathers with something that is not representative of what they did, and don't let a few bad eggs tarnish the whole lot. The GW Office for Study Abroad advises students to not wear GW apparel when traveling abroad because the Colonials moniker is offensive—our students have been removed from classrooms, museums, and restaurants after displaying the moniker/logo on their clothing.

The above listings have no NA, so I picked not sure. Frankly, I find these issues not that important in the big picture, as I feel way to much time, money, and effort go into sports in this country.

It's past time to retire this divisive moniker

This is a chance for the Hippo to be the new official mascot.

I've always thought the Colonials moniker and mascot was silly. Who cares about some guy in tights? I've also felt a bit uncomfortable with Colonials, because I know it's a loaded term.

I am both an employee of GW and a distant cousin of George Washington and I'm perfectly fine with changing the name.

Being from European descent, I personally don't mind the Colonial moniker. I can see why it is offensive to natives. I also don't think it's a particularly good one either as a school mascot. "The Presidents" or "The Revolutionaries" aren't great options, but might work. I don't understand the hippo thing so I think that's silly, but I'm sure if there is a change people will eventually get use to it.

I would think it is important to discuss the impact that this name may have outside of sports and to those students, both in the U.S. and outside of it, who may be coming from countries or ethnic groups greatly affected by western European colonization and its long term ramifications to present day.

In my opinion, the moniker is a non-issue. It speaks to the people who showed bravery and fortitude. If there is an issue with Native Americans, I would like to remind everyone that Columbus was here hundreds of years before what we think of when we think of "colonials." Also, the Spanish, Dutch, French, and other countries had colonies here - for decades... no one seems to have a problem with those colonials. I recommend reading "Before The Revolution" by Max Richter, and "Captives & Cousins" by James Brooks.

Colonials is an outdated term and should probably be retired and replaced from a DEI perspective. A great recommendation might be to replace it with something like the "Revolutionaries" or the "Revolutionary Army". I don't think removing George Washington as a mascot makes sense, since the university is congressionally chartered to be named after the first President of The United States. While society may have been different then, we cannot simply erase what has happened in the past. To be a colonial is to support the removal of land from America's indigenous peoples. To be a colonial is to romanticize a complex and horrendous history.

I'm not super tied to the Colonials moniker, so if some think it should be changed, so be it.

When I look at net gain vs net loss of the Colonials moniker compared to any other possible moniker, the Colonials moniker provides very little to no net gain, but provides a clear net loss that can negatively impact the results we are trying to achieve on campus. The loss of the Colonials moniker would be a change on campus, but it wouldn't stop us from achieving our goals. However, retaining the moniker is likely to continue to cause communities to feel unwelcome at GW, even if that is not the intention and history of the moniker.

Like others, I definitely avoided naming my school mascot while studying abroad in China and Japan due to the problematic history of the term. I don't understand why it's taking the University this long to change the mascot. If the former Washington Redskins can change to the neutral Washington Football team in a few months, the least GW can do for the interim is be Big Buff à la Cornell and Dartmouth. Change the damn name already. You've had more than enough time. Stop hemming and hawing.

The university will never receive another dollar from me if they change the Colonials moniker, and I will rally my classmates to suspend any future donations if our beloved mascot/moniker is changed.

I think there are better ways to honor GW and forefathers than "Colonials" which is basically "Imperialists." Patriots would be a better fit.

It's time to stop the stupidity. Leave the name alone. Canceling a name doesn't change history.

I honestly always thought it was kind of a lackluster name/mascot (the hippo was way more fun and exciting). Considering the racial justice impacts of the name, I see every reason to remove it and really none to keep it.

It is a complete joke that this is being considered and would be yet another unforced black eye on the university and the university's sports programs. Any time spent on matters like this and not on more important issues like improving the ranking of the university and/or state of any of the sports teams is time wasted. Please stop this madness, it's embarrassing for us alumni out there.

No group, no matter how loud they express their opinion, should have the power to "guilt" others into change. I hope The George Washington University is smart enough to understand that.

Despite the fact that "colonial" can be interpreted as referring to a proud moment of revolution against Britain in America's history, I also believe that the term "colonial" in modern times has become intertwined with ideas like Manifest Destiny, racism, genocide of Native American nations, and a Euro-centric view of American settlement. For this reason I believe the term "Colonials" should be changed.

If the moniker changes, that will constitute the end of my financial contributions to GWU.

Go Colonials! Go Hippos! Also, George Washington was in fact a colonial, and the school is named after him. John Quincy Adams, whose former house is now a GW building, was also a colonial. Crispus Attucks and many other important figures in American history were also colonials.

I appreciate the university taking the time to address this and to include us (alumni) in the discussion.

Thank you for giving us the opportunity to weigh in on this matter and give you honest feedback and viewpoint.

Making changes to suit the current political climate is disruptive and causes discord. It distracts from the educational experience, as well.

I think another moniker could be chosen that recalls the same association with George Washington's era and the romantic ideals of the American Revolution without referencing so explicitly one of the worst aspects of our nation's history (colonization). The UMass mascot - the Minutemen - is a good example of this. I would also be totally comfortable with a new moniker that does not reference the revolutionary period at all, but has some other special connection to the school. The unofficial "hippo" mascot was popular during my time at GW and I would be comfortable adopting it officially. I'd probably even buy some new merch!

Please remove this extremely insensitive and offensive name that is quite literally a representation of white supremacy in America.

Why keep a moniker that evokes subjugation?

I don't mind Colonials, but if we change it I'm very much in favor of either River Horses or Cherry Blossoms/Cherry Trees.

I want to thank the Board of Trustees and the amazing students advocating for the Colonial Moniker change at GW. GW prides itself on preparing its students and providing them with the tools to change the future: "No matter what subjects we pursue, we've all come here to change the course of history." However, it is difficult to believe in change when the institution you choose to further your thinking refuses to change.

The moniker is too closely aligned with colonialism, disrespect of first nations peoples, and too white male centric for 2020. It lacks inclusion and diversity and has negative connotations with colonialism, oppression, white centricity.

If the Colonial moniker is considered racist, and I don't find dictionary definitions as such (Webster colonial noun definition: 1: a member or inhabitant of a colony), and we change it, than in line with the other racist name charges against President George Washington, I assume that will be our next step. Tread carefully.

While it is of little consequence to me (I didn't even remember until reminded), I can see why others may feel that it is not inclusive and perhaps even dismissive.

The Continentals or the Federalists would be much appropriate name for our teams. George Washington fought against being a colonial and it is not just counterintuitive that the university's teams should bear this name is an oxymoron.

My main issue with the Colonials name is Colonial is an adjective. It's weird. We should be nouns, not adjectives.

Removing the moniker would help with the university's national reputation to show that it can be a community space and does not uphold white supremacy

I honestly think that the movement to change the name is going to far. When you look up what "colonial" means as a noun it includes a person who lived in the 13 American colonies. A word can have many meanings and its clear the way that GW uses it as a moniker.

I understand the argument about why we need to remove the term and disagree. Yes, there was slavery during our nation's colonial period. But to conflate "colonial" with "slaveholder" does not make sense (many colonials were abolitionists like Ben Franklin and Alexander Hamilton!) and, if taken to its logical conclusion, means we should ultimately rename the school itself. After all, George Washington owned slaves. You could easily argue that the name "George Washington" is more associated with slavery than "colonials." However, instead of merely presenting the negative view as to why we should not change the term, here's the positive reason for why we should keep it and embrace it: When they sought to break away from Great Britain, the colonists set out on a grand experiment. They knew things as they currently existed did not work. And though they had many motivations to change (some, in the South, even fought Britain to maintain slavery), they worked to establish a country where change for the better would be possible. By holding to be "self-evident, that all men are created equal," our Founders laid down a principle that they themselves knew we could not live up to at the time. Indeed, we have never lived up to the words of our founding documents. But we have always strived "to form a more perfect Union," as our Constitution a few years later explained. That's the country the "colonials" gifted us. An imperfect, often infuriating nation struggling to improve. The colonists were not perfect. George Washington was not perfect. But they gave us a country where we could strive for perfection, seemingly close at hand, and yet always out-of-reach.

The Colonial period is an important time in our history, is part of the identification of our namesake, George Washington, and as such, should continue to be remembered and honored. It is ridiculous to be considering changing the name

I certainly understand the desire to review difficult parts of the University's history, identity and character, particularly in light of how it can jeopardize some students' sensitivities to their own feelings of inclusion. That said, those who emotionally cast the mascot as indicative of racism or ethnic violence are dramatically caricaturing the character and tradition of the University; the student outrage seems outlandishly disproportionate, and while vocal in small but sustained passion, am disappointed to see students so outlandishly misrepresent the actual Colonial history of the University. (The spirit of the University's founding - which the mascot certainly invokes - mirrors our country's enduring and persistent fight to more equitably achieve self-determination for all. That's something we're all still striving for - just as GW students are reminded of by the mascot.) I'm equally disappointed by the widespread and heated rhetoric I've seen from the alumni about how many feel this issue would irreparably damage relationships between the University and alumni and consequently lead to a severe reduction in alumni philanthropy. This has been repeated across nearly a hundred social media posts, email threads, and text messages I've personally seen in the last few weeks -- and represents a wide spectrum of alumni across the four years I attended GW. The University has a fundamental obligation to engage and listen to the current students expressing their opinion or frustration on the history, and should - including this feedback process of gathering input from alumni, faculty, staff and other stakeholders in the community. However, the alumni are absolutely right on one point: moving away from the mascot/moniker would irrevocably damage the relationship that GW has with alumni. Especially in light of the difficulties of building campus tradition, culture, tradition and history within an urban campus, alumni have sometimes a hard enough time sustaining a strong connection to the University post-graduation - something that has only [in the last three decades or so, really] improved given sustained time and investment by the University. At the strongest moment, it is still tenuous. Doing away with the Colonials moniker now - obliterating the experience so many had of being a Colonial - without an actual reason to - will forever change most alumni's GW experience and their link back to the university.

This is a step in the right direction. The colonial moniker is racist and outdated. It makes GW look backwards by clinging onto ideals and mythologies that inherently oppressive both historically and in modern understandings of the term.

I have no problem with the moniker. I would value reading an explanation about how the moniker could be unsatisfactory to others.

If the university elects to change the Colonials moniker, I have a very strong preference that the new name should have nothing to do with the hippo statue. It was my class that was "gifted" the statue by then-President Trachtenburg, it has functioned as a funny campus curiosity, but does not and should not represent the university.

I guess that the "Colonials" moniker impacted my GW experience because it quite negatively influenced my view of the school's administration - for a university that loves to be very progressive (not requiring SAT scores, proudly encouraging a very politically active student body), the moniker is pretty jarring. This has been a long time coming, and you should done this earlier. It's actually quite embarrassing that you haven't.

DO NOT COWER TO THE FOOLISHNESS OF THE MOMENT.

If the PC culture of our day impacts the ability of strong, wise men and women to change the moniker, count me out for anymore financial support. I think it is the height of idiocy in light of a world based on feelings.

Please remove the "Colonials" moniker. If GW is to be a truly welcoming space, the mascot shouldn't look like a slaveholder. I think we can have a mascot without the baggage of colonialism, slavery, and genocide. I believe GW can do better.

Appreciate that the university is intentionally considering this matter. I believe the intent of 'Colonials' is to represent George Washington and the other citizens who fought to establish the US and a democratic system of government. However, I realize that this group is generally identified as only white men, and that colonization has a negative context in many other instances. If a new moniker is chosen I hope it continues to tie back to George Washington and the ideals of the founding of the nation.

If the moniker is changes, which I don't prefer. I would suggest the new moniker relate in some way to the Continental Army that GW led during the Revolutionary War. That way the moniker would still link back to the legacy to the namesake of the University.

Just like it as I defined, not identified only with specific people.

I understand the connection to our namesake, George Washington. I fail to see it as any more offensive than naming a team after a random animal.

The moniker itself is not that important and I do think that renaming some of the buildings may be appropriate but at what point down that slippery slope do you stop before people want to rename the entire university. History is important and evaluating these questions within the context of that history makes sense.

Let's address some serious issues- instead of this-the founders of America were colonists-no denying that.

I see this term as reflective of our being named for George Washington who lived in colonial times. Nothing wrong with that in my opinion.

I feel like I identified more with the hippo as our mascot more than the Colonials. I did not attend any sports events during my four years at GW, and very few pieces of my GW clothing featured the label "Colonials" on it.

Symbols mean different things to different people. Let's choose a course of action which is inclusive of all our sentiments on this issue. I suggest a moniker which encapsulates the revolutionary ideals on which our country was founded, something we can all rally behind; liberty and equal justice - Something that pays tribute to those brave enough to risk everything in an attempt to spark a revolution that lead to the founding of the United States of America. The word Colonial could be misconstrued as supporting systems of colonialism. Maybe there is another moniker that avoids this pitfall. Maybe... Patriots, Continentals, Revolutionaries, or Generals.

This sets precedent by superficially changing a name to alleviate unmeasurable concern over a name. Perhaps if you re-name everything every four years then everyone will be happy. Change is not necessarily always good or necessary.

Please don't revise history to appease anyone. Educate and inform and honor those that came before.

There is no moniker more perfect for GW than the colonial. Being right in the heart of DC and so close to so much history, the colonial is quite literally at the root of all that history. It is empowering to share the title with those who had such a significant impact on the history of the world.

While I understand the sensitivity of the topic and how certain people may view the moniker as offensive, I do not view it that way and believe that any movement to change the name is unwarranted. "Colonials" has a strong connotation to George Washington; they were the group of people he led in the revolution that founded our country. I also think that if the moniker is changed, you've paved the way for people to object to the university name, and a movement will form to accomplish that. I cannot, frankly, see how you can change one without at least acknowledging the legitimacy of a demand to change the other. And while I would not be terribly upset by a change in the moniker (depending, of course, on what it was changed to, though presumably it would be something anodyne), I would be very upset if it led to a change in the name of the university.

The name is a historically accurate reference and is fitting given the fact that the school namesake earned his fame by leading colonists into battle against the British. It would be incredibly disappointing for GW to change this name and negatively impact any future donation considerations I would make.

I feel like I would need more information about the call to examine the issue of potentially changing the moniker. Like this is a much more complex issue than outlined by this yes/no/maybe survey.

Not broken; no need to change.

George Washington owned slaves and feel free to change the school name as well while you're at it. Fire President LeBlanc.

Members of my volleyball team and I, many whom were indigenous, black, and brown, hated even cheering, "Go Colonials!" Change the moniker. I can't tell you how many times I had to shamefully tell somebody that our mascot is a Colonial. How messed up is it that we have "Big George" and "Little George" depicting a former slave owner, running around the track of the Smith Center while supposedly supporting a mostly Black basketball team.

This is an offensive and exclusionary moniker that I was ashamed to be associated with as a GW student.

I think it is sad that the state of the racism and public health issues can't take a step back to evaluate things in historical context and intent. I see colonials as part of the founding fathers. I have patriotism and feel that by changing the moniker you are compromising your ethics, the university's founders and giving in to absurdity. Tearing down statues. Changing building names doesn't address raciism inequity or other issues. I found the fact that it was even being considered absurd. I'm very proud to be a GWU alumni. If the moniker changes a piece of by identity, my memories and more changes.

Everyone seems to want to abandon all our history these days. Instead, they should study history and be enriched by it.

Identity politics is a phase - do not get swept away by cancel culture.

While George Washington did own slaves, we have to remember that the idea of slavery being a moral abhorrent was a new concept at that time. In fact, the first group of people who collective declared slavery morally wrong—the Society of Friends (The Quakers)—did not order its members to free their slaves officially until 1774. Slavery has been and still is part of human society. I am not condoning the evils, just pointing out a clear reality check. There is much we need to do correct the evils created by our human capacity to harm others, especially those who are different from us. However, as Joseph Ellis says in his book The Quartet we cannot judge them by our modern 21st values. GW lived at a time between feudalism/monarchy and capitalism/democracy. While I understand the motivation to wipe the slate clean, wouldn't we all be better off to have a REAL, HARD discussion about what happened then and how we got to today. History matters. Open, honest discussions matter. Opening our hearts and correcting wrongs matters most of all.

I hadn't thought about the exclusionary nature of this moniker until you brought it up. On reflection, the name is most closely associated with people of European backgrounds (who did some very negative things to people of other backgrounds) and therefore excludes other members of our GW community. I am not personally attached to "Colonials". It would be fine with me (a White Mayflower descendant) for the University to select a team name that is inclusive and respectful of our whole community while still honoring the University's namesake (George Washington).

I think the proposition to change the moniker is outrageous, as the "Colonial" is a reference to the Continental Army, which General George Washington led throughout the American Revolution. To change this, at George Washington's namesake university would be a disgrace to his honor.

I believe there are many ways to create a new mascot that is still relevant to the George Washington name and/or time period but without the explicit celebration of colonization and oppression.

I'm very disappointed to learn that a small but vocal minority has succeeded in turning the "Colonials" into a controversy. I know I speak for many alums in stating that if the name change goes through, I will cease all giving and donations to the university. This is not a trivial matter. A small group of radicals are seeking to wipe out all vestiges of American culture and pride. If anyone thinks changing the "Colonials" will appease them, they are naive. This group will only become emboldened to press for more demands until there is no common institutions, culture or tradition to tie us together or to our past.

I think "Colonials" is important for brand recognition of GW and GW sports in the DC area. Some of my first memories involving GW are of watching them in the NCAA tournament when I was a kiddo (I grew up in Arlington, so they were a local team to us).

I understand that there may be a basic misunderstanding regarding the moniker and its origins...this is often the case for collegiate teams that do not use a widely-known state mascot such as the Hoosiers or Bears. I think that the University would be better served with a public education campaign explaining that the moniker salutes the University namesake's command of the Colonial/Continental Army and, far from denigrating people's with a colonial experience, that the name celebrates the fact that a group of "Colonials" was able to defeat the most extensive, powerful empire arguably in the history of the world.

I am extremely proud to be an alumna of a University that is acknowledging and carefully considering how such names could create an unproductive environment for students, faculty and visitors. I believe that the Colonials moniker is not necessary to represent the dynamic, curious and free spirit of the University. While history is important, GW must also take the courage to be an institution that looks toward the future and stands for equality and inclusion. Creating a welcoming environment that attracts the best minds and forms a diverse student body is essential to maintain GW's status as a premier educational institution.

While I understand why Colonials was chosen as the moniker, I also understand why many find this offensive or difficult to rally behind. While an undergrad from 2004-2008, I didn't like the moniker -- and still don't. For the record, I don't like the idea of Hippos either. I hope the university allows for some kind of vote on a moniker name change -- and this should absolutely include alumni.

While I have no issue with the Colonials moniker, I would suggest bringing back the Hippo as the secondary mascot. It seems like the current terrible President of GW was trying to bury that. Also, just get rid of LeBlanc.

I don't think the moniker "Colonials" represent the truly inclusive environment that GWU strives to deliver.

I am a first generation american of asian-indian descent. A group of 1 billion people who - like America - were colonized by the British. I understand the sentiment that is going around across the country on a number of issues. But, honestly, I think this is a step too far. The amount of money it would cost to implement this, when educational institutions like GWU are already compromised because of Covid-19, is beyond absurd.

George Washington was a Colonial American. Our moniker is based on historical context, and I think it's truly ridiculous to connect this with systemic oppression. I do not think the words "GW Colonial" are offensive, or are perceived negatively by outside parties (unless you are Valparaiso and still bitter over the 2016 NIT championship). If the Smith Center was cheering for "colonialism", I understand that may be a situation that needs to be addressed but I'm disappointed on how much time/attention/resources have been spent on this topic by the University. Opposition voices are loud but that doesn't mean they need to be constantly validated; I'm appreciative of this survey to allow members of the community who support our brand and identity to weigh in.

The Colonial Moniker should not be changed. For one, changing the moniker would set a dangerous precedent of succumbing to the demands of a small minority who are passionate and vocal, but are not representative of the community at large. Changing the moniker would open the flood gates to other outrageous demands like changing the names of buildings who reference the founders of this nation. Essentially, if you change the moniker, you might was well change the name of the University itself as this same group would surely advocate for that next. And with a precedent of bowing to their will, you would have to accept demands for a name change, which would be completely ridiculous and wrong. In essence, you cannot cave to the demands of a small, radical group. I know I, and thousands of others, will forever be colonials, and I hope the committee rejects the demands to change the Colonial Moniker.

Not that I ever thought "Colonials" was a great name, but... to what end? The trend to rename everything is a little disturbing. Weren't there some students who toppled a statue of Washington on campus? I see an undercurrent of puritanical zealotry that echos McCarthy's paranoia of communists, and the Salem witch trials before that. Or as Ada Louise Huxtable said when Penn Station was demolished: "we will probably be judged not by the monuments we build but by those we have destroyed."

I am in favor of keeping the moniker for the reasons above. BUT, if the moniker remain I think GW need to be very clear about what it means, to dissuade any concerns about it referring to those who wrongly overttake others.

Focus on important things. This is not important.

The moniker should be changed. No one I knew at GW was attached to it or supportive of it. Why wouldn't you change a name that is neutral at best and offensive at worst. GW should set an example of tolerance, sensitivity, and progress.

Adopt the name of the Native Americans whom the colonials displaced.

I associate "Colonials" with the residents of the 13 original American colonies who fought for their independence and freedom from Britain. I favor keeping the Colonials moniker but also know others may have a strongly divergent view and feel it's essential to change the name because anything "colonial" is about conquering and dominating other humans.

I hope you're listening to Black and Indigenous students, faculty, and alumni and weighing their preferences over those of White students who are not personally harmed by the "Colonials" moniker. I also hope you recognize that by keeping this moniker, you are sending the message to BIPOC students, faculty, staff or alumni that this institution is unwilling to acknowledge their concerns or harm perpetrated against them and their ancestors. This is quickly becoming a Washington Football Team issue, where the university is digging in its heels and making itself look *bad.* It's not that hard to say "We're listening, learning, and growing, and that's why we're shifting to the GW Hippos." I truly hope you care more about justice and the well-being of our community than you do about our sports teams, since GW's spirit and history is significantly more firmly rooted in literally every other aspect of its community than its sports teams.

Colonials in the American experience were revolutionaries who founded one of the greatest experiments in liberal democracy and free expression the world has seen. To change the school's moniker is an illiberal, reactionary movement at best. If the university makes a decision to change the moniker, then it is a sign to me that the university is becoming an intolerant institution that makes decisions based on passion and who shouts the loudest, rather than an academic, impartial historical view of who and what American Colonials were, and their contributions, both positive and negative, to our society today. To put it more bluntly: John Adams was a Colonial. Alexander Hamilton was a Colonial. Even George Washington, who indeed owned slaves, yet was essential to the founding of the nation, and is the NAMESAKE of the school, was a Colonial. If you change the moniker, you might as well purge George Washington's name from the school's name while you are at it. Whether you like it or not, GW was a Colonial too.

There is nothing offensive about this moniker

I strongly support the initiative to change the Colonials moniker. As an alumna of a high school that also uses the "Colonials" as its mascot, I am working to change that moniker to the "Anti-Colonials," to change an offensive name to an opportunity to teach understanding, equity, and antiracism

Please do not cave to the woke culture on this.

I think it is going a little overboard to change the name

I cannot understand why there could be objection to the history behind this moniker.

The United States' origin as a British Colony, and the historical context of the American Revolution (and GWU's namesake), gives the term "colonial" as used here a significance apart from the system of colonialism more generally practiced by Western powers in other parts of the world. Many things from America's early history are referred to and/or described as 'colonial.' While I believe that properly contextualizing the school's use of the "Colonials" name is entirely appropriate, ultimately it's a homage to the circumstances of our nation's foundingb and should not be reframed (or jettisoned) wholesale.

I was the editor of the Cherry Tree yearbook and was deeply immersed in language used for overall university branding. However, if the name causes any offense to any student (especially in terms of race or ways that impacts their personal identity), that alone should be grounds to change the name immediately. I'm glad the university is interrogating this and hope you follow through with a new moniker that doesn't harken to white supremacy.

I just want to say that while it is obviously true that continued racism in this country is a serious problem, I think it is absurd that people would strike at symbols connected to George Washington, or the Patriots under him who effectuated the Independence of the United States of America. Slavery was legally abolished (or put on the road to certain abolition by operation of State Constitutional Law/State ordinary statute) in *every* Northern State, between 1780 and 1804. Basically, the "Free North", that existed in this country before the start of the Civil War, and its free black population, was the creation of *the American Revolutionary War*--not of the Civil War (or any other post-1800 shock to the North American status quo of 1763--the date of the legal end of the last major North American War, before the American Revolution). George Washington was no racial egalitarian, we all know this. But he never felt morally comfortable being a slaveowner, and he never tried all that hard to get back any of his runaway slaves. He freed his slaves upon the death of his widow, according to his last will and testament. And many, *many*, black Americans, in the process of freeing themselves, fought under his command, and thereby freed themselves and the country--the most noble two-for-the-price-of-one in History. They were the original "Colonials". Basically, if that name, and General George Washington, were both good enough for Crispus Attucks 250 years ago, they should be all good enough for us today. None of our symbols at GWU should change. -Bradford William Short, LL.M., the Law School, 2010

George Washington Revolutionaries. George Washington Presidents. George Washington Generals.

The institution has much more to gain by appropriately adjusting its moniker dynamically with social norms (see: Aunt Jemima, Uncle Ben's) than to gain by keeping it. I also felt more attached to the Hippo anyway.

change the name.... and watch the donor community will walk away

I think when the term was first coined for GW students, it was a reference to the people who lived at the time of the university's namesake, George Washington. Now, however times have changed and the term has a negative connotation in reference to people who took over native lands (of many countries) and imposed cultural, spiritual, and religious beliefs and laws and customs not native to the land. I believe the term should be removed and changed.

I am bothered by the intentions of many vocal people to put a negative interpretation on many words that are in plain context not offensive at all. Universities should be immune from the whims of the uneducated.

I associate colonials with George Washington and his army during the Revolution. Is there a way to re-draw the logo?

I am not personally offended by the use of the Colonials moniker. Its original intent was to give a nod to the founding fathers. Now that everything about our country's origins is under scrutiny, I understand the desire to have a dialogue about this. Our founding fathers were not perfect people and the things they did and didn't do has to be considered within the context of their times. Part of me feels that giving up the moniker suggests that we believe it is highly offensive - which I don't believe. But at the same time, it never was a great sports moniker, which is really how it is mostly used. I could see it go either way, but I lean in favor of keeping it.

While I have no preference, I do see the merit in updating the name. The NFL had to do the same thing recently, and they stepped up to the challenge to be more inclusive to their fans.

The Colonials are not a symbol of diversity which GE had become. We need a new symbol

If the intention of the moniker is to honor the founding of the United States, "Colonials" fails in every way. The professed values of America's founding - liberty, equality, justice, democracy - were completely undermined by the 13 British Colonies to which I believe our moniker refers. These colonies: - Elevated white, Christian, European males and devalued/oppressed all others to varying degrees - Were built on slave labor, a system made possible only through extreme racism, violence, and genocide - Subjugated or eradicate the existing/native populations in the lands they wished to control There is no justifiable reason to retain the Colonials moniker. However, for the sake of discussion, here are some common arguments for keeping the moniker and the reasons that these arguments are in fact hollow: 1. Argument: "The Colonial mascot embodies the spirit of freedom and ingenuity that marked the founding of the United States of America. Changing the mascot allows historical revisionism to undermine the values on which our university was founded and disparages the legacy of our founding fathers." See above for the ways in which colonialism represents the opposite of our university's and our country's values. Additionally, colonists were not Americans - they were citizens of their countries of origin and remained loyal to those countries, if and until they became revolutionists. If anything, this argument proves the need for a name change to something that actually aligns with the values it purports to cherish. 2. Argument: "Rebranding our university mascot does nothing to fix injustices of the past." Nothing changes what has already been done, since time machines don't exist and this argument is laughably juvenile. However, since some seem to think this is a valid argument anyway: continuing to honor the name of the system that perpetrated unimaginable horrors on millions of people whose descendants are still harmed by the effects of colonialism today does nothing to fix injustices of the past. Frankly, the myriad mistakes of the current GW administration has imperiled our university's reputation, and we cannot afford to be on the wrong side of history on this one. Denouncing the evils of colonialism by refusing to celebrate its name does not change what has been done, but it does let the world know that GW stands against racism, terrorism, violence, injustice, oppression, and inequality. 3. Argument: "Rebranding is too expensive." Declining to do what is right because of financial costs is a morally indefensible position. Slavery was a lot cheaper than paying people for their labor, but we managed to get through that. Furthermore, the costs of rebranding will be far outweighed by the cost to GW's reputation and enrollment by not rebranding. Paying for a rebrand now is a long-term investment in GW's future, particularly if we want our university to survive in an ultra-competitive higher education space. 4. Argument: "The name was not intended to offend, so no one should take offense." The road to hell is paved with good intentions. If I didn't intend to hit someone with my car, does that mean I can't be held responsible for doing so? The outcome is what matters, and no one has the right to pass a value judgement on anyone else's experience of pain based on their own perception. Do the morally and logically right thing, not just for GW, but for humanity. Change the moniker. Thank you.

Over time, GW has established its reputation as a fine university with a lot of history in its name, buildings, offerings, location, etc. It is the entire package that attracted me to GW. Start pulling that apart and GW becomes just another university. GW should not bow to the fashionable cancel culture. As I said in the past, start changing all the names, and I will change the name on my donation checks -- and it won't be to GW.

If this name causes harm to any part of the community, it should be removed. Tradition shouldn't stand in the way of the inclusivity and safety of marginalized members of the GW community.

I still strongly believe it is not in the University community's best interests to consider a name change. I am satisfied with the Colonials name. It has positive, and revolutionary and patriotic connotations to me - as does the name George Washington - our first President, our heroic general, and our founding father. After hearing the vocal minority of mostly students - I am convinced their views are those of a vocal minority. I am still proud for the university to be associated with George Washington and ideals of leadership and liberty, notwithstanding his imperfections. If there is a better moniker to convey the best parts of Washington, then I am not opposed to changing the moniker from colonials.

It's not as bad some other team names, but we can do better.

While our current understanding and cultural views on the value and right-ness of colonizing lands and taking control of them (often with force and violence) from indigenous persons differs greatly from the view of Americans in the past, it is still a crucial part of both the story of America and the history of the world. While I support the removal of memorials and monikers that are celebrating racism or are cultural appropriation/denigration (Confederate generals and "Redskins")- I don't believe that "Colonials" in the context it is used at GW is inherently either. It is merely a name for the individuals living in this country at the time of its founding - in fact, the name of the people who worked to found this country (and found it on noble principles that we continue to work towards achieving). They weren't perfect human beings but they were very much products of their time. There is a slippery slope that can easily lead to an erasing of all the bits of the past that make people uncomfortable at a certain moment in the present time which will lead to a loss of awareness of the past and a loss of understanding of how our world got to where it is and why. It is also dangerous to hold individuals and groups of the past to a standard based on our current values and beliefs - all people are products of the time in which they live and must be considered with that in mind. For example, if we remove "Colonials" then couldn't we easily argue that we should also remove the name of the University itself? After all, George Washington was a colonial, a traitor (from the British perspective), and worst of all, a slaveholder. While simultaneously being a great leader, a great general, and critical to building the America we have today. We must find a way that allows us to understand both history and the present in balance. It is also crucial that we study and understand the history not just of these people and times, but of these monuments and monikers as well. Very often it is not just the individual or group that is being celebrated that is the problem - but the group that is choosing to celebrate them. The veneration of Christopher Columbus in the early Twentieth Century arose from the racist mistreatment of Italian immigrants and Italian Americans. At a time when immigrants of Catholic faith were treated as a separate and "dirty" race from those from Protestant European backgrounds, these Italian Americans tried to establish that they too deserved a place here and used the evidence of the Italian Columbus's involvement in exploring and colonizing the New World to support their claims. Around the same time, Southerners worked hard to build and maintain a culture built around racism and Jim Crow laws. Part of this was to venerate the "heroes" of the "Lost Cause" (ie slavery and white supremacy) (who were also, it must be understood, traitors to the United States) in order to further the power and reach of segregation and hate. Both Columbus and Confederate Generals are today rightly seen as undeserving of celebration, but there is a marked difference in why people began celebrating each of them in the first place (and the celebration of neither began until a period of time had passed). So, let's talk about what "Colonials" means at GW, lets talk about why that moniker has been chosen, lets talk about why colonials and George Washington himself are worth both celebrating and criticizing, and lets talk about why history and people are complicated and complex, but critically important to understanding who we are as a country. How did we get to where we are in 2020 and why, and how can we continue to strive toward those early principles of the Colonials. And while those alive in the colonial period did not define the "all" in "All men are created equal" in the same way that we do now, no one alive today should be so foolish as to think that if they had been born in the same year as George Washington that they would hold the same views that they do today.

Please remove the Colonials moniker.

While I do not firmly believe that "Colonials" is offensive, I am also of the belief that changing the name (or not) is reflective of my alma mater. I am of the mind that removing something that is "offensive" only attempts to extinguish our history, which like it or not, is our history. GW leadership should replace the racists moniker forthwith, and change it to GW Hippos - as hippos are ferocious - in honor of the hippo statue on campus.

Accept the past for the history of the time. Not all changes are productive. Concentrate on the integrity of values and truth.

I have been a member of the GW community as a student and now-alumnus since 2003. I have never, until now, heard anyone suggest that the name "colonials" is offensive, non-inclusive, or makes anyone in the community feel "unsafe". When used in context with the name of the school, the colors, the mascots, the logos, and the apparel, the moniker clearly refers to colonial-era Americans who fought with the namesake of our University to win independence from the British. It does not refer to early settlers who oppressed indigenous peoples. Everyone seems to have understood that until now. What changed? You need to strain to find the slightest inkling of offense in the name, and you would need to completely ignore the entire context in which it is used. This is a teaching moment for your students. History is almost never black and white. The founding of our country was a wonderful moment, but it was hardly perfect. That does not mean that we "cancel" our forbearers and ignore all that is good about the nation they made. If the name "colonials" is offensive or non-inclusive, you might as well find offense in "Americans" - after all, the "colonials" or "colonists" are simply predecessors to Americans. Indeed our entire country rests on land that once belonged to indigenous peoples. Where does it end? If "colonials" is offensive, is it really such a stretch to call for the name of the entire University to be changed, since George Washington was a slaveowner? What about the Mount Vernon campus, which is named after the plantation where George Washington owned slaves. Or the mascot (which celebrates a slaveowner) and buff and blue colors (colors of the Virginia regiment, a slave state, and those worn by colonial soldiers)? Maybe you should move the University to a different city, because Washington DC was built by slaves. If you want to create a cause celebre, you can find offense in virtually anything because history is messy and complicated. But just because you do not agree with everything that an historical name represents does not mean that you have reason to find offense in it, especially if you are being honest about the context in which the name is being used. The moniker is not a racial slur (Redskins, Orangemen). It honors the great but imperfect people who fought for our independence. Help the students understand that, not cancel it.

Those who are offended or impacted negatively by the moniker likely do not fully understand what it means. It is NOT in reference to colonizing other nations and forcing a culture upon them. It is, in fact, the complete opposite. It was a group of people who did not feel included or represented by their government and felt that their needs were not being met and, in fact, were being exploited by the powers at be. Changing the moniker to appease those who do not truly understand its meaning would be an offense to the founding fathers and peoples who helped create and shape this country. Informing and educating people on what the true meaning of the Colonials moniker means would be a better use of time and resources. I honestly hope that this board takes a stand and actually tries to engage and inform the community, instead of just making a change to seem like they care.

I urge you to keep the Colonials moniker. Although I did not attend the GWU as an undergraduate, I still felt perfectly at home completing my Ph.D. here. I proudly display the GWU and the Colonials names on clothing, my license plate, and resume because the names act as my connection to the wonderful time I had completing my Ph.D. here. Removing the Colonials name would remove a link to my feelings of attending GWU. I ask that you look at this situation from a different perspective at what the average person thinks when they hear the name George Washington Colonials. They most likely summon up the same feelings of freedom, founding, and patriotism. Even the Freemason "Colonial Lodge No. 1821" (dedicated to affiliates of GWU) uses the term Colonial because of connection to the university. Why would they select a term that would damage their image? Was the past perfect? No. But, the founding fathers laid the framework that we are constantly improving upon. If we start to pick out all of the evils of the past using hindsight, we overlook how influential and great the decisions and actions were at that particular time. If removing names is happening for the Colonials moniker, what is to stop the same advocating for changing the name George Washington? Changing the Colonials moniker can set a precedent for changing anything else if there is a vocal enough group (no matter how small). Please do not let a small group change a name that has been around for almost 100 years. Again, I enjoyed my time at GWU and am extremely grateful to have had the opportunity to attend; however, I will be disappointed if the name is changed and will feel like I lost my connection to GWU. Thank you for your time.

I do not have a problem with the Colonials moniker. To me, the name does not hold negative connotations - it is not equivalent to imperialism or empire-building, for example, and not nearly as offensive as the former name of the NFL's Washington Football Team. However, I recognize that my personal experiences may be vastly different than those of others. If the name is to be changed to something else (Generals, maybe?), my feelings towards the university would not change. It is far more important to me to cultivate an environment of inclusion and acceptance.

I applaud your efforts, but for me, I think there are much bigger and more important issues to be concerned with at this time in our lives.

Seems like there are more important issues to address at GW. Tuition, academic programs, ethical behavior of certain professors in the news

I never liked the Colonials moniker. I would suggest simply changing it to the Hippos as it is our unofficial mascot anyway.

This is nothing short of ridiculous. What's wrong with the word 'colonial'? I will be seriously ashamed of ever attending GW if the university decides to change this innocent moniker because of apparently a select few. And for what? Let's be productive and instead focus on creating better education opportunities.

In terms of offensiveness, we could do worse. But is that the standard we want?

I believe removing the Colonials moniker and changing it would be a huge mistake. The Colonials were everyday people living in the new world. This is not the "colonialism" attributed to the British and what they did in other parts of the world. Two totally different meanings.

Life is complicated and these questions are complex, surely; but it's not our place to write/record history to make ourselves feel better... nor should we attempt to erase or forget history. - While I don't think we can be held accountable for the behaviors of people from generations ago, we need to be honest about the present and everything that got us here. - We need to acknowledge when (and why) things are not equitable and inclusive. We need to see what we can do to move forward by acknowledging our past and paving the way forward to a better and brighter world. - The positive (and some might argue superficial) feelings of some people about a school/sports mascot or moniker should not outweigh the negative connotations of and direct connections to oppression, racism and lack of freedom that they represent to entire groups of people today and throughout history. - I understand that the captains of the football/basketball/soccer team may have never spent even 5 minutes thinking about the history and symbolism of the team name, moniker and mascot... what it says, what it means and how that impacts others. No judgment there. But now that we are more aware, now that we know and better understand, we have a duty to address that in a responsible way. - Consequently, I am in favor of leaving "The Colonials" behind. It will be hard for some, but it is the right thing to do. - Let's be leaders as we move forward as a stronger, more inclusive GWU community. - - - This quote comes to mind... - "I did then what I knew how to do. Now that I know better, I do better." -- Maya Angelou

Change the name.

A moniker that honors our heritage is not a mark of shame. We need to stop overreacting to "political correctness".

The "Colonials," rather than being colonial powers themselves at this time, actually led a successful insurrection against colonialism and European imperialism. The moniker, I imagine, was coined as a tribute to these men and our country's great expression of sovereignty. That being said, we all need to remember the great harm that white Europeans inflicted against Native peoples in their original settlement in the New World. The impulse to reckon with this past is usually a good one that should be encouraged. In some cases, however, it misfires. The Colonials moniker may be one such example and I urge caution. I would worry about being smug and self-indulgent in quoting this, but we're GW after all. So I'll say, as Chesterton wrote: "The more modern type of reformer goes gaily up to [a fence] and says, "I don't see the use of this; let us clear it away." To which the more intelligent type of reformer will do well to answer: "If you don't see the use of it, I certainly won't let you clear it away. Go away and think. Then, when you can come back and tell me that you do see the use of it, I may allow you to destroy it.""

As a pioneering university in the United States urged to be formed in DC by George Washington, the GWU should keep its current name and Colonials moniker.

I always liked the unofficial Hippo mascot.

While I can understand potential arguments for dissent from the Colonials moniker, I feel much more strongly in favor of keeping it. As I mentioned above, the term "Colonials" is weighted with history--the good and the bad--that formed this country. As a black latina, I can see how one may choose to feel excluded by the term. The reality is, however, that iterations of colonization has taken place since the beginning of world history by all different kinds of people, including people who look like me and/or share my ethnic background. I do not believe that the moniker Colonials necessarily glorifies the evil deeds of American colonists. Instead, I believe it acknowledges and commemorates the US Colonial era, including those enslaved by the colonist. As a black, first generation Latina, American citizen, I am proud to be a GW Colonial Alumni.

It is not offensive unless it celebrates colonialism, a different concept. More concern with academic excellence please!

Though the term colonialism has a negative connotation, I think that "colonial" in the context of George Washington means a specific and distinct thing. The history of our country - and many of the colonials that our moniker represents - may not be perfect but no one's is, and neither this school nor this country nor any of us would be in this place without it. We should spend less time worrying about optics and more time working to right what we now see were historical wrongs.

It is such a simple change to make that will make the university a much more inclusive and safe space. Holding on to this moniker for "tradition" is absurd. Colonial has painful and at times harmful implications for many students of color and international students. Remove the moniker, make GW a safer space.

I think it is absurd that this is being considered. The name should not be changed, as it is not remotely offensive. I will be offended and my opinion of my George Washington diploma and the school's reputation will be severely negatively impacted if the moniker is changed.

Is it honest to impose our current standards of language on the people, places and events of centuries past? I think this kind of anachronistic thinking runs counter to everything a great university stands for. It is also the epitome of arrogance. Where is our humility in this? And what is GW if not a bastion of truth? The American story is one of progression. Is it wrong to celebrate that journey forward? When there is no "perfect" nation by today's standards and certainly none with a perfect history? Our nation has been a leader in these endeavors and working to improve our imperfect systems. Cultures change and recalibrate constantly, redefining what is "good" and "right" and "fair" and "just." We should celebrate that we are having these current conversations at the highest levels and creating a new level of awareness. We are striving to be better. We have great cause to celebrate those who made this progress possible. It wasn't easy. Creating this free nation, where we could have these great deliberations. George Washington, an imperfect man in a fledging nation of imperfect people, was nonetheless a warrior for freedom. I'm very proud to have received a graduate degree from a university named for him. I'm proud to root for the Colonials. I will not be proud of an overreaction that overlooks history and context in favor of demonizing that which is worthy of celebration and gratitude. GW is more than a mascot, it's time to do a way with it.

The University should not give in to radical voices who wish to "cancel" images and language that do not meet their arbitrary purity tests. The Colonial is, in my mind, a graphical representation of George Washington and other British settlers who colonized America and ultimately formed a constitutional democracy that was, and still is, the envy of oppressed peoples around the world. Washington and his fellow countrymen and -women were not perfect, but what society is? The University should stand strong and take pride in George Washington's contribution to the formation of our country, his advocacy for the establishment of a national university, and the University's unique location in the federal seat of government.

The fact that GW is even considering this issue is embarrassing. You have more important things to deal with. Stop being hostage to the feelings of students. GW students need to be challenged and educated and stretched beyond their comfort zone so they can mature and become competent men and women

You might need to rename the colonials, but keep the mascot of George to reflect his true spirit while discussing the flaws of his past with slavery. For sure, I can't wear GW gear in Malaysia because nobody wants to be seen as a colonialist supporter. It is clear that there is a compelling case to remove the moniker. I am glad this debate has occurred while maintaining freedom of thought and speech and the university tradition of vibrant academic critique and discussion. At the end however, the moniker should be removed.

First of all, thank you for reaching out and for considering the removal the Colonials moniker -- I know it must be an involved process, but I believe it is well worth it and a move in the right direction for the school. I am an alumna of the graduate program for International Education. The word 'colonial' does not instill a sense of school pride for me; instead, it brings to mind real physical occupations and economic exploitations around the globe. My wonderful professors from my time in grad school had us considering the very damage that colonial histories leave on communities. From Native displacement to slave labor, Colonial America was no different. PLEASE -- let's drop the Colonials moniker and replace it with something better, something that reflects the spirit of learning as we dream of a better future -- not a colonial past.

If the name is going to change, I'd recommend Continentals, as General Washington commanded the Continental Army.

I do NOT have EXTREMELY strong feelings about this matter. However, as a general statement, I believe this is one of the very minor points in the current uproar over reference to guilt over our nation's history. Do we really need to try to erase or pretend to make amends for every currently perceived error or sin of the past? I do not think so. I am a Christian, but I don't expect the descendants of the Romans -- whomever they are -- to make amends for feeding the early Christians to wild beasts for entertainment. According to my DNA analysis, I am of 8.5% sub-Saharan African ancestry. But, I am not going to make myself miserable with anger over current racism. I also have Cherokee in my ancestry, as do most Tennesseans, and my sister gets emotionally inflamed any time the name of Andrew Jackson comes up. So, with respect to "Colonials," please just "get over it" and use my donations for student scholarships or faculty salaries or laboratory facilities or anything other than changing the moniker.

The colonials moniker is racist, imperialist, and harmful to our entire GW community. It needs to go. We've been informally using the hippo as our mascot for years, we have alternative right in front of our faces, making the switch literally could not be easier.

Time for this much needed change

I specifically avoided buying any swag while attending because of the moniker and names of buildings/schools.

Except for athletes, students at GW generally don't care about sports. It doesn't foster any type of broad, university-wide community the way it does at some schools. Use of the term "colonial" just makes GW look outdated and it's silly to hang on to something that carries no real meaning or sentiment for the majority of GW students and alumni.

Unlike other Universities, we have an obvious answer to what we would replace the colonial moniker to be. The hippo is a fun, interesting, and creative mascot that students ALREADY prefer over the colonials. The reputation of the organization is put at risk to continue with the name of colonials, and perpetuates George Washington Universities' inability to develop any form of school spirit. History shows Colonists were responsible for many bad ,acts, avarice & long-term negative policies, particularly against First Americans & African peoples. It would make a strong statement for the university to consider changing the Colonials moniker given the current societal climate and need for racial and social justice and equality

We can do better

The term Colonials isn't consistent with our marketing. There is confusion among the student body, is our mascot George, is it a random colonials, it is a hippo (I vote hippo)? For a school so obsessed with its messaging and its brand why don't we move away from this inconsistency and come up with a better name that is actually something fun to rally behind.

I don't think the school loses anything by removing the moniker. A wonderful question is what to replace it with that has substance. Is "patriots" okay for instance? Should a moniker have substance or should it just be fun (here come the Hippos!)? These are powerful conversations that I hope are happening in the classrooms at GWU.

The moniker was adopted as a tribute to the Continental Army and the colonists (as they were referred to at the time) who fought for individual liberties as enshrined in the Constitution; in this context it is not a term that glorified the eradication or oppression of native peoples. The censoring of names and traditions is not an answer to every single perceived slight; there is room for education and the application of critical thought.

I think the Colonials Moniker is Dull and uninspiring. It's just there. A brighter change might be nice.

Again, we need to understand that the "Colonials" were soldiers fighting under the direction of George Washington as opposed to generic 'colonists' some of whom oppressed native peoples. That said, MOST of the systematic oppression of native people was NOT done by colonists during colonial times, but after the U.S. Government was established with a huge piece of the oppression in the first half of the 19th century - Andrew Jackson in 1814, Indian Removal Act of 1830, Trail of Tears in 1838. Indian Reservation System of 1851, etc. NONE of these acts were done by the Colonial Army or colonists.

This survey is "woke" nonsense and a waste of time, insulting and patronizing.

I think the moniker ties the school back to George Washington who, while not perfect, established principles that allowed the US to thrive for over 200 years. The US also is not perfect, but is always evolving and better than the alternatives.

So, any change must be done with great care and much thought. If there is to be a change, great consideration is required. This is no easy task (there are no falcons, cougars, eagles or other animals that portray idealistic people fighting for their rights). I am indifferent to this question, as I do not follow sports at GW or elsewhere. With that said, the comparative level of controversy with the moniker "Colonials" seems to pale in comparison with overtly racist monikers such as "the Redskins."

I hope we are not changing the name because of political correctness. I really fear that is what's going on here. If GWU is getting caught up in the fervor that has swept over the country this year and is looking to change the name for the sake of virtue-signaling, then I will be very concerned. I really don't think this is something the campus needs to be worrying about.

I think the term "colonial" in association with the name of George Washington clearly indicates it is referring to the period just before the Revolutionary War -- not to the initial settlements by Europeans in the 1600's. GW's use of Colonial does not indicate defense of colonialism. Our Colonial is the American who rebelled against the British empire, turning colonies into a country. He did so under the leadership of George Washington, who in turn was assisted by young, intelligent, energetic patriots like Alexander Hamilton. Our mascot fought against colonialism, not in defense of it. We at GW can take pride in our namesake's progressive vision for the independent United States. In addition to freeing those enslaved at Mount Vernon in his will, Washington realized slavery was holding the South back. As Joseph Ellis details in his biography, His Excellency, Washington hoped to see Virginia develop economically, shed its plantations, and become more of a Northern state. It is also noteworthy that the will that freed hundreds of people also bequeathed funds for a university in the nation's capital, a project Washington advocated throughout his last decade. While it is understandable that some would find Colonial offensive, this rests on a misinterpretation. Our Colonial fought to create a new country, one that is always capable of correcting its faults, and that remains an inspiration to freedom-loving people around the world.

The Colonials moniker is an embarrassment and it will be even more embarrassing if we go through all this and we keep the moniker. Please - I am begging you to stop embarrassing your alums and remove it.

Please review works by Edward Said and Frantz Fanon, to start with. Thank you.

This is a tricky question, as I can appreciate the intention of the Colonials name. In the end, however, it is clearly a celebration of the concept of colonization, which, despite being a common occurrence in history, still centers around gaining control over indigenous peoples and most often undermining their cultural norms. I also think there should be some consideration of changing the name of the University, though I also have some very distant relationship to its namesake. I am surprised that just the mascot change is taking so long and is so controversial. It should be decided quickly from here in the interest of inclusion and respect.. "Heritage" should not have equal or any consideration.

The colonials moniker was entirely irrelevant to my decision to attend GW and had no impact on my experience while a student or after. Just change the moniker, it's not a great mascot regardless of the potential social/historical implications. There aren't any downsides to changing the name; no one has decided to go to GW based on the mascot.

Not the biggest deal in the world, but GW Hippos has a nice ring to it.

Find something that is apolitical and move on.

Change the Colonial Moniker to a Hippo - we can rally with that! It's already a huge part of the GW experience, and honestly, there's more of a tie for most of the GW community to the hippo than to George—we're getting pictures with the HIPPO as seniors, not with George.

My understanding of our mascot, who has been there for a long time, well before any alumni came to the school, is a strong symbol that should not be changed.

These questions were poorly drafted and fail to ask the essential issue at hand: how, and in what specific way, is the nickname offensive? And, what % of respondents supporting a name change are sufficient to compel such an action?

Removing the Colonials name is an over-reach of epic proportions based on a wave of current students who, while well intentioned, can't see past their need to make change even when it isn't necessary because the moniker is not offensive.

I hope you care about your endowment, because my alumni action group are watching your actions very carefully. Not to mince words, but university finances and the financial burden on the students are at our mercy: Do as we say, or kiss our monetary contributions goodbye. - Michael

Unlike other Universities, we have an obvious answer to what we would replace the colonial moniker to be. The hippo is a fun, interesting, and creative mascot that students ALREADY prefer over the colonials. The reputation of the organization is put at risk to continue with the name of colonials, and perpetuates George Washington Universities' inability to develop any form of school spirit. We need to develop our own unique identity, with a unique mascot and unique culture - one that is not solely defined by a white man.

It would be absurd to change the nickname.

The "Colonials" were my college team and the term will always be integral to my college memories. Three generations of my family attended GW, and I would be disappointed if the moniker is changed - it would certainly make me feel less connected to my alma mater. I always believed the moniker was adopted to be in keeping with the theme of the school i.e. the "Hatchet" and the "Cherry Tree" - after all the school is named for George Washington - who was a "colonist"- will the university also be changing its name? How do you reconcile changing the "Colonials" moniker but not the school name? The colonial era was a period of time in American history and the term does not have to be interpreted with negative connotations. Given GW's current financial constraints, I think the cost for re-branding could be better spent on expanding and supporting educational opportunities.

Our university is named after George Washington. It seems fitting that our mascot be connected with his life in some way. If we change our mascot name, what would prevent us from changing the university's name?

Remain ALL of it. GW owned hundred many slaves and there are buildings on campus named after segregationist. I never felt welcomed or safe there. The primary reason I attended was the amount of financial aid awarded to me, GWU literally bought my Black body and used it as a prop for marketing.

History is history. We cannot change history. I am proud of our colonial fathers and mothers.

If the moniker offends some people and makes them feel disenfranchised then I say, find something more inclusive and unifying.

The Colonials moniker did not influence my decision to come to GW. In fact, throughout my time at GW, it was the Hippo that made me proud to go to GW. I absolutely loved the memories I made at my federal work study job getting to be GW Hippos. I loved embracing a moniker that included everyone, doesn't take itself too seriously yet is also a fierce moniker if you delve deeper into the animal itself. GW need to remain a dynamic institution, not a static one. Changing with our new understanding and context behind images is part of what it means to be a lasting bulwark. GW did not last 200 years staying the 'Columbia College' when we were just a few block wide in the U Street neighborhood. We changed, grew, allowed black/brown students to apply and attend GW, we expanded our program offerings to include STEM and Fine Arts. Why are we struggling to change in a positive direction? What is the real issue with changing the moniker to the Hippo? It was no where mentioned in this survey, but that is what the current students want and are looking for. It is a unique to GW moniker and I fear that this renaming committee is guided by our most vocal alumni and administrators who do not listen to the voices of current students. It's a lot of little things that make a students time at GW important, and while I'm sure the board of trustees or esteemed alumni may think this change is unnecessary or even in poor spirit; know that this change, in the little ways that it will affect students day to day, will mean the world to so many who seek to see their university show a sign that it listens and wants to foster a more inclusive community through action.

Colonization was a violent action that destroyed native communities. Regardless of intentions, there are historical names for George Washington's followers that have less baggage today. I have no attachment to the Colonials name and feel it should be replaced with something better.

As an international student i was confused and embarrassed by the colonial moniker especially given that GWU is known for its diversity with international Students and it's large and influential international affairs and political science department

This effort to remove the moniker Colonials is silly.

Perhaps I shouldn't be surprised that the current vociferous "cancel culture" has made the GWU moniker an issue. It's actually quite sad.

I have many decent memories of George, but the mascot of "colonial" is unremarkable for me. In fact, I would often forget that the mascot was the colonial and not the hippo. As a veteran myself, I am proud to stand behind the nickname honoring our first Soldiers and the founding of our country.

Americans fought the Revolution specifically to stop being colonists, and become citizens of a democratic republic. Pick a name to reflect a diverse, inclusive free nation of citizens - not one that reflects our pre-Revolutionary status as subjects of a monarch.

I don't so much have a disconnect with the idea of colonials moniker (though now that I think on it...) as that creepy white big GW head on the mascot

I would prefer efforts be spent to truly improve the school (rankings, student and professor recruitment, facilities, job opportunities for graduates, etc.) as opposed to worrying about how to find the least offensive mascots, monikers, building names, etc.

I just don't understand why we would choose a mascot over inclusion. Even the Washington football team changed their name. It shouldn't even be a question.

There is no reason to maintain a mascot that even some people find offensive and divisive. Change the name.

We are at a time in our history in which we are working to make amends and improvements in the way the world works. Changing the moniker is a small gesture to show students, prospective and current, that we do not condone or endorse violence committed against them or their ancestors.

If GW is aiming to be inclusive, it seems prudent to change the moniker used to represent GW.

This term holds a significant negative connotation for a significant portion of the student base and it should not be used to represent the school as a whole

If changing the name will help make more students and alumni feel comfortable being vocally supportive of their school, I think that's important. I appreciate this survey and think that it is a fairly straightforward issue. The moniker "Colonials" relates to imperialism, colonialism, and supremacy and should be removed

Removing this moniker spurns history and is a disgraceful attempt to cater to a vocal, leftist, minority opinion that has no respect for the principles upon which this nation was founded nor for the Framers who first put those principles into practice. If this moniker were removed, this institution's very namesake, George Washington, will be cast aside as just another "symbol of hate" before too long. That can NEVER be allowed to happen.

I feel that it's a good moniker for GW Athletics

While I completely understand wanting to rename some of the buildings on campus due to their namesakes' antiquated beliefs and racist/sexist/homophobic ideologies, I do not think the Colonials moniker needs to be changed. I think a lot of people are confusing the concept of colonization with the period of Colonial America.

Your question was about whether the moniker impacted my decision to attend GW. It didn't in 2007, but it would now. I don't wear any GW any longer with "colonials" on it. It's not something I want as part of my personal brand.

While I understand many of the reasons things have been renamed recently and support these decisions, colonials to me isn't inherently negative. It doesn't evoke the same sentiments as say "redskins" or "aunt jemima."

George Washington was a slave owner as well as colonial and founder of our country. Is the renaming of the university also under discussion?

Thank you for taking action in collecting this data. It will only benefit GWU to take a stance against white supremacy and begin to acknowledge the future.

If the name was changed, I believe it should continue to incorporate something from the historical time period.

I don't think the "colonial" moniker defines GWU or George Washington, the man. He led the Continental Army, in an era of colonialism. GWU can find a better moniker. Today, colonialism should be reevaluated, including the origins of the USA. This issue is no different than that of reframing the meaning of the confederacy during the Civil War. We would not accept a confederate moniker nor should we accept a colonial moniker despite nostalgia for our brand. Please handle this properly and with limited marketing. I would encourage GWU to drop colonial imagery and adopt simple and classic use of "GWU" initials and "George Washington" text followed by search for new moniker and mascot. I proudly say I went to GW, not that I'm a colonial.

I think the origin of the world is rooted in a good place but for some it may be a reminder of an uneven power structure which was created centuries ago and still holds a place in some areas of the world or not too distant past.

It's not up to me. I will agree with the majority of the folks who feel strongly about this moniker. I understand how "Colonials" could draw reference to "colonization" which was a European and Asian movement to take over other countries, especially where indigenous people were the primary population. I also understand that as part of colonization, indigenous people were harmed and killed, enslaved or had their traditional lands taken away. And, during America's colonial period, slavery was introduced and became a "normal economic activity" by those we call "Colonials". If there is passion among students and faculty, and my colleague colleague alumni/ae, then I'm all for finding a more inclusive moniker. It means a lot less to me than other members of the GWU Community's feelings

"Colonial" obviously means much more than American colonists, and it doesn't make sense to keep an outdated term that both alumni and tuition-paying students don't relate to. Given than GWU has far less school spirit than peer universities, it can only help the administration to provide a more attractive name we can rally behind. And there are many ways to pay homage to America's colonial era. "Patriots", "Revolution" come to mind. Also, looking back to my college experience, the Hippo mascot at Lisner was something we all cherished more than the "Colonials" moniker.

I'm hoping there are people of color on the committee deciding this. As a white person, the colonials moniker never bothered me, I never really thought of it negatively, but if there are people that it offends, to me - there is no question to remove it. I know there is a question of honoring our history. We should honor our history and always in the proper context. The colonials mascot is now what I think of when I look back on my time at GW. It's probably best to move on from the moniker considering there are many other monikers that could convey "patriotism" which I believe is what is most likely what the founders had in mind.

I never had a strong tie to the nickname. If it is offensive - I have no issue changing.

I think that the argument to lose the Colonial moniker is a disservice to our history and our University. In do not feel it is appropriate to change the monitor as it is not an offensive teem. Every country has colonials of it's own. Why should ours be changed to make those of other countries happy? They have colonials of their own!

When you look at the negative impacts of colonialism it stands against what I hope GW stands for. I think at best using the title belittles the negative impacts of colonialism and at worst celebrates it. Especially for a school that prides itself on its international student body, I can't imagine being from a place that was colonized and seeing your university try to make that into a fun, theoretically unifying mascot title.

It would be quite disingenuous to change the Colonials moniker while keeping the name "George Washington University."

An alternative could be The Continentals, since George Washington led the Continental Army (not the Colonial Army) and Continentals was one name for people who favored independence from the UK.

To change the name of the mascot creates a disconnect between former and current students. Once a Colonial always a Colonial. Rise high!

The residents of the American colonies were routinely referred to as Colonists during the pre-Revolution period. The American armies were referred to as colonial soldiers lead by our University's name sake George Washington. While the colonial period had some dark moments especially the enslavement of Africans who were imported for that purpose and the persecution of indigenous peoples, I don't know that we erase historical misdeeds by stopping the use of the moniker. I think we should use the moniker as a teachable moment.

The word "colonial" is used in many ways relative to the establishment of the United States. There's very little that provides some cohesion to GW students - the colonial name is one of them and it is entirely relevant and appropriate.

I understand both the original meaning of the moniker and the discomfort some might have with the moniker. I am completely indifferent whether it changes. If it does change, I am partial for a name referencing the hippo/riverhorse statue.

"Colonials" is an inappropriate moniker for any institution

Colonials at GW is representative of the GE community. It is not a direct representation of every element of day-to-day life activity, good or bad, that existed during the times of the founding of the country. If you are looking to represent the community of GW today, continue to invest in the ways individuals and their unique interests can be celebrated.

I love the Colonials moniker and think that is perfectly acceptable and appropriate given that I chose to attend The George Washington University. George Washington was certainly a colonial and I'll go as far as to assume that he took pride in his involvement in separating the US from British colonial rule. I don't think that any of the American colonists in the 18th century would be offended that we refer to them as colonists or colonials, since that's exactly what they were - individuals residing in Britain's colonies. I understand that perhaps in other countries colonialism is not something that people celebrate, but here it is our national history and the contribution that our Founding Fathers had in developing modern democracy honestly is a bright spot in our otherwise morally complicated past (I get that their version of democracy was only for white, land-owning men - it was the 1700s, that was already quite a step up from monarchial rule). I believe the problem some people have with GW being the Colonials is that there are countries where outcomes from colonialism were not as ideal and where discrimination and oppression of colonists was primarily based on racial or ethnic factors and in those countries colonialism is a shameful part of their past. I know that the US went on to be included in this group of colonizers and that the success of the British colonies in the US was at the expense of Native Americans, but the history we are acknowledging with the "Colonial" moniker is from our time as colonists overthrowing British colonial rule, not as colonizers. I think it would be a shame to get rid of the "colonials" because some people either fail or refuse to see the nuance of history. If we remove Colonials, should we no longer be The George Washington University?

If the university wants to be a global brand, it should be with a word that doesn't require understanding the specific and narrow context in which it is used at GW. The word is not special enough to retain when its use outside of the United States has such a negative connotation.

I don't think the Colonials ever had a strong resonance so aside from being politically correct, it may be a time to think of a better name anyway

Political correctness to the extreme, and another example of efforts to rewrite history. Change this "moniker" and you will never get another cent from me.

There are some offensive monikers is college sports, ours isn't one of them. I think it is great that the University is taking a look at this. I am a white person who grew up in Texas. I have spent most of my life confronting, healing from, and growing out of the racist parts of where I'm from. I will do this work for the rest of my life. We can hold our past and reconcile it, and we can also begin to move forward from it. GW is more than "Colonials" and if that specific word will lead to the crumbling of the university, then all of the talk of the strength of our community and the commitment to our ideals has been, at best, hollow.

I've seen some op-eds strongly against renaming and calling it hypocritical, but also know that some current students find it meaningful to push for change. As a member of the Class of 2000, I really don't have any issue either way, but I do think you should hasten the process and not make a major deal of it. Be sure to consult Indigenous students and faculty and prioritize their feedback

I have no strong attachment to the Colonials moniker, so if some part of the GW community feels strongly about changing it, then I support their efforts/feelings.

Although The formation of our country was certainly not perfect, it has laid the foundation for the most diverse country in the world that provides more opportunities than any other. So I don't think we should be ashamed of our country and pretend we can change our history.

I would really like to understand the reasoning behind including "statements" 1, 3, and 4 above in this survey. The dictionary provides varied definitions for "colonial". I dont think that a "colonial" best represents who a gw student or alumni is. I never felt offended by the moniker, but I also never felt any particular affinity for it. Who are we? With what one symbol can we each identify, collectively? Making the decision to remove a moniker is nothing compared to the choice that follows. What symbol actually represents who we are? It has to be a simple symbol, and also secular - free of national/nationalist bias (a big flaw of our current symbol).

I think the meaning of "Colonials" depends on context. In some contexts, it could be a reference to oppressors. Three news bumps, possibly greater message to new students. Anyone who tells you they actually went to GW because of the name of the sports team is lying, they just don't like change. Ignore them. No one will ultimately care about the new one. But being culturally aware raises perceptions even if the name doesn't. THAT is what matters. Get your PR, get out ahead of a problem, and sell a lot bunch of new merchandise. This is a no-brainer, folks. Don't over-complicate this. Get big donors on board first, if you have to. But do it now, before there's a major outside push and it looks like you're playing catch up.

The moniker is a historical reference. Colonials are what the people who settled in / lived in the colonies were called. The time of George Washington involved colonials. They, as a group, should be distinguished from the practice of colonialism. Those people weren't necessarily the westward expanding colonizers, but they were living in colonies. I don't flag the word as offensive. However, it is somewhat stodgy and boring. Therefore, if it is to be changed then let that be not because we're offended or being politically correct, but rather because we are making a good business decision to adopt and replace the names moniker with a different one that appears to have stronger marketing value.

I appreciate that GW is taking steps to understand how the university might exclude people of color. I wasn't aware GW used the term Colonials and I was shocked when I found out my first year in graduate school. In my perspective, this is the first step towards becoming a more inclusive institution. During my time at GW, frequently I was the only student of color in my classes. I didn't feel represented or sometimes even understood in my experience as a woman of color.

"Colonials" never has been portrayed by the university or the student body with the negative connotation by which some apparently wish to tarnish this long-standing moniker. It reflects favorably on the school's name and heritage.

To be clear, I never gave much thought to GW sports and, while I never found the term "Colonials" offensive--nor, indeed, can I think of a rational argument as to why someone would--I am indifferent to whether the name itself is retained or discarded. I am, however, worried at the potential harm that could be caused (in a more important context) by the forces pushing for the name change.

While the colonists who founded this country had some appalling views and actions by today's standards, that is not who we are today. WE define what it means to be a GW Colonial in 2020, through our shared values and expectations of one another. The class of 2221 will undoubtedly take offense to some of our beliefs and actions ...and THEY will define what it means to be a GW Colonial in their time.

I feel we should keep the moniker, i am especially strongly AGAINST going to the Hippos moniker because the plaque infront of the Hippo infront of Listner Auditorium is 200% historically FALSE. At the time of attending, I didn't identify much with the moniker. I think there's a better term that can get at the ideas or values of GW without referencing colonialism -- a system that's almost always based on exploitation in some way, and frequently includes racism and inequality.

Please don't get rid of the Colonials name.

I believe the 'Colonials' moniker is what you make it to be. If you remove the 'Colonials' moniker, you are saying that there is something wrong with 'Colonials', and thus something wrong with all of GWU, including the tuition paying students and hard working staff. If you keep the 'Colonials' moniker, you make the moniker mean something good, a symbol of the strength, inclusivity, and compassion of all GWU people; because it's our strength, inclusivity, and compassion that allows us to come together as 'Colonials'.

As a white girl, I wasn't personally or directly "offended" or otherwise turned off by the moniker; however, I do feel it is disrespectful to those whose cultural and ethnic background has been marked by colonialism—either directly on the receiving end of military occupations, or as 'byproducts' of the system (eg. descendants of people trafficked as slaves). This summer's uprisings have accelerated a process that was already in motion, and rightly stressed its urgency. It is time for the George Washington University to acknowledge the fact that its mascot makes members of our community uncomfortable, and takes the necessary steps to address and solve the issue.

If the term is bothersome and excluding members of the community, we must seriously examine our use of it. Is this the image that we want to project? While it may mean one thing to some, it means something else and is having a negative impact to others. Words matter. Empathy Matters. People Matter.

Ask an architect what is the most objective way to look at "colonial". It's a time frame of roughly 100 years (1600s - mid 1700s). Arguably, there were British, French, Dutch and Spanish "colonials". The issue for all of us today is whether or not the term is offensive enough given our DEI lens that it needs to be changed. What is offensive today is not the same as back then. But with hindsight, we can see that some people might have been offended by being called colonials back then (in Latin America that is definitely the case -- some people wanted to be called Spaniards because they identified with Spain and there was discrimination against mestizos). There is also today's legitimate question: George Washington was more than a colonial and he would not have necessarily identified as such himself, as a person, after 1776. It is an interesting thought to me within today's framing of the issue of self-identity. And that can be fluid and always has been. Ask any immigrant family and at some point families stop considering themselves German, Polish, Italian, etc. Again, the "colonial period" was roughly 100 years, that's easily 2 - 3 generations. 1st gen would be "British", 2nd gen might straddle both feeling British and something new, maybe called colonial, etc. Bottom line, the charge of this committee is to see how we feel about the term "Colonial" and its charge is not to suggest alternatives. I am simply asking that respect and decency for ourselves and the generations of antepasados who fought and died for our right as Native students to attend an institution like GWU. Although I don't believe the intention of the "Colonials" moniker was to celebrate colonialism, it is now completely antiquated. In order for GW to continue appealing to younger generations, it must keep up with the changing times which includes a reexamination of American's historical past. Gen Z is the most diverse generation in American's history and we should strive inclusivity. We should choose moniker that celebrates diversity-something we can all celebrate and feel a part of.

If feel prevalent attitudes may result in the adoption of a silly or embarrassing nickname such as Hippos. Any change, if it happens, should reflect well on the university, its status and reputation.

I never considered Colonials to be offensive but I have no special affection or attachment to the moniker.

In all my GWU experience ... pre-student; as a student and as an alumnus I've never heard or thought of the word "Colonials" used as an epithet or meant to be exclusionary or discriminatory. Either I'm uninformed or insensitive or the word does not connote anything "negative" in the American experience.

The people who want to change the name need to learn history... there is nothing wrong with the Colonials moniker, and as a major donor to the school (in the millions), I would be very upset with the idea of a change.

It is an outdated term that highlights the fact that European settlers arrived and appropriated land, often by force, from peoples who had lived in North America for thousands of years.

Why do you need a survey to do what's right?

Although this seems to be a touchy subject depending on whom is asked, I like to think that everything happens for a reason. Without the original colonials, we would not be here having this discussion. Therefore, despite the obvious wrongdoings at the expense of Native Americans as well as other colonies around the globe, I feel that a university as old as GWU should keep the Colonial moniker. I love George as the mascot but not partial to the name "colonials"

I find it disappointing that a name change is even being considered. I am not offended by the Colonials name, and find it questionable how it can be offensive in the same way as other monikers (particularly Native American names, which I do understand and support changing). While I can understand why GW is reevaluating the "Colonials" name, I also am against any change to it. The name is general and doesn't, in my opinion, depict any group negatively. If the name is indeed changed, then I would strongly reconsider providing any alumni donations in the future. While I was an undergraduate student, GW rebranded the athletic logo, which I recall was expensive. Years later, it appears that GW has rebranded its athletic logo at least 2 more times. Spending money on rebranding and adopting another logo (and moniker) involves money that should be better spent on something else and seems like a waste of dollars that could be better reallocated somewhere else (such as tuition assistance or student programming).

Whether the Colonials moniker stays or goes, it will not change the wonderful experience I had at GW and how much GW changed and shaped my life! I do hope that GW will continue to examine and challenge the systemic issues that exist at our institution; there is still a lot of work to do to make it GW an inclusive and diverse institution. We can't assume that renaming our mascot will fix these issues - the work must continue outside of and beyond the moniker.

It's time to make a change for inclusivity and recognition of the University's mistakes.

While there are parts of our history here in the U.S. that must be revisited, generic historical names, such as colonials, should not be one of them. With that being said, I have no real concern with a renaming/rebranding, should it occur.

I'm not in favor of praising Hitler or Stalin or people who fought the civil war to preserve the institution of slavery, but when we go through this process of changing historical names not associated with genocide or preserving slavery, we are rewriting history rather than learning from it. Anyone who finds the Colonials moniker offensive has too much time on their hands and is looking for something to protest.

As a person of color (and to a lesser extent as a woman), this moniker does not feel inclusive to me. First, colonialism is problematic in both the American context and globally. I cannot in good conscience rally behind anything semantically related to colonizers, colonization, and conquest, especially since my African American and Native American ancestors were the victims of such. Second, these groups were not even considered people during the time of the Thirteen Colonies and slavery, let alone Colonials. This moniker feels like a glorification of some people's history, while overlooking the painful history of those who were denied basic human dignity and relegated to mere chattel. Colonials may have won their own independence, but they conveniently overlooked freedom for the slave. Frederick Douglass famously asked, "What to the Slave is the Fourth of July?" And I ask GW--what to Black Americans is a Colonial? Third, as an institution of higher learning in a capital city that was once majority black, GW should be leading the charge to provide a full and accurate account of this nation's history, our struggle to acknowledge the most painful aspects of that history, and our continuing quest to live up to the democratic ideals in our founding documents.
